Scholarship Helps Davie Man Tour Europe

Imagine going to Europe with everything you need in a pack on your back.

You don't have a reservation at any hotels, because you don't know how long you'll be staying at any one place. And in two and a half months, you travel on 55 trains through 11 countries, making new friends, seeing new sights and learning different cultures.

Brian Williams of Mocksville not only did just that last summer, he earned the right.

A 1995 graduate of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill with a bachelor's degree in political science, Williams was awarded a Frances L. Phillips Travel Scholarship, based on academics (He graduated with a 3.49 grade point average), a sense of humor and good character.

As part of the application process, Williams had to write an itinerary of where he wanted to go in Europe, complete with estimated costs.

The whole idea is that international travel is an educational experience in itself. In my case alone, you had to learn to be independent. Once I was awarded the scholarship (\$4,700), I had to go out and set everything up," he said.

To Williams, the experience wasn't all scary. He met new friends of several nationalities, even some from North Carolina. In Europe, it isn't uncommon for young people to travel by train as he did, and stay in inexpensive youth hostels.



"There, people get on a train and go wherever they want to," Williams said.

"Economical travel is really easy. There's a whole sub-culture of backpackers over there. You meet so many people from so many different places. The cool thing about being by myself, I could go where I wanted and stay as long as I wanted."

His favorite country was Austria, a relaxing stop after running into the only major problem on his trip.

He had been in Italy, and the pace there was hectic, with people and bicycles and cars everywhere. He took the train from Rome to Venice, but couldn't find a place to stay. "I was mad, I had never booked a room anywhere, and I was a little over halfway on my trip."

He finally got on a night train from Venice to Vienna, Austria.

"Me and this Polish kid were riding together," Williams said. "He pulls out all these things ... a CD player, a Nintendo GameBoy. He's listening to Metallica."

Williams was asleep about three hours later when an Italian train conductor came into their room and started yelling. Five people were added to the room, and they talked loudly the rest of the trip.

Then the train stopped in Austria. "It was quiet, beautiful, and relaxing," he said. "It was so nice. I heard a

Pets Included In Fire Safety Plans

Most people have a fire safety program for themselves and their family, but have you thought about your pet? It is very important to include pets in fire safety plans. Place "Pet Alert" stickers on windows and doors. These can be purchased at most pet supply stores, or from pet catalogs, and notify them that there are pets inside the home in case of a fire. Time will be minimal and if you don't think ahead, your beloved pet may not be saved.

Fire fighters and rescue personnel will be mainly concerned with the safety and rescue of the human occupants of a house, and may not be aware of the presence of trapped pets.

By installing smoke detectors and planning your family's (including your pet's) safe evacuation in advance, time and lives will be saved. Remember your pet's usual hiding and sleeping places-do you know where they go when they are afraid? During a fire your pet will be terrified, and are likely to hide in a place where they feel safe. Test your smoke detector occasionally and see how your pet reacts. Did it run and hide? Where? Was it the same place each time? By knowing ahead of time how your pet will react will save valuable time.

Leave Her Alone: Criticize Husband, Not Mrs. Clinton

How much longer will the good old boys, the gun-toters, the tobacco chewers and the conservatives allow the Republican Senate committee to pick on Hillary Clinton? It's time to stop.

Leave Mrs. Clinton alone. Blast away at her husband and his politics, but picking on his wife is... unmanly. It's cowardly. It's ungentlemanly. It's unchivalrous. It's not the thing to do.

Some of us still believe in holding the door for women. Some of us still believe in settling disputes with pistols at 20 paces. But we don't believe in picking on women. It's sort of like pulling pigtails in elementary school. It's childish, it's boorish. It lacks character.

This is the reputation Republicans want for themselves? And what's wrong with President Clinton? Why isn't he defending his wife better? Why doesn't he punch William Safire in the nose and not just think about it? At least call him a toe-sucking coward, linked forever with President Nixon's own web of deceit? The President is hiding behind the First Lady's skirts and letting her take all the criticism.

Mrs. Clinton may not be the most admired person in the world. She is a tough, smart professional woman. She overlooked her husband's indiscretions and kept her family intact. She earned money for them to live on while he dabbled in politics. She's not a dainty housewife. She has put herself in the center of public debate on health care and other issues. 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Group Seeks Improvements To Ridgemont, Campbell Road Neighborhoods

sewer service other than to a few houses, and poor soil has caused a number of septic systems to fail.

Water and sewer lines could easily be extended to the community, but only a portion of the Campbell Road community is within the corporate limits of the town, Suter said.

With the help of Grey Engineering, Inc., the committee analyzed housing conditions and asked the town to seek funding for infrastructure and housing improvements, he said.

Franchescina reported that 80 percent of the structures in the community need repairs with 51 percent requiring major repair or demolition.

Many homeowners take pride in their homes but are too poor or elderly

to keep them in good condition. To aid them, the community improvement committee organized a community clean-up day. People from inside and outside the community worked together, collecting four dumpster loads of trash, he said.

Efforts by the infrastructure and community improvement committees have been ongoing to educate residents to the benefits of annexation by the town. But an annexation will require a request from all the residents of the area because Mocksville does not conduct involuntary annexations.

Suter said Town Manager Terry Bralley shared information with residents about how much their taxes would increase and what benefits they would receive in return.

Looking at the tax value of four representative homes, it was found that

no one would be paying more than \$56 in additional taxes, but all would reap the benefits of water and sewer service, garbage pickup, street lights and police protection, he said.

In the Campbell Road community, the public facilities committee was primarily concerned with the status of Mocksville Middle School, which the Davie County Board of Education proposes closing as soon as additions can be made at Mocksville Elementary to accommodate the extra students.

Suter told the board that the committee had met with Superintendent Dr. Bill Steed and recommended that the school system continue to use the facility for a community purpose.

He said Steed said the older part of the school will probably be demolished, but the other part will still be used by the school system.

If the schools should decide not to use that building, the task force asked that the town have input into how it would be used.

"Let not happen to Mocksville Middle School what happened to North Cooleemee School," Suter said.

Among the problems found in the Ridgemont area were deteriorating housing, vacant apartment buildings, no thoroughfare, unused land and poor

image, Franchescina said.

A clean-up day was also held in this community recently.

In Ridgemont, the task force determined that 45 percent of the homes are in need of repair while 53 percent are in good condition, according to Franchescina.

The neighborhood has petitioned the town to demolish one of the abandoned apartment buildings that is in deteriorating condition and has become a gathering place for vagrants, he said.

Strategies for dealing with problems in both communities include development of community associations to identify community leaders and bring them into the revitalization process and hold meetings to encourage self-help and pride among residents.

Other suggestions for Campbell Road are annexation of the part outside the town limits, elimination of public nuisances in the area, improvement of infrastructure with water, sewer, and street lighting and provide adequate housing for all residents.

Suter said the task force would also like to see the basketball courts on Campbell Road eliminated because they have become a public nuisance, attracting people from outside the community who have caused problems.

He said he had talked with Mocksville-Davie Parks and Recreation Director Mike Garner and Mike Hendrix of the Davie County Schools about offering supervised activities for the community at Mocksville Middle.

Proposed strategies for Ridgemont include improvement of the infrastructure by developing land owned by the town and improving the appearance of the entrance way, eliminating public nuisances in the area and improve housing in the community.

Commissioner Dr. F.W. Slate said that members of the community have worked diligently to develop these recommendations.

"Everybody who was a part of this has done a good job," he said.

Suter said the work accomplished so far is only the first step. He proposed that an ad hoc committee of the Town Board of Commissioners be established for community and economic development to oversee implementation of the strategy developed by the task force.

After hearing from Suter and Franchescina, the board voted unanimously to take down the basketball goals at the courts on Campbell Road and to proceed with condemnation of the vacant apartment buildings in the Ridgemont community.

The board also voted to purchase a lot in Ridgemont to be donated to Habitat for Humanity with an option to buy six more from the same property owner.

Suter said this falls in line with the recommendations of the task force and is one of the most outstanding things the board has done.

Mayor D.J. "Nick" Mando thanked members of the task force for their efforts.

"It's up to this board to take the ball and carry it," he said but added that the town would like to continue using the capabilities of task force members.

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
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

Taylor's Shoe Shop Still In Business After 50 Years

When Clyde Taylor returned home to Davie County after World War II, he opened a shoe repair shop in the basement of a building on the square in downtown Mocksville.

It was the fifth such shop in the county, the second in Mocksville. Now, 50 years later, Taylor's Shoe Shop is the only shoe repair shop in town, or in the county. And he's still located at that same basement location just off Depot Street.

Through the years, he's fixed thousands of tips on high heels, and added new soles to just as many pairs of loafers. He's sewn together ball gloves and pocketbooks, and has even sewn a homemade lampshade for a local woman.

"A man came in the other day asking if I would fix a horse blanket, and I said I'll fix it if it's not dirty ... no horse manure."

Taylor isn't quitting, though. He's still in business, not only the best, but the only place in town where you can get your shoes repaired and hear or tell - some tall tales.

"I was in the shoe repair business on the 10th of January, 1946," Taylor said. "I took some courses through shoe service magazine. There was always a course in there on how to fix something."

Taylor plans to keep the shop open as long as he's able. "I look at all the things I could have done, but I guess I've done what I've wanted to do," he said.

Davie (25-1, 4-0 CPC) spanked South Rowan 47-23, North Davidson 46-24 and West Forsyth 69-6 last week to put the War Eagles in position for yet another championship.

Controversy Surrounds Hillsdale Tomorrow's Planning Area

HILLSDALE- You would have thought the members of the Hillsdale Tomorrow civic group had invented a new picante sauce, made in New York City.

Except the 150 or so people who attended last week's meeting were concerned with only one of those dreaded words - city.

"They like their part of Davie County just the way it is, unincorporated. If they had wanted to live in a city, they told the group they would have moved to one in the first place.

Spurred by a map of what the civic group was considering as the boundaries of Hillsdale, residents

came from Greenwood Lakes, from Advance, from Redland and from Smith Grove.

"Everybody's concern is they don't want to live in a city," said Ronnie Bates of Smith Grove. Is this going to be the boundaries? Is it going to be a tax district? I think it needs a good explanation of what you're going to do."

Avalon Potts of Hillsdale Tomorrow presented the group's "planning area."

"We tried not to get over into what we thought was another community," he said.

The boundaries go from the Yadkin River, include a portion of Greenwood Lakes, extend to the creek beyond Oak Valley, parts of Beauchamp and Baltimore roads, go up Hwy. 158 to include all of Redland Road, and on N.C. 801 to beyond Yadkin

Valley Road.

"It is not an intent for this to be incorporated," Potts said. "All this is, is a planning area."

Engineer John Grey said he did the map for free because it was for a civic group, and would have not done so had it been for incorporation.

"If there was an attempt to railroad you, this would be hidden," Grey said. "We don't believe this should be an incorporated entity. The only way to avoid that is to work together to plan for the future without becoming a city."

Others were skeptical. Frank Everhart and Swede Jergensen said the Greenwood Lakes area was developed and Hillsdale Tomorrow couldn't offer them anything.

Junker, Featherlite Want To Build Trailer Complex Along I-40

When Mocksville extended water and sewer lines beyond I-40, they envisioned development - industrial and commercial - along I-40 between Hwys. 64 and 601. It's started.

Bill Junker's Featherlite trailer business - fueled the popularity of horses and NASCAR - has outgrown its present location on Salisbury Street. He wants to build a new office building and repair shop at the end of Blaise Baptist Church Road. And Featherlite Manufacturing wants to construct a plant to build the trailers.

Junker asked Davie County to re-zone nearly 37 acres from residential and agricultural to industrial special use. The county planning board unanimously recommended the change last week, which will now go before county commissioners.

In phase one, which would start immediately, a retail shop and a repair shop, metal buildings with bricked, landscaped fronts, would be built. Each would be approximately 10,000 square feet. A trailer

lot would be lighted and paved and as well maintained as the best new car lot, Junker said.

Later in the year, Featherlite could build the 40,000 square foot manufacturing facility, which would employ local residents. "We're not there yet, but it looks real promising," Junker said.

Mocksville Town Manager Terry Bralley said the town is extending water and sewer service to the site, and is working with the N.C. Department of Commerce to get the road paved.

"This is a promising area for industry to develop," Bralley said. If granted and built, the site would be annexed into the Town of Mocksville.

Body Found In Lake Still A Mystery

Investigators are still looking for information on why a Louisburg man was in Davie County in recent months.

The body of Steven Allen Yancey, 45, was pulled from Lake Myers, off Hwy. 64 west of Mocksville, on Sunday, March 24. The state medical examiner said he died from drowning, and that the body could have been in the lake for three days or three weeks.

Authorities have little information. Yancey, a drifter with a Louisburg address who had been working in the mountains just prior to his death, was not a guest at the campground, said Detective Lt. Jimmy Phipps of the Davie County Sheriff's Department. He was 5-11 tall, had brown hair and hazel eyes. His last contact with relatives had been on Feb. 28.

There has been no indication that the death was caused by any type of foul play, said Detective Lt. Allen Whitaker.

One problem is Yancey's truck hasn't been found. The 1984 copper-colored Datsun small pickup truck with a camper had the North Carolina license plate, JSD-4568.
