Advance Parade Saturday Morning

ADVANCE - The 18th Annual Advance Christmas Parade will be held Saturday, Dec. 8 beginning at 10 a.m.

Come join in the fun as a spectator or ride through as a participant. Organizers are asking for spectators, parade participants and area residents to be patient that morning.

"We love Davie County and we love our community without our neighbors and family we couldn't make the magic happen," said Robert Myers. "We want to thank in advance all the volunteers that will be coming out to help with this undertaking."

The parade route starts at Shady Grove Elementary, follows Cornatzer Road to NC 801 South, turns right continuing along NC 801 South turning left onto Peoples Creek Road continuing until Southern Magnolia Drive. At that point

the parade ends and exit follows Peoples Creek Road back to NC 801. The parade route is roughly one mile. NC 801 will be shutdown in Advance 9:50 a.m.-noon.

All entries are welcome. There is no fee, but be there by 9 a.m.

Horses are to assemble at the ball field below the concession stand, fire trucks, rescue vehicles, classic cars, motorcycles, ATVs, and golf carts assemble in the parking lot between the ball field and the cafeteria. Big floats assemble at LeBleu. VIPs assemble at the parking lot to the right of the school beside the trees. If you are not sure where you need to go, stop and ask someone with a radio.

If you are throwing candy, throw it hard enough to clear the roadway to keep children out of the road.

There will be chicken stew for donations at the Advance Fire Department following the parade.

Budget Decision Work At Truck Driver Training Center Delayed

A decision on whether to fund construction at the truck driver training center on the Davie Campus of Davidson County Community College won't happen until next spring.

Although a decision on whether to allow the college to use \$111,980 from budget savings on renovation to the Gantt Building was on county commissioner's agenda Monday, County Manager Beth Dirks said the college had requested the item be removed.

The college worked out an agreement with the N.C. Department of Transportation that will allow the work to be delayed, and the request will likely be in next year's budget, Dirks said.

The request was originally made last month, but two commissioners questioned whether it should be allowed and another questioned whether it had to be done immediately.

College President Dr. Mary Rittling said that the work will have to be done to keep the program in Davie County, and if not now, in next year's budget.

During the public comment section of Monday's meeting, Randy McDaniel Sr. suggested the county adopt a policy that savings on projects in any department go back into the county's general fund.

"The savings belong to the taxpayers," McDaniel said. "If they've got some emergency ... you can call a meeting."

He said the county should explore all options with the community college, including establishing it as its own.

Speed Demons: How Fast Before Blue Lights Flash?

There's a traffic ticket in his future. My 21-year-old stoutly defended his speeding on I-35 in Oklahoma over the weekend by explaining he was merely going with the flow. The 70 mph speed limit sign was merely a suggestion. Situational speeding is okay in Oklahoma.

Oh? He has not confirmed his legal theory with the Oklahoma highway patrol. We effete Easterners still cling to the ancient philosophy that the law means what it says — that speeding is speeding and anyone crossing the magic line is putting his wallet and insurance rating at risk and in the whimsical clutches of a patrolman with a radar gun.

What merits a ticket? Is it 71 mph in a 70 zone? Maybe not. What about 76 or 80? What triggers the blue lights and siren?

Now that I have reached geezer-hood, my driving annoys my college boy.

His reckless habits scared me white-knuckled as I grabbed the door handle while he whipsawed through traffic.

Oklahomans drive fast, and my son has quickly adapted to the ways of the American heartland.

Oddly, my young Libertarian stiffly follows the seatbelt law. No allowance for slackers there. The State of Oklahoma has a vested interest in keeping drivers alive lest their graves unnecessarily block oil drilling. Derricks were pumping over the weekend.

I'm old enough to remember when people left home without a digital umbilical cord to guide them. We could read maps, but even geezers have cell phones now. My best use of the phone is to make Sunday afternoon videos for the grandchildren. Some of my films are Oscar worthy.

I'll be run out of the neighborhood if I don't get the leaves up this week. I had been diligent about getting them up until Thanksgiving. Family visitors and an Oklahoma trip to see my son's senior piano recital have allowed the leaves to accumulate for nearly two weeks. One more good raking... No, I blow them now with my dandy tornado backpack machine. It has changed my life. No longer are the leaves such a bother. I can blow the entire lawn in about an hour. With an Oklahoma wind at my back, it would take maybe 15 minutes.

Simple Math: \$50 Million A 10-Cent Tax Increase

To the editor:

There have been several articles in this newspaper concerning building a new high school, as well as speculation of how it would be paid for. The answer most want to know is how much a new school project would affect their property tax. Ideas on methods of financing that are circulating appear to be without substance. If our county commissioners decide to allow a bond referendum for new school construction, they will then inform everyone what type financing will be used. Not until then can we know by how much our property tax would be affected.

There is a simple formula for calculating how property tax is affected by debt: for every \$5 million in bonds that Davie County sells, it takes 1-cent of new property tax to satisfy that expense. If a new high school costs approximately \$50 million, expect your property tax to increase approximately 10 cents per hundred. Davie County property tax rate at present is 62 cents per hundred, a 10-cent property tax increase equals a 16 percent increase. Example: if your present property tax is \$1,200 per year, it will increase to \$1,392 or an increase of \$192.

These numbers are the facts.

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Bond Reduced For Man Accused Of Sex Offenses

A Cooleemee man accused of multiple charges involving a minor had his bond reduced in Davie District Court last week. James Ray Paris Jr., 20, was arrested three times and was charged with assault on a female, assault with a deadly weapon, communicating threats, cyberbullying of a person under age 18, assault by strangulation, second degree sexual offense, two counts of statutory rape/sex offense, and five counts of taking indecent liberties with a child. The alleged victim was 14 years old when the incidents occurred and had turned 15 when Paris was charged.

Appearing with a buzz cut instead of the shoulder length hair he had when arrested, Paris stood quietly as his attorney, Lori Hamilton, told Judge Wayne Michael that Paris is a lifelong resident of the county, has no prior criminal record, is a former Boy Scout, a black

teenage girl with the ability, by what she says, to ruin this man's life."

Assistant DA Karen Biernacki painted a different picture of Paris.

"This man threatened to kill the alleged victim's parents. He told her he was going to drive nails through the hands of her dad. In my educated opinion, the victim was punched in the face, strangled to near unconsciousness. She and the defendant would talk via Skype, and Paris was arrested Nov. 15,

Nov. 21, and Nov. 26. Bonds set for the first two arrests totaled \$35,000, and Paris was able to make bond. His last bond was set at \$150,000. He had been in jail since that arrest.

Michael did not modify the first bonds, but modified the last one from \$150,000 to \$20,000 secured. He was ordered not to have any contact with the victim or her family and abide by a domestic violence protective order. The next court date is Jan. 24.

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1 Arrested After Get-Together Turns Into Brawl

Three people were injured after a weekend get-together turned into a brawl.

Brian Jason White, 26, of High Point was charged with assault and two counts of assault inflicting serious injury on Dec. 2.

According to Davie County Sheriff's Chief J.D. Hartman, officers responded to Brookland Drive in Advance around 3:10 a.m. that Sunday.

When they arrived at the residence they discovered three people inside the home had been assaulted.

"Apparently the suspect

[White], who is a family member, had come by and had been hanging out and some drinking had occurred," Hartman said. "Some time after 2 a.m. an argument started between [White] and his sister."

Hartman said that White punched his sister's boyfriend in the face two times and knocked him to the ground.

Next, White's sister jumped on her brother in an attempt to stop the fight and she was struck in the head with an unknown object, according to Hartman.

Hartman said the fight was finally broken between White and the others and he was asked to leave the residence.

"As he left he threw a Scotch glass and hit another victim, his uncle, in the head," Hartman said.

White's uncle was taken to Forsyth Hospital for treatment. His sister and her boyfriend were treated at the scene.

Hartman said that White was located later that morning by Davidson County Sheriff's officials and placed in custody under a \$5000 secured bond.

He is scheduled to appear in Davie District Court on Jan. 17,



Teen Charged With Running Over Father With Vehicle - Twice

A Mocksville man was charged with assault after running over his father with a vehicle twice last week.

Joey Martin Ijames, 19, of Pine Ridge Road, was arrested Nov. 27 for felony assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill or inflict serious injury.

According to Davie County Sheriff's Office Chief J.D. Hartman, on Nov. 27 around 8:55 a.m. officers responded to the Pine Ridge Road address in reference to a domestic argument between Ijames and his father.

Hartman said the Davie deputies were assisted by Cooleemee Police Department.

"We discovered the argument started in the home and moved outside," Hartman said. "The father was trying to get the son [Ijames] out of the home and a physical confrontation began."

Hartman said that Ijames drove a 1999 Mazda and as he was attempting to leave he tried to hit his father, but his father managed to get out of the way.

"But Mr. Ijames backed over his father and then ran over him

a second time before exiting the vehicle and running," Hartman said.

Hartman said Ijames' father was treated at the scene by EMS, but was also taken to the hospital by family members.

Ijames was located later that day around 3:30 p.m. and was taken into custody at that time and placed under a \$5,000 secured bond.

He is scheduled to face the charge in Davie District Court on Jan. 24.

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

Unbeaten Boys Pass First Test

The Davie varsity boys basketball team is still unbeaten, but perhaps more importantly, Davie is no longer untested.

The first three games of the season were as challenging as a walk in the park on a sunny day, with the War Eagles winning by 20, 45 and 19 points.

They needed a tough game, and they got one from Smith Saturday at UNC Greensboro. In fact, they got a scare as Smith rallied to 50-49 with less than a minute left.

But when the big moment arrived, Davie responded, pulling away 54-49 to improve to 4-0.

The War Eagles repelled a fearless opponent smelling an upset despite playing a slow-down, grind-it-out game that saw them score the fewest points in 36 games (dating to a 47-46 loss to North Davidson in the '11 conference tournament).

The style of play was a stark contrast to last year's meetings, when Smith won 60-57 and Davie got revenge 88-77 in the first round of the playoffs. "It was a great test in a lot of ways - the quality of program they have, playing here on a big court, a home game for them," coach Mike Absher said. "You knew it was going to be a challenge, so I'm very pleased with the effort we got."

The War Eagles rocketed past a doormat foe in a 45-point laughter on the road.

Caleb Martin kicked off a sterling week with a career-high 29 points, eight rebounds and five assists. It was the sixth 20-point game of his three-year varsity career, but his previous high had been 22.

Twins Austin and Taylor Hatfield added solid stats, with Austin scoring 13 points to go with four assists and Taylor getting 10 points, six assists and four steals. Keep in mind, the starters played little more than half the game.

The gym was rocking for Davie's first home game, and the War Eagles gave their packed-house fans a whole lot to cheer about.

After building a 49-37 halftime lead, they kicked into another gear in the third, outscoring Lexington 24-11 to push the margin to 73-48.

"The crowd was amazing," Austin said. "I could not have been more happy with the crowd. It gets us hyped and ready to play. Caleb and Cody came out with a few massive dunks, and we just continued to play our game."



Davie hung within 35-31 in the first half as Haleigh Hatfield and Amy Steller keyed 5-for-11 3-point shooting. Hatfield was on fire throughout the half, scoring 19 of Davie's 31 points.

With four minutes to play, Davie

was still in contention. Trailing 48-44, Steller let a 3-ball fly. It went in and out. North went on to defeat Davie for the fourth straight time over three seasons, but Key came away encouraged.

Hatfield (22 points, 14 rebounds) and Ashiah Peterson (10 points, 10 rebounds, three blocks) achieved double-doubles. Steller had eight points, all in the first half.

"We played a nice game in a lot of respects," he said. "They've got a classy team, and we had great opportunities. There were many, many opportunities that we didn't cash in on."

Davie 63, Lexington 51

The War Eagles took a big step in the first home game of the season, breaking a nine-game losing streak that began last season and scoring the most points in 40 games. It was the biggest output since a 63-59 overtime win over East Rowan in 2010-11.

"Lexington just lost in overtime to Reagan at Reagan," Key said. "This win was a must."

Davie took a good punch from Lexington. The Yellow Jackets led 14-6

The Wildcats returned the top two scorers from last year in Hampton (12.2) and Bohannon (7.5). Those two and Parks fueled the onslaught.


Bohannon poured in 23 points, Hampton had 16 and Parks 15. Beck and Hailey Fulch chipped in seven and six, respectively.

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




Davie crushed Lexington 40-19 in the second half.





GO FAR 150 Davie Students Participating In Running Program

ADVANCE - For the past three months, about 150 children from four area schools have participated in the GO FAR program.

GO FAR stands for Go Out For a Run, and that's just what they have been doing.

The program is a comprehensive fitness program designed to promote healthy eating habits, physical activity, goal setting and good character. Lori Smith, four-time marathoner and coach of the program at Shady Grove Elementary, said the 10 weeks she has spent coaching the group of second through fifth graders there has been wonderful.

While Girls on the Run, another successful running program, has helped many area students, Smith said she likes GO FAR because it's open to boys and is less expensive.

Two days a week, Smith met with her group for a few minutes in the gym, where they talked about the cul-


mination of their training, a 5k race. She told them what to expect during the race, about thanking the volunteers who work at the races and encouraged them to think of a word or phrase they could use when they were running, to help them keep going if they felt like quitting.

Then they hit the track, where they spent the rest of their afternoons running.

Zach Smith, fifth grader, and Zach Rodgers, fourth grader, said they liked the program because it taught them to "not quit," to "respect other runners," and that it was fun.

Ava Brooke Smith, fifth grader, said she enjoyed beating people and winning, and Madison Smith, daughter of the coach and a fourth-grader, said she was looking forward to her third 5k because "they are fun."

Davie Schools

Shady Grove Elementary
Third graders completed a study of the skeletal system. As a culminating activity, the children learned about owls and took part in a science lab to dissect owl pellets. It was exciting for the children to uncover bones, feathers, and fur and then try to determine which small rodents their owl had eaten. Students hosted their parents in the classrooms to learn, "How We Roll in Third Grade." The children ran stations that showcased activities they do every day in class, guiding the parents to participate. They used Smart Board activities, games, science labs, literature circles, and computer stations. On Friday, Nov. 30, Charles and Lorraine Markland came to talk about dictionaries. They presented each third grader with their own dictionaries, compliments of the Davie Civitan Club. Students will go to Heritage Theater on Dec. 11.

Second graders journeyed to the past through Thanksgiving reading and other online activities. They disguised Thanksgiving turkeys as athletes, movie characters, other animals, and people to protect them from being cooked and wrote about their disguises. In math they have been drilling addition and subtraction with regrouping up to three digits. Students have been practicing math facts to aid with the regrouping.

During the Presidential election, second graders learned about the local government and the election process. They did an IVC with Texas Bat Conservatory where they participated with a few other elementary schools across the country. They saw live bats being fed mealworms. Students were particularly interested in bats after a study in October.

On Nov. 28 second graders participated in a Family Science Night in partnership with the Math and Science Center at Appalachian State. There were 40 engaging, problem solving and critical thinking stations. Students and parents went around the cafeteria to stations including Gummy Bear launching, holding Madagascar hissing cockroaches, balloon zip line, sound station, and others.

First grade classes have been learning about econom-

ics through an activity called Santa's Workshop. This activity teaches economic generalizations through role play. The children took on the roles of producers and consumers of goods and services through the magic of Santa and his workshop. They learned that unlimited wants and limited resources create scarcity. For five days the students became producers of goods, making one good per day. They were paid wages for their labor which they deposited in the Shady Grove Bank. On the sixth day, they will withdraw their funds from their account. They will take these funds and become consumers by purchasing the goods they had previously made. If they manage their money well, they will have extra dollars to spend at the first grade food court. During the last week of school the first graders will participate in Christmas Around the World.

They will arrange classes as they move from one country to another with their passports where they will learn the holiday customs of each country.

Pinebrook Elementary
Kindergarten began a study of Christmas in Mexico. Students learned the legend behind the beautiful Christmas flower, the poinsettia. Students studied the old "3 Kings' Day" tradition. They are learning about other holidays that are celebrated during the winter months.

This week in Mrs. Miller and Mrs. Swain's first grade class, students wrote about what they did over the Thanksgiving holiday. The kids have made reindeer using their hands and feet, written letters to Santa and wrote about jobs that Santa may need at the North Pole. During math time, students have been working on subtraction and strategies regarding subtraction. They answered word problems, discussed related facts and learned how to use subtraction to compare items.

Students bring their own items in real-life in which using subtraction is needed. During whole group reading time, they read the story *The Big Circle*. This book is about a family of triceratops and how work together to protect a baby from a T-Rex. Students have learned vocabulary words, and com-

prehension strategies with this story. For social studies, they are learning about economics. Students learned about goods and services, and will continue this study for December.

Students in Mrs. Culler's third grade class are exploring multiplication. Students learned to draw arrays as a visual aid to solve multiplication problems. They are memorizing facts for mastery. The focus in reading has been on the reading skill of author's purpose. They explored types of text and determined whether the author's purpose was to inform, to entertain or to teach. Students are watching carefully for acts of kindness around the school. They are writing down the acts of kindness they see to help the class "Grinch" grow a larger heart.

Mrs. Davis's fourth grade class finished a science unit on electricity by making closed circuits that made light bulbs light up. Most groups created a series circuit, which had only one path for the current. Students brought their own items in real-life in which using subtraction is needed. During whole group reading time, they read the story *The Big Circle*. This book is about a family of triceratops and how work together to protect a baby from a T-Rex. Students have learned vocabulary words, and com-

pleting a study on area and perimeter. They will move to order of operations. This will be a new concept to the students and will require extra practice at home.

Angelina Etter and Casey Orsillo's class has been learning about the difference between wants and needs. Recently they completed activities to study inherited traits and how traits are passed from one generation to another.

Mrs. Martin and Mrs. Rakes second grade class has been reading a fable about a turtle and a beaver that settle a disagreement with a race. The children enjoyed the surprise ending. Students began research on animals and insects that live in the forest, ponds, and oceans. They watched a

parallel circuit and that if they were on a series circuit, all of the lights would go out when only one bulb on the strand burned out. The students participated in an interactive electricity lesson on the Smartboard.



Math is not a class that most people automatically think of as being 'easily globalized,' but she has shown how it can be done in a way that enriches the course and creates great enthusiasm in the students."

Boy, 9, Found With Gun At School
Mother, Stepfather Facing Charges

Three people were charged this week - one child and two parents - after a loaded handgun was brought to Cooleemee Elementary School. The gun was found Monday around 2:45 p.m.

Davie Schools Superintendent Dr. Darrin Hartness said a teacher helping a young student organize his bookbag in the afternoon found a small loaded handgun in the bookbag. "The teacher immediately took the student and bookbag to the office," Hartness said, "and a parent and law enforcement were called."

"Our teachers are trained to deal with issues like this, and at no point do we feel that any student or staff member was in danger. We are handling the disciplinary actions, and law enforcement is dealing with it from their side."

Hartness did not give the age of the student, but said it was a young male.

A ConnectEd call went out to parents of all students at the school Monday night.

Cooleemee Police Chief Bobby West said that his department responded to Cooleemee Elementary following the discovery of the gun.

"The third grade teacher who found the gun could not tell if it was real or not," West said. "It was a .25 caliber semi-automatic handgun with three bullets in the magazine. There were no bullets in the chamber"

West said the teacher found the weapon because there were accusations against the 9-year-old that he may have had something that

Young man and the sea? Ryan Barnes has reported in again, this time from the Aleutian Islands aboard a fishing boat with monster halibut.

He has hiked the Appalachian Trail, lived in remote Montana and been something of a 21st Century Grizzly Adams. The Mocksville native grew up with my oldest son, and I've often dreamed of going with him on his wild adventures.

He has climbed aboard dangerous fishing boats several times in the cold climates.

He stopped at St. Matthew Island, the most remote island in the world, and saw the crash of a World War II B-24 bomber on Adak Island.

But his job was fishing, catching halibut, Pacific cod, black cod and rock fish — about 35,000 pounds of fish before taking them to port.

They stuff the bellies of the fish with ice to keep them fresh.

Most of the halibut weigh 10-35 pounds, but there is an occasional 200 pounder.

He's living the dream. It goes without saying, Ryan is single.

Use Simple Math, And Do What's Needed

To the editor:

I, for one, really appreciate Bill Foust's example of the simple math we can use for our schools in achieving what we need for our Davie County schools. What I think we really need to do is go ahead and do one large bond referendum in the spring for about \$100 million. pairs for all the elementary and middle schools and get all of our schools in great shape.

Using that simple math, that would be a 20 cents per hundred property tax increase and take the tax rate from .62 to .82. The example of the present property tax of \$1,200 would mean it would go to \$1,584. Yes it would hurt but our children and the future of Davie County needs this.

On the Wednesday before Thanksgivings, I was working with some fellow Sugar Valley Airport volunteers clearing some land near the airport in Farmington. During the afternoon, one of our volunteers, David Fyten, experienced a sudden heart attack and collapsed. We initiated CPR and called for emergency assistance, which arrived rapidly, within minutes. The Farmington Volunteer Fire Department and the Davie County EMS personnel were exceptional. Not only did they arrive very quickly, but immediately took control of the situation, directed traffic, and provided advanced life support. Unfortunately, even with their support we were unable to revive Mr. Fyten and he was pronounced dead at the scene.

I have practiced medicine for more than 30 years including working in the emergency department at Hoots Hospital in Yadkinville. Throughout that time, I have had many opportunities to interact with and work closely by emergency responders in the field and in the emergency department. I can honestly say that I have rarely seen a group of emergency responders work together so cooperatively, skillfully and with such great respect for the family and friends of their patient. In spite of the unfortunate outcome, it was a wonderful experience to be part of and is a true credit to this community and to the professionalism and competence of each emergency responder.

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

A Mocksville couple remains in jail on charges of felony child abuse to their baby boy.

The couple are scheduled to appear in Davie District Court today.


Hartman said neither parent has a criminal history and that the investigation is still ongoing.

belonged to another student in his bookbag.

West said that the boy's mother came to the school and was interviewed. "The 9-year-old denied he put the gun in there and said that his little 3-year-old brother did it."

West said the mother said it wasn't possible for the 3-year-old to gain access to the weapon because it was being stored out of the younger child's reach.

West said the student told school personnel and police that he was not mad at anyone at the school and was not being bullied. "He showed no type of anger or threat and it looks like this might have been something done more out of curiosity."

West said that the biggest issue was that safety was jeopardized and there was potential for something to happen.

The weapon is registered to the student's uncle, who is staying with the family, but his mother, Felice Schuerman, 38, of Fonzo Way, Mocksville, was charged with failure to store a firearm to protect a minor.

Davie Sheriff's Chief J.D. Hartman said that following the incident at the school social services requested a deputy escort to go the student's home. Hartman said when authorities arrived they found the student had been disciplined "in a severe fashion" by his step-father and had suffered injuries.

"He was beaten on several parts of his body, his arms, his backside, front side, and legs," Hartman said. The student was taken to the hospital where he was treated and released. The child was removed from the home by social services and is staying elsewhere.

The step-father, Brian Schuerman, 45, of the home, was charged with misdemeanor child abuse.

West said the student is being charged with possession of a firearm on school property and his case is being handled by juvenile services.





He Means Business Cody Scores 28, 27 In Nonconference Routs

Cody Martin's swagger is back. The junior forward was downcast after scoring a pedestrian five points in the Davie boys basketball team's 54-49 win over Smith. It was his lowest output in 25 games.

Needless to say, Cody was fired up for the next game against visiting West Rowan. Posting up time and again, he sparked an 87-51 wipeout with 28 points on 13-of-19 shooting. He added nine rebounds and two blocks to his seventh career 20-point effort. He had a 22-point night as a freshman and five 20-point games as a sophomore. But this was a career high by two points.

Cody was not satisfied. He went off for 27 as unbeaten Davie (6-0) ripped apart visiting Alexander Central 83-59. Against West Rowan, Cody came out smoking, accounting for 12 of Davie's 22 first-quarter points.

"I said I'm going to settle in and play my game," he said. "Coach (Mike Absher) told me before we went out: 'We're going to put you in the post and see what we can do.' He said nobody could stop me. We tried it and it seemed to work. They gave it to me and I'd dish it or score."

Cody dropped in 10 points in the third, when Davie shot a blistering 13 of 18 as a team.

"We talked about it first thing Monday (after the Smith game)," Absher said. "We felt like tonight would be a good opportunity for him to bounce back. We talked about having a double-double. He was relentless in going to get the ball off the glass, and he was so patient in the post when he caught it. He didn't try to do anything too fast. He just really showed how good he is."

The War Eagles put on quite a show in the open court. Caleb was ahead of the pack on a fast break. Sensing Cody trailing, he slowed up and tossed the ball off the backboard. Cody soared in, caught the ball and dunked in one motion.

On another break, Austin Hatfield tossed an alley-oop to Caleb Martin,

who slammed it home with one hand. Cody accelerated down the floor. He maneuvered around a defender and flushed while going full speed.

West coach Mike Gurley, whose rebuilding Falcons slumped to 0-4, could only watch in amazement as Caleb (18 points, five assists), Peyton Sell (13 points, 3-of-4 3-point shooting) and Austin Hatfield (12 points, four assists) helped Davie beat West for the sixth straight time.

"They're really good," Gurley said. "What I like is their starting five is on point as far as they know each other. You could tell they know how to play basketball - on top of physically being gifted. They are really good at running. They're going to be wonderful in their conference, and they can make a serious run (in the playoffs)."

Kenyon Tatum had seven points. Taylor Hatfield had a season-low three points, yet he had a solid game with seven assists against no turnovers. It was his fourth straight outing with five-plus assists.

"That's a great night for Taylor, especially against a quick and athletic team that pressed us basically the whole game," Absher said.



Peterson demonstrated her rapid progress, the sophomore getting career highs in points and rebounds.

Sydney Wooten and Madison Zafetos had six and five points, respectively. Zafetos contributed six assists.

"That was a great night for Asiah," he said.

"Both teams missed pressure free throws. Whatever team lost was going to say we should have won it. We were up late in regulation and overtime."

Against Alexander Central, the War Eagles came out breathing fire. They carved out a 32-14 lead as Peterson scored the first six points and Zafetos buried three straight triples.

What made it even more impressive was it came against a team that would improve to 6-0.

"It's the only time this season we've trailed at the half," Central coach Matt Taylor said. "They punched us in the mouth."

"I'd like to think we can be who we were in the first 12 minutes," Key said. "That was some pretty good basketball and some stuff to be proud of."

But Davie began spiraling downward late in the first half. The 32-14 lead was chopped to 32-22 by intermission.

Steller's 3-ball pushed the margin to 35-22. Then Central responded with an 11-0 run. Davie beat the full-court press and Hatfield hit a layup for a 37-33

lead. Peterson's putback made it 39-35. Hatfield and Zafetos hit three free throws between them to give Davie a 42-39 lead with 3:20 remaining in the third.

The rest of the game, however, belonged to Central. The Cougars smacked Davie with a 13-0 run to end the third, and that was that.

"We started rushing with about four minutes to go in the second quarter," Key said. "Shots that had been falling quit falling."

"I give them credit. They measured us up, and about 12 minutes into it they decided what they had to do to win. So I'd really just rather give them credit as opposed to saying there's a whole lot we did wrong. They've got a really good team. They're scientific. They've played together a lot. They're what you call a really good high-school basketball team."

Steller's first bucket put her in elite company, becoming the 10th 1,000-point scorer in Davie's 57-year history. She joined Janice Markland (1970), Cathy Hutchens (1977), Deanna Thomas (1979), Jill Amos (1980), Naomi Minwalla (1984), Shawn Smoot (1989), Tami Ramsey (1996) and Meisha Fowler (2008).

Steller averaged 4.2 points as a freshman, 15 as a sophomore and 18.6 as a junior.


For the game, Davie got 17 points and nine rebounds from Hatfield, 14 points from Zafetos, 11 from Steller and 11 from Peterson.



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









North Davie Girls 3-0, Crushing Foes

Optimism and excitement are running at a 21st-century high for the North Davie girls basketball team.

How dominant has North been in the first three games? For one, the Wildcats have won by 53, 25 and 36 points. Secondly, K'lea Parks is averaging 15.6 points ... and she's the third-leading scorer on the team. Madison Bohannon and Ashlyn Hampton are averaging 17.3 and 16, respectively.

In the first North game last week, the Wildcats raced past host Tyro 55-30, coasting home after taking a 47-24 lead into the fourth.

Hampton led the assault with 18 points, followed by Bohannon with 15 and Parks with 14. Zella Ebert added eight.

"Hampton continues to dominate on the inside," coach Trish King said. "She is such a smooth player who can really do it all. She helps us in so many ways - from her intimidating presence on defense to her offensive power inside."

On Bohannon, King said: "Again she set the pace, running the point and beating everyone down the court time after time for a fast-break layup. I am so proud of the leadership and the confidence she displays on the

court. She sees the court so well and can thread the needle with a pass in a heartbeat."

On Parks, King said: "K'lea is also playing strong. She has so much skill and savvy. She too can pass well and does a great job of moving without the ball. Parks, Bohannon and Ebert mesh well on the outside and are constantly communicating."

Later in the week at South Davie, it was more of the same for the Wildcats, who blasted the Tigers 58-22.

Parks (18 points, 5-of-5 foul shooting), Bohannon (14 points) and Hampton (14) scored in double figures for the third time.

The Wildcats are scoring 60.6 points and giving up 22.6. It sounds crazy, but they've had enough points at halftime to win all three games. Against South, they led 32-8 at the half and 47-15 after three.

"K'lea had a strong game," assistant coach Dawn Lowery said. "She is a talented player with a lot of potential. She sees the floor really well, has a nice shot and can run up the floor for fast breaks. Defensively, she is really good at anticipating the pass and comes up with big steals every game."

It's not every year that you have three players scoring in double figures, much less three well above 10.

"Each one of our captains (Bohannon, Parks and Hampton) are leaders on the floor, and they are starting to work really well together," Lowery said. "Some of the plays they make in practice are not normally seen at the middle-school level."

South was led by Jaidyn Bently (10 points), Sha'veh Martinez (eight) and Liz Crenshaw, who didn't score but collected 13 steals. The Tigers, coming off a 30-20 win over Ellis, fell to 1-2.

"South has some tough players," Lowery said. "They focused on defending Hampton in the middle and did a great job. They will give teams some trouble this year."

For North, it's not all about the Big Three. Jessie Beck and Ebert play their roles with vigor.

"Jessie is constantly in the right place at the right time," King said. "She is such a great athlete, grabbing rebounds and kicking the ball out to start our fast break. Whether she scores or not, her presence on the court is a big factor."

"Zella is a huge part of our defensive success," Lowery said. "She is doing a great job

of putting pressure on the ball and making the guards work. We are very pleased with what she is doing for us."

North will become even deeper when Makenzie Smith returns from injury. She has been out all season.

"She fractured her collarbone in practice (before the season)," King said. "Hopefully she will be back soon."



The free community outreach event drew about 350 people, who enjoyed snacks, games and crafts for children to celebrate holidays from around the world.







Two professors from Appalachian set up 40 science stations in the cafeteria that included hands-on activities with engaging, problem solving and critical thinking skills. Students



Beekeeping Course To Be Offered Here

Did you know North Carolina has more backyard beekeepers than any other state? Have you ever considered keeping bees? Would you like to know more about this fascinating hobby?

If you grow flowers or vegetables, a hive of bees can make a world of difference in yield. Even if you don't maintain a garden, keeping bees can be a satisfying hobby, as well as an important contribution to nature's balance.

"There is good reason the state insect of North Carolina is the honeybee; this insect is infinitely important to our agriculture. Through pollination it affects approximately one out of every three bites of food we eat," said Dan Hulbert.

Did you know huge numbers of feral honeybees have died during the last few decades? "Bees are in trouble and need good stewards; backyard beekeepers can make a difference. You can be a part of that difference," he said.

The 8th annual Beginners Beekeeping Short Course will be held at the Davie County Public Library in Mocksville from 9-11:30 a.m. for five consecutive Saturdays beginning Jan. 12. In addition to Saturday morning classes, an "Apiary Day" will follow, allowing participants to look into an active honeybee hive for an in-depth, hands-on view of the activity inside a working hive. Look for workers and drones; perhaps you'll even spot the queen. She may lay 1,000-2,000 eggs a day during the summer months? You'll discover cells with colorful pollen, honey, eggs, and larvae - perhaps even emerging baby bees.

The cost of the "How To Get Started In Beekeeping" course is \$25 or \$20 for DCBA members. Drawings will be held during the classes for bee-related prizes, and two hives will be given away at the conclusion of the course. BERMUDA RUN - A couple of weeks ago, Terry and Christine Bralley stopped by the construction site of the new hospital here. She said all that was missing was an American flag and a Christmas tree.

McConnell, Wake Forest Baptist Medical Center CEO, remembers coming onto the job in 2008 as Baptist and Novant were vying for the right to build a hospital in the eastern Davie and western Forsyth areas. He saw how communities came together - how people came together.

"Be careful what you wish for," Terry Bralley, president of the Davie County Economic Development Commission, said Tuesday, Dec. 11, at a "topping off" ceremony. The ceremony signifies the last piece of steel being erected. It was signed by local residents and the 250 or so construction workers who have been working on the building for months.


Words cannot describe the tragedy that took place last week in Connecticut. In this edition of School Matters, you will find a letter that is being distributed to the parents of all students. There are almost 5,000 recipients of School Matters; some are parents, others are citizens and leaders in our community. I want to take this time to thank you all for your support of our schools.

Dear Parents,
I write to you today with a heavy heart. The events of last week are painful reminders that we must be ever diligent in our efforts to protect our children. I, like many of you, have been through a range of emotions since hearing of the tragic news in Newtown, Conn. I hope you will join me in keeping that entire community in your thoughts and prayers over the coming weeks and months.

Over the weekend, I have been carefully reflecting on the way we handle crises if they arise in our own school district. As your superintendent, and as the parent of two children who attend our public schools, I want to ensure that we are taking every practical step to keep our children safe. You entrust us each day with your most precious asset, your child, and we have an awesome responsibility to keep them safe. I cannot share details of how we respond to every situation involving safety or security, but all of our schools have practiced procedures and conducted drills that are part of a crisis management plan, continuously used throughout the district. Law enforcement and emergency management personnel also have practiced procedures used to support our schools, and we value and welcome this relationship.

We will continue to review safety in our schools because we can never be too prepared. I scheduled a meeting with our school staff and emergency personnel on Monday, Dec. 17. We will begin a comprehensive review of all school safety protocols and communications plans, and brainstorm systems, practices, procedures, and physical changes we may need to implement to make our schools even safer places for our students and staff. School safety is a top priority for Davie County Schools. I want to assure you that our teachers and staff dedicate their lives to not only educating our children, but also to protecting them. You will also see additional law enforcement in and around our schools this week.

Winter Weather Tips

Public Works Department offers the following precautions to help you keep the water flowing this winter.

Insulate pipes or faucets in unheated areas. Pipes in unheated garages, crawl spaces, under the house, or in the attic should be wrapped with insulation before cold weather arrives.

Seal cracks doors, air vents and cracks. Close openings where winter winds could blow over exposed pipes. Do not obstruct air vents needed by your furnace or water heater for proper combustion.

Locate your water shut off valve. If a pipe bursts anywhere in your house, use the master shut off valve to stop the water supply.

Take special precautions when temperatures are low. Leave sink cabinet doors open when temperatures drop. If you are away for several days, leave the heat on in your house while you are away.

Disconnect and drain outdoor hoses. This allows water to drain and prevents the faucet or hose from bursting during a hard freeze. This is also true for backflow prevention assemblies (BPA's). Make sure all BPA's are properly insulated to protect them from cold air.

FOG Alert

FATS, OILS AND GREASE ACCUMULATIONS CAN BLOCK YOUR PRIVATE PLUMBING SYSTEMS AS WELL AS PUBLIC SEWERS

Both residential and business customers can help prevent wastewater overflows by minimizing the amount of FOG disposed of through plumbing drains inside a sewer, fats, oils and grease change to a plaster-like consistency and can block the pipes, causing an overflow of untreated wastewater.

At home, you can dispose of normal cooking oil and grease by putting it in a container as part of your solid waste rather than through your sink and plumbing drain. Wiping and scraping pots, pans and other utensils before washing them are important steps in proper grease disposal.

If your business generates waste grease, fats or oil, you should have a grease interception system that works effectively. A company that recycles fats, oils and grease should regularly clean out the grease trap.



schedule and within budget, McConnell said.

"This will meet the health-care needs of Davie, Western Forsyth and Southern Yadkin counties ... quality healthcare in the right place."

The current construction, a \$79 million investment, includes a 60,000-square-foot medical office building, and 101,000-square-foot emergency department and outpatient surgery and diagnostic imaging services. The offices should be open by late summer, with the outpatient center in the fall.

McConnell said that 200 people will work at the facility when it opens next year.

All property on hand Jan. 1, 2013, both real and personal, is subject to taxation regardless of age and sex of owner.

During the normal listing period taxpayers must list any vehicle that is not licensed (doesn't have a current registration) or that has a permanent multiyear tag as of Jan 1, 2013. Other property you must list is as follows; mobile homes, boats and motors, jet skis, aircraft, farm equipment used to produce income, tools, assets and supplies of a business, furnishings owned and rented by a landlord. Taxpayers should also report any new buildings or any improvements built on real estate, or any changes to real estate.

2013 listing forms will be mailed to taxpayers that listed personal property in 2012. If you do not receive a listing form and need to list property or report changes to real property please contact the Tax Assessor's Office. Forms are available online.

For Real Boys Take Juggernaut To The Wire

After eight games, the Davie boys basketball team had seven blowout wins, the only close shave being a five-point win over Smith.

Olympic - nationally-ranked Olympic, that is - was just the kind of test Davie needed.

Davie visited the Trojans Saturday for a showdown of unbeatens. Davie was 8-0, Olympic, ranked 17th in the nation by maxpreps.com, was 5-0. While Davie reached the final four last year, Olympic lost in the elite eight to West Charlotte, which dispatched Davie en route to state runner-up, Olympic had defeated W. Charlotte twice before losing the third meeting.

The War Eagles didn't come away victorious, falling just short 74-73, but the setback did not diminish them one bit. In fact, the performance validated their stature. Now everyone believes they're truly capable of winning a state championship.

"It was great for our kids," coach Mike Absher said. "You hate to lose, but we grew a lot today. We stood toe to toe with them, and we took their best punch. I scouted them (earlier in the week), and they played really good against us."

Earlier in the week, the War Eagles didn't get much of a test from either opponent. They had little to play for, except to get reserves extended playing time and to improve their record.

In an 82-40 win over an Australian team (Diamond Valley Eagles), the standouts were Austin Hatfield (19 points, five 3-pointers), Cody Martin (12 points, 14 rebounds, 6 assists), Caleb Martin (10 points, 5 assists), Peyton Sell (9 points, 3-of-3 shooting from long range), Kenyon Tatum (8 points), Branson Parnell (8 points), Taylor Hatfield (7 points, 6 assists).

The Australians were playing their second game on their 2012 USA Tour. Last year Davie handled a different Australian squad 85-39.

A home game against North Iredell was another mismatch. Davie won 78-43 as 11 players cracked the scoring column.

Caleb (18 points, 8-of-11 field goals), Taylor (10 points, 4 steals, 4 assists), Austin (8 points, 4 assists), Tatum (8 points), Sell (8 points), Tommy Boyette (7 points), Cade Carney (4 points, 7 rebounds, 4 assists) and Chris Campbell (4 points) gave Davie eight players with at least four points.

The game at vaunted Olympic was an epic showdown in which the gym sold out.

"They closed the doors," Absher said. "They quit selling tickets. For that many people to be at a high-school game on a Saturday afternoon (at 4 p.m.) in Charlotte ... it was a tremendous atmosphere."

Girls Break Through With Three Wins

Davie girls basketball coach Denny Key waited quite a while for this kind of week.

After going 3-21 a season ago, the 2012-13 season is all about regaining respect and making noise in the Central Piedmont Conference.

Key had concerns about how the War Eagles would respond after they stumbled to 2-4, after they lost 69-65 in overtime to West Rowan and 73-55 to Alexander Central. They led late in regulation and overtime against West. They blew an 18-point, first-half lead to Central.

Consider those questions put to rest. Key's Christmas wish list came true: Davie won three games last week for the longest winning streak (three) since a 7-0 start in 2009-10. Davie is a vastly-improved team at 5-4.

"We've had seven straight games where we've had the lead in the second half, and in six of those seven we had the lead in the fourth quarter," Key said. "It's a step in the right direction. This could be a good, solid team before it's over with."

The wins were 52-42 over Diamond Valley (Australia), 60-50 over North Iredell and 72-62 over Olympic.

"At Olympic, it might be the best I've seen us move the ball since I've

been at Davie (three years)," he said. "We missed a lot of open shots, but we had girls give it up who were probably open. But they gave it up to a better shot."

Davie 52, Australia 42
The win over the Australians wasn't a thing of beauty - Davie missed a ton of free throws and committed a bunch of turnovers - but Key wasn't about to complain after suffering back-to-back losses.

"After losing in overtime and losing an 18-point lead, we needed a win," he said. "We had to have a win."

Thanks to Haleigh Hatfield (22 points, 10 rebounds, four steals), Amy Steller (14 points, four assists), Madison Zafaratos (seven points despite being sick) and Asiah Peterson (six points, 10 rebounds), the War Eagles pushed a two-point lead to seven in the third and held on with little trouble.

"First of all, they were not a bad team," Key said. "They were extremely fundamental and had some nice shooters. It was a hard-fought game."

Davie 60, N. Iredell 50
When you beat North Iredell, you have reason to celebrate. North has been good for a long time, and that's why there was a special feeling from knocking off the Raiders.

"We made some pretty awesome shots," Key said. "This was the biggest win we've had since I've been here. I'm

a history teacher; I think a lot about the past and try to learn for the future. Since we didn't get the West Rowan win, we had to have this game. I felt like it was a must win.

"I'm really proud of them because (North) has some really nice players. It's a really nice feeling."

The signature win was a testament to the clutch shooting of Hatfield (25 points, 7-of-12 field-goal shooting, 9-of-9 foul shooting, seven rebounds, three assists, two blocks), Steller (14 points, five rebounds, 6-of-6 free-throw shooting) and Zafaratos (11 points). Hatfield had a season-high 25 in her fourth 20-point effort.

The War Eagles had a double-digit lead before North rallied to within three in the fourth. Davie refused to let it slip away, converting six of 11 field goals and five of five free throws in the fourth. In fact, Davie went 15 of 15 at the line for the game.

The three main scorers (Hatfield, Steller and Zafaratos) combined for 50 of Davie's points.

"Amy and Haleigh both made some key baskets," he said. "They were some baskets that had to be made. That was nice."

"Amy played 32 minutes. She made some full-speed moves (after being plagued by a knee injury in recent weeks).

"(Haleigh hit) an assortment of

shots. "Madison hit three shots in the third quarter. They were all off a move. It wasn't necessarily where she was open. She created space for herself to make the shot."

"For us to be at top efficiency, we need to get 45 points out of those three. All three of them had moments where they created shots for themselves."

When North fought back in the game, the defense of Hatfield and Emerald Gadsdon straightened things out for Davie. Brooke Redmond and Britanni Carter scored 16 each for North, but they were held in check when it mattered most.

"We went man-to-man (with five minutes left)," he said. "We put Haleigh on their big girl (Redmond), and I don't think she scored again. That was size on size. Emerald put a stop on (Carter's 3-point shooting). When the game was still in doubt, Emerald didn't give up a 3."

Gadsdon has become an indispensable defensive player, and she was a major contributor in the second half.

"She didn't play a whole lot in the first half," he said. "I told her coming out of the dressing room: 'You're going to be really big in this win.' And she was. She's such an athlete. She stopped some stuff they were doing."

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


Hogettes Read The Enterprise

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

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


"I told him to wrestle hard," Long said. "I said: 'Let's get a win. All you've got to do is win. No matter what.'"


Robertson worked on him on top and kept him down," Long said. "With forty-something seconds left in the second, he turned him with a power half and pinned him."











Rachel weeping

We have gathered today on an especially somber Sunday, following the horrifying events of Friday in Newtown, Connecticut, where 20 children and six adults perished from gunfire. Children and adults die every hour of every day, from disease and drunk drivers, and more, and death is a part of life. But when so many innocents are murdered, something in our hearts, and I believe it is the spirit of the most holy God, cries out.

We stop, and our throats tighten, and mere words fail us in our attempts to understand and talk about tragedies like this. But prayers, which are made up of words, are carried to the throne of God, who hears our prayers and loves us in our praying.

When we tell the Christmas story this season and any season, we rarely emphasize Herod's slaughter of the innocents, which may have been fewer than Friday morning because of the small size of Bethlehem. The Gospel of Matthew reminds us of the Old Testament prophet Jeremiah's words:

*A voice was heard in Ramah,
Lamentation and bitter weeping.
Rachel is weeping for her children,
She refuses to be comforted,
because they are no more.*

—Jeremiah 31:15

Rachel was front page on the Winston Salem Journal yesterday. Rachel was every teacher in Connecticut. One of Connecticut's elementary school teachers grew up in this congregation, and it is her first year teaching. Rachel was every parent who refuses to be comforted, who knows the inadequacy of human words in the face of such pain.

The pain of Newtown and the Pain of Rachel are both situations in which only God may speak of hope.

Rachel is in the OT weeping and she is in the NT refusing to be comforted and she is on our front page and she is in our heart — and she knows, and we know, that the only hope, the only real hope comes from God.

Rachel, and parents and grieving people who now love children and a school they never knew last week, will only be comforted by God and God alone. The Eternal God who has already gathered up those who have died in God's strong and loving arms. This same God already cradles those whose hearts are cracked open. Today we gather as children of God, as sisters and brothers of Christ, and we gather with Rachel. We gather in the presence of God and we light the Advent candles as a gesture and a prayer for peace and for healing.

We worship God because God asks us to, because we know that together God is present with us in real and powerful ways, and because we know God's spirit in our sisters and brothers reinforces and strengthens God's spirit in us. So today let us pray for our musicians as they lead us, as we pray for all those who need our prayers as we worship God this hour and all our days.



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

On Dec. 8, Zack Baker, member of the Boy Scout Troop 525, held a car wash in Mocksville to raise funds for his Eagle Scout project. Zack chose the Farmington Nature Trail. His plans are to finish the hiking/biking trails that will run through the 65 acre property owned by the Farmington Community Center and provide signs along the trails. Thanks to Zack's hard work and the help of his troop members, he was able to raise \$350 to go toward the cost of signs. He and his troop plan to begin work on the trails in the next few weeks and plans are to have the trails ready for public use by spring of 2013.

The trail is the first phase of what will be the new Farmington Nature Park, owned and operated by the community center, a non-profit organization, which will rely heavily on the help of volunteers.

In April, Robert Stone surveyed the park area. Gary Steele, who chairs the park committee and who serves on the FCA board, worked with Stone to lay out the plans. Steele has worked to organize volunteers to get the hiking/biking trails started and directed the Tour of Farmington event to raise funds for the park.

Soon after the land was surveyed, I had the privilege of planting the first tree for the park. It was a Deodar Cedar tree that had grown from a tree that in Lewisville. The little six foot tree could grow to be 70 feet tall.

Earlier this month, my family, along with the help of Wayne Moyer, a FCA board member, planted 65 Green Giant trees and Nellie Stevens Hollies along the property line. Plans are to continue the line of trees with Leyland Cypress trees in the upcoming weeks

that will complete the required buffer along the north side of the property.

In early spring, mulch will be brought in for the line of planted trees to insure they will have a healthy start to a long life in the park. These projects are a beginning to the many that are ahead that will help the new park to become a place county residents can be proud of.

As you can see, there is a great need for community involvement and support. Once completed, the park will provide a great place for families to enjoy passive recreation as well as provide educational experiences for local students. With the park being within four miles of two schools, it will be a great location for nature walks and educational lessons on local plant and wildlife as well as Farmington history. It will not only be of benefit for local students, but for area college students.

On Nov. 29, I, along with David Mills, who serves on the park committee, met with Dr. Eric Jones, Ph.D, assistant professor for Wake Forest University who works in the department of anthropology. While walking the property, Dr. Jones was excited to see areas of interest and learn about the former Smith family farm and some of Farmington's history. He is planning on bringing his students out in the spring of 2013 to do some excavating of areas of interest and to do some research that will give us some answers to questions such as: Did a portion of the old wagon road that ran through Pudding Ridge come by Cedar Creek which borders the property?

Was there a Smith family cemetery on the property? Once the group has had a chance to study the area, they plan to have an open meeting at the community center so local residents can come to hear what they've discovered. It's exciting

'Landed Wings' Early College Junior Publishes First Book

Davie County Early College High School junior, author Skylurh Tranquille's book, "Landed Wings," (cover art created by fellow 16-year-old artist Megan Fansler), is available as a paperback and/or e-book on Amazon and Kindle. The paperback version of the book can be found at The Book Rack on Main Street in Mocksville, the Davie, Forsyth and Guilford County library systems, Ellis Middle and the Davie High media centers.

"Landed Wings" was birthed after a year of 15 rough drafts, 40 revisions, and endless sleepless nights. Originally titled, "Born to Sing," Skylurh's vision for the book evolved significantly from the first draft. Skylurh explained her original concept.

"My original story was about a girl whose parents paid a doctor to genetically modify their unborn child. The mother in the story always wanted to be a singer but she didn't have the natural talent. She figured if she could create a child who would naturally be able to sing, she could make that child a star.

"The results of the manipulation were unexpected, their daughter, "xxxxx," did have an impressive singing voice but she could not just speak. Every communication was in song. She was labeled disabled as a result and walked around with her disability card.

"She knew her parents were the cause of her condition so she rebelled against the idea that she would be a

songstress. She decided she would be a dancer and tattoo artist.

"In the story she is a teenager and her name is Latin for song. I spent a lot of time working on how to get the audience to 'hear' xxxxx sing and the relationship xxxxx had with her mother. One day, after writing about 80

pages, I read over the story and hated it. I copied all and deleted the whole thing."

Skylhur decided to keep one element from the original manuscript, a title character with impressive vocal cords.

"The final version of the book kind

of took a life of its own. Instead of writing with an end in mind, this time, I just kept writing without having any idea what was going to happen next. I knew there were things I wanted to have in the book no matter what. I wanted some of my characters to fly, I've always seen flying as the ultimate

freedom and I wanted my characters to feel that freedom. I wanted to keep the idea of manipulating genes in my story but I decided that people would want to manipulate genes for a good cause. I thought about how much I hate doing chores - if I could fly, could anyone make me do chores? Probably not. If a lot of people could fly and be free, who could make them stay still to do what people needed to be done to keep society going?

"With total freedom and no obligation, eventually society would fall apart so I needed people who had to find a solution to that problem. This is kind of like the problem of overpopulation, some people believe it's a problem and some of those people may be working on a solution. The rest of us have no idea what their possible solutions are but we would all be affected if they act on their ideas for decreasing the population."

Character development was important.

"I wanted my teen characters to sound like real teenagers. In the early drafts the characters were very real and my mom said no. We had a lot of loud discussions (that's what she calls arguments) about the language the characters used. I kept telling that's how teenagers talk and she kept saying that adults don't want to know that. She said if my brother can't read it (he's 11) it won't work. I'm 16 and still live at home so she won.

"I wrote the book from perspective of each character so I wrote from



from the perspective of a 9-year-old girl, 17-year-old girl, a 17-year-old boy, a 19-year-old boy, a 40-something mother, a 40-something leader of the rebels and a scared 4-year-old boy. In my early versions the boy characters sounded like girls so I asked my dad for help making them sound more like men. My mother (who wants me to make it clear she is not the mother character at all) did help with the fight scene between Ashlynn and her mom. When I first wrote it, Ashlynn had these great one liners that left her comebacks. It was a teenager's dream of how arguments with parents should go. After she read the section, she asked me when I've ever seen or heard an argument go like that. I thought about it for a second. Never. I went back and reworked the scene. Ashlynn still has some great one liners but the mom "doesn't sit back and just take it so it's more realistic."

Once the story developed, Skylurh realized it would take more than one book to tell the

story. "I started to really fall in love with the characters and they became complex people in my head. They all had their own story, their own reasons for doing what they did and I wanted to explore what happens to them. They are in the same place I'm in right now, not a child but not really an adult. Are they going to be the same people they are now when they become adults or are they going to change? I starting thinking about my adult characters too, why are they the way they are? Was Cocoa (one of my bad characters) always evil? Was Ginger always so cold? What happens to Ashlynn? With Ashlynn, I want a strong female character that doesn't lose her strength because of life circumstances but instead gains strength."

"I don't know yet what happens in book two but I am half way through the Prequel of 'Landed Wings' where I answer a lot of questions about why the world is the way it is by the time we get to 'Landed Wings.' I now know the relationship between Ginger and Cocoa and

how they came to be. I'm still working out how I'm going to continue book two, 'Broken Wings.' I thought I would take the characters years into the future but I orchestrated the certain death of one of the characters in book one. I'm either going to have to cure them, have them participate in flashbacks, or write the book in real time. I'm not sure yet."

"On the concept for the cover. I had just finished perusing in the play Aladdin at the Clemmons Library when I saw Megan. We started talking about my recent trip to Ecuador and somehow we started talking about the book I was writing. I knew that she was a graphic artist and we talked about her creating the book cover art for me. I told her my concept of hiding the face so that the reader would have to guess what emotion the girl on the ground might be feeling. I gave her an early unedited copy of the book to read to get a sense of the characters. It was a really rough draft but I didn't tell her it was a draft, not the final version. There were a lot of problems with that draft, I had

characters who were not supposed to be alive in later chapters, characters who had different last names in different parts of the book even though they were the same character. I think Megan was concerned about what the book was going to be like but she sent me samples anyway through Facebook. She was able to bring my concept for the cover out perfectly. "I am working on the prequel to Landed Wings along with the sequel. I still write poetry and upload those works to my website, www.landedwings.com, where I have also uploaded free chapters from the book. I'll be keeping my blog updated on the process of writing the next books. Dalia Razo is translating the book into Spanish and I'm hoping to have an audio version of the book done by next year. "It's a lot of work between that and my school work at the Early College but I'm really enjoying the process and appreciate all the support I've gotten from everyone so far."

Holt, Mrs. Howard, and Mrs. Moore's classes have been traveling all over the world learning about Christmas traditions. Students were introduced to Hanukkah and Kwanzaa and learned about Christmas traditions in Mexico. There has been a lot of craft making on the kindergarten hall. The children look like little elves making gifts for their families and friends.

Mrs. Welch and Mrs. Judd's first graders have been busy in Santa's Workshop. During this economics unit, students learned about wants and needs, scarcity, division of labor, goods and services and producers and consumers. Students took on the role of producers and earned wages making goods during Santa's Workshop. They deposited their money at the bank each day. At the conclusion of the unit, students withdrew their savings and became consumers.

Second grade classes of Mrs. Collins, Ms. Hicks, Ms. Howard and Mrs. Spade have been learning to subtract two-digit numbers with and without regrouping. They have been studying economics. Students prepared for a Holiday Market where they were able to purchase items they made in class. Students read The Signmaker's Assistant and Rosa and Blanca - two stories that help them learn more about goods and services.

Ms. Micalle's class has been reading about the history of Washington, DC. Students conducted research on the various monuments, museums and memorials located there and created brochures. Some of the brochures include fun places for kids to visit as well as local restaurants and hotels. One unit of study in the social studies curriculum for fourth grade is North Carolina settlements. Since close to Bethabara, Bethania, and Old Salem, they are learning and studying Moravian heritage. They are finding out that living in the 1700s was different from today. Children had jobs to do before they went to school and more jobs when they got home from school. Moravian business men used pictures instead of words on their shop signs because everyone could not read. Students are choosing a pretend profession and making their own shop signs. They will

conclude this unit of study with a Moravian Lovefeast. In math, they continue to work on multiplication and division. One class enjoyed learning lattice multiplication.

Coolseemee Elementary Kindergartners are studying how children celebrate Christmas around the world and about the other holidays celebrated during the winter such as Hanukkah and Kwanzaa. Each class is learning about how the children celebrate these holidays, they complete a craft, and share a snack that is typically served during that holiday. They are writing letters to Santa, making special gifts for families and learning about wants and needs. In Letterland, they met a Quarrelsome Queen (letter Q) and a Red Robot (letter R). First grade students will have two presentations. Mrs. Guzman will present to each first grade class on Christmas in the Dominican Republic. 


County Seeks Permit

It Could Take Five Years To Get Eastern Davie Wastewater Treatment Plant

County commissioners earlier this month took the first step toward opening a new wastewater treatment plant in eastern Davie.

They unanimously directed staff to seek permits for a plant that could discharge 750,000 gal-

lons (gpd) of treated wastewater into the Yadkin River every day.

"This solution could take up to five years before the plant comes on line," said County Manager Beth Dirks. "That's why we want to get the ball rolling." She said the 750,000 gpd will not only serve current needs, but allow for growth. The plant will be designed

so that it could be expanded.


Now, Davie contracts with the Winston-Salem Forsyth Utilities Commission to treat 550,000 gallons a day. That contract ends in 2030. The county uses about 250,000 gpd, but only about 100,000 gallons is available because of other contracts. Private developers helped build the cur-

rent system, and hold rights to some of the capacity even though it isn't being used.

The numbers include expected usage from Ashley Furniture and Wake Forest Baptist Health's hospital under construction in Bermuda Run. It also retains an allocation for the Creekwood development because of failing sep-


tic tanks, Dirks said.

Commissioners haven't tackled the issue of rates. A consultant told them earlier this year to expect rates to increase dramatically to pay for this or any other improvement to the system. Those consultants also said that improvements will have to be made because of stricter water quality regulations.

**Round And Around
On The Roundabout
Plans Going Slow, But Still A
Go At Bermuda Run Entrance**

BERMUDA RUN - For one final time in 2012, the town council here received another update on the roundabout on US 158.

The traffic-calming device entering the town after crossing the bridge over the Yadkin River will become a reality one of these days, hopefully in 2013.

Lee Rollins, town manager told council members in the Dec. 11 meeting that he was on a conference call with DOT officials in Winston-Salem and Raleigh regarding the project and what has admittedly been proceeding at a deliberate pace.

"It's still moving forward," Rollins said. "Because federal funds are part of the equation, we had to go through a process where we were painstakingly informed of all the dotted 'i's' and crossed 't's' as it relates to their accounting and audit trail. I wanted to have it before Christmas."

Rollins said he hoped to be able to get a request for qualifications to engineering firms in the next couple of weeks and make a selection after the first of the year.

"Then we can begin looking at the official design of that project."

The total estimated cost is \$510,000, which will be constructed at the Bermuda Run entrance across from BB&T Soccer Park. For its part, Bermuda Run is providing a 20 percent local match of \$102,000.

The council passed a resolution over a year ago supporting the transfer of funds previously allocated for the U.S. 158/N.C. 801 intersection improvement project to the roundabout. The Winston-Salem Urban Area Metropolitan Planning Organization (MPO) approved the shift in funds in March.

In other business, the council approved an ordinance regulating the keeping and maintenance of exotic and non-domesticated animals.

Rollins said that most homeowners associations regulate having these kinds of animals but that the ordinance will provide consistency throughout Bermuda Run.

In addition to non-domesticated

animals, such as fowl, horses, goats, hogs and snakes, exotic animals, including alligators, crocodiles, eagles, hawks, large cats, bears and monkeys will be prohibited.

"See you later, alligator," commented councilman Ed Coley after the ordinance passed.

The council also:
• Approved an amendment to the existing ordinance regulating public nuisances. This updates the original ordinance adopted in 2008 to include overgrown lots and lot maintenance for owners of vacant lots adjacent to improved properties, except in heavily wooded areas.

• Approved an ordinance to regulate maintenance of right-of-ways.
• Approved the 2013 council meeting calendar to continue meeting on the second Tuesday night of the month at 7 p.m.

• Saw the new town branding logo that was unveiled at the start of the meeting.

• Heard from Mayor Ken Rethmeier, who talked about the celebration of the raising of the last steel beam for the Wake Forest Baptist West Campus in Davie County and the impressive ceremony earlier that day. He also discussed the positive strides made by the town in 2012. "I think this year marks a significant change in direction, and we're going to keep moving forward, and we're going to keep growing," Rethmeier said. "This town is going to be something to behold."

In the November meeting, the council:

• Approved an agreement with NCDOT for a sidewalk and landscape project that will connect the U.S. 158 Yadkin River bridge to the forthcoming roundabout. The installation will be paid by NCDOT. The town agrees to maintain the sidewalk and landscaping upon installation.

• Approved a proposal from CCL Branding for the development of a new town website that will reflect the town's new branding logo.

• Approved a donor directed fund agreement with the Davie Community Foundation, which allows the naming of the Hillsdale Tomorrow Fund to be renamed the Bermuda Run Community Vision Fund.

Closing 2012: A Promising Year; Hope for 2013

It has been a year. Not the best, not the worst by far. In 2012, things started to turn around from a latent recession. A stately new hospital is being built in Bermuda Run. Promising new industries chose Davie County for their homes. Ashley Furniture was the biggest prize. And the high school issue remains ...unresolved. We lose count: Has it been 12 years or 15 that this debate has lingered? Readers often accuse us of recycling headlines from year to year about the dreams of a new high school.

Indeed, the school board members win the prize: Most Optimistic.

There's hope, albeit faint. New plans are on the drawing board, but much of the cast of characters in this long-running play has changed little. For some, the sun rises and sets on the high school issue.

Former school board chair Marty Carter said recently the argument for building a new school may have focused on the wrong incentive. We have always argued that a new school would promote better education. Instead, Carter argues that a new school may be far more important as a tool for shaking the county out of the economic doldrums — as a way of increasing property values, selling homes and stimulating the economy.

He says voters understand pocketbook issues.

Certainly, Davie has been stained by the protracted debate about the high school. Outsiders know just enough of our bickering to often think we are nuts.

Will we finally agree on a remedy for Davie High in 2013? The odds are only slightly better than those offered that the world would end on Dec. 21 based on an ancient Mayan calendar.

The future is bright on other fronts.

WinMock's refurbished barn offers a stunning gateway to Davie from the east.

The long, painful recession that has gripped the nation continued to have its influence on us. Real estate remained well below the go-go days.

Politics was on our minds during 2012. Davie County voters backed Mitt Romney over President Obama by a commanding 71-29 percent, but that only served to demystify Davie is out of the national mainstream. President Obama easily won re-election.

Deep in a story last week about Bermuda Run we reported the comments of new mayor Ken Rethmeier, "I think this year marks a significant change in direction, and we're going to keep moving forward, and we're going to keep growing. This town is going to be something to behold."

The winter was not awfully cold nor the summer terribly hot. Gas prices spiked and then fell to a more bearable figure, but \$3-a-gallon now seems cheap.

Life in Davie County is good — for most of us. Yet a portion of the population exists without the basics. It is this population that a group of Davie High School students and faculty have identified and are seeking to help — and we hope that you will join in this project. Often due to age this group of students is forgotten or overlooked. We are Davie High Hunger Fighters, and our mission is to see that students do not go without food and hygiene items throughout the school week and anytime school is not in session.

Currently we have 43 families that accept help from us. This has not been easy for them, as just like you and I, they have their pride. But hunger changes everything — especially hunger in children. These families have been caught by the economic downturn and have no way to provide for their own personal needs. This is when Davie High Hunger Fighters step in. All assistance to families is kept confidential at all times.

We as a group cannot exist without donations from

businesses and groups such as yours. It costs roughly \$250 a year to feed one student through our program. To sponsor all 43 families for one month it costs \$860 (name brand, non food bank food cost). However, with the food bank we are able to drop this price considerably. We always need packaged food items and personal hygiene products — such as toothpaste, toothbrushes, deodorant, soap, Band-Aids, shaving cream, etc. Packaged goods such as canned soups, canned vegetables, Easy-Mac, grits, oatmeal, packaged fruit, etc. also help to provide nutritious meals.

We have already made sure that each family has a microwave for basic cooking methods. The faculty members of Davie High Hunger Fighters deliver the donations to the families after school. We have our operational procedures in place; now all we need is you.

Please consider donating food and hygiene items to the Davie High Hunger Fighters as we assist not only these families, but also as we widen our scope to assist more families. Certainly we hope that the economy recovers enough so that these people will once again be self-sufficient, but in the meantime, they have us — and hopefully you.

walked 3,300 miles across America. They raised money for the charity, www.charitywater.org.

Now, you can read about the young family's journey with Angel's book, "Water Walk America."

They had been saving money for a down payment on a house, but decided to use the money for a higher purpose - helping others. They're back home now,

better people for the experience.

"The book talks about what it was like - what it was like getting out of our comfort zone of backyard America," she said. "It's a Christian story. That's what got us through six months of mostly living out of our car."

Brook walked every step of the way, through three mountain ranges, across deserts, along desolate highways, through cities and small towns. He wore out five pairs of shoes. Angel and K.O. would drive ahead, maybe look for a place to stay or find a park where K.O. could play.

What they found made them proud to be Americans.

"We would talk to people and they would just hand us money," she said. "I love the American people. You get bad apples ... but we're such a generous, thoughtful and kind people."

Help didn't always come

from where it was expected. Children, not used to seeing strange faces in some remote areas, would walk up to them and ask why they're there. They told them - and got help. Poor people were quick to offer whatever they could, because they know what it's like to do without, Angel said.

"It was very refreshing ... no matter your race or political affiliation, religion or bank account, it didn't matter. We had savings, but we still needed help. We relied on people to host us, feed us, give us tips on where to camp."

"It made me realize that God uses the least of us. That was one of the biggest rewards of the walk. I don't put up with people saying they don't like America. It's changed our whole family."

"When one of us would get down, the other would say go on. That was God working through us. We know this is just the beginning for us."

"It was exciting to write about. It's kind of like my second baby. It's a joyful relief that I could see the project to its conclusion."

Angel wrote some along the way, often searching some strange places to plug in her laptop. She finished after they got home - and attended a gala in New York City for the charity. That's a separate story, a personal one that is the final chapter of the book.

And you don't sleep along the side of the road, in barns and in your vehicle with a toddler without plenty of stories - amusing and frustrating. K.O. still likes to howl at the moon, a habit they picked up to pass the time at night at their makeshift camps.

"It's a fun book. You can't have those life experiences without comical incidents," she said. She had fireworks for her birthday in Utah (It was Pioneer Days, and fireworks were everywhere.). She got strep throat

twice. There were blisters, chafing and route changes. They had chicken wings for their anniversary (It was the nicest restaurant in the town at that time.)

And the weather. From May 23-Nov. 19, they saw no, they felt - it all. Temperatures ranged from 15° to 115°.

At times, they ran short on water and had to ration. It brought their reason for the walk back to life.

"Water changes everything," Angel said. "You can't cook your food, use the bathroom. You can't live without water - clean water."

She thinks about the reason for the walk, and the benefits. "Where would I be without water, and where would I be without God?"

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Notice of Davie County Tax Listing

All property on hand Jan. 1, 2013, both real and personal, is subject to taxation regardless of age and sex of owner.

During the normal listing period taxpayers must list any vehicle that is not licensed (doesn't have a current registration) or that has a permanent multiyear tag as of Jan 1, 2013. Other property you must list is as follows; mobile homes, boats and motors, jet skis, aircraft, farm equipment used to produce income, tools, assets and supplies of a business, furnishings owned and rented by a landlord. Taxpayers should also report any new buildings or any improvements built on real estate, or any changes to real estate.

2013 listing forms will be mailed to taxpayers that listed personal property in 2012. If you do not receive a listing form and need to list property or report changes to real property please contact the Tax Assessor's Office. Forms are available online.

Exclusions - must be 65 or older OR totally and permanently disabled to apply

- Elderly and Disabled Exclusion**
 - Income must be \$28,100 or below
 - Must be 65 or older OR totally and permanently disabled
 - Reduction of \$25,000 or 50% of value of home and 1 acre of land
- Disabled Veterans Exclusion**
 - No income cap
 - Must be honorably discharged
 - Must have a 100% service related disability
 - Reduction of \$45,000 in value of home and 1 acre of land
- Circuit Breaker**
 - Income must be \$42,150 or below
 - Must be a legal North Carolina resident and have owned and occupied property as your permanent legal residence for five years

If you are currently receiving an exclusion you do not need to reapply. If you would like to apply you may request an application from the Tax Assessor's office. Applications are also online.

Boys Pull Away At Lexington

LEXINGTON - When the Davie boys basketball team hits its stride, it's like a sports car you'd die for - shiny, fast, low miles, not a scratch and man, can that thing go.

The War Eagles didn't dominate long stretches of last week's game at Lexington. They didn't have to because they put together a five-minute masterpiece in the third quarter that all but settled the issue in an eventual 75-68 victory.

Lexington fell to 3-7. Davie improved to 9-1, which is good karma considering it had the same record at this point last year en route to a school-record 23 wins.

In the first meeting in Mocksville, Davie cruised 87-68 after leading by as many as 25 in third. This was a much different game.

In the first half the War Eagles ran into speed bumps, suffered hiccups

and were a shell of their normal selves as Caleb and Cody Martin were under the weather.

The Martins didn't start. Kurtis Banner and Peyton Sell replaced both in the starting lineup. Davie missed 11 of 13 field goals in the first quarter and faced a 15-9 deficit. It parlayed an 18-8 run into a 27-23 halftime lead, but Lexington went into the locker room feeling good and thinking about a major upset. And the home side of a packed-house crowd was loving it.

Davie came in averaging 42.8 points in the first half. "We played our worst game of the year," Austin Hatfield told The Dispatch.

"(The Martins) didn't practice yesterday," Davie coach Mike Absher said. "They were out of school all day. They were in school enough today to be able to play. I tried to sit them at the beginning to frontload some minutes for them."

Girls' Rally Too Little, Too Late

LEXINGTON - Well, that was fun while it lasted.

Going into last week's varsity girls basketball game at Lexington, Davie had won three straight. And it had to like its chances for a fourth considering it defeated the Yellow Jackets 63-51 in Mocksville.

The War Eagles were as high as they've been under coach Denny Key (they hadn't won three straight during his tenure before beating the Australians, North Iredell and Olympic). But they were brought down by Lexington 76-65.

For the first time in three years, Davie scored 60-plus points in three consecutive games. The flip side: It allowed the most points in 52 games,

going back to a 75-36 loss to Thomasville in 2010-11.

But Lexington was a more potent team than the one that squandered a nine-point halftime lead in Mocksville. This time it had 6-footer Jasmine Carter, a College of Charleston signee who didn't play in the first meeting. She made a huge difference, scoring 19 points and grabbing 10 rebounds. Lexington has quite a 1-2 punch in the middle when you throw in 6-footer Alex Fowler, who went for a double-double as well with 22 points and 11 boards.

"Not only did they have (Carter), but they made some lineup changes," Key said. "They were a totally different team. I'm interested to see how they do in the Garber (tournament). They're not a bad team right now. They're 3-4, but they're not a bad team at all."

Swagger To Stagger: Wrestling Slumps To 12-11

The Davie wrestling program was seemingly immune to a stretch of losing more than just every once in a while. But it's apparent that nobody can sustain so much injury and sickness without suffering a recession.

The War Eagles are simply undermanned. Things look grim with Davie at 12-11 after going 2-3 at Newton Conover. They've matched the most losses in coach Buddy Lowery's 37-year career. The 2006-07 team finished 25-11. It would take a miracle for Davie to avoid the most losses since Lowery arrived at Davie in 1976.

In the meet at Newton Conover, Daniel Wilson and Cameron Coleman

returned from the shelf ... but Davie was missing Logan Cartner (11-6 record), Nathan Howard (7-2) and Corbin Kopetzky (6-3), among others.

"One comes back, two leave," a frustrated Lowery said. "One comes, two leave. It's just been one of those years. You can't even keep up with who you've got wrestling and what weight class because you don't know who's out there. What do you do? Heck, do you practice? We will either get somebody hurt or get ringworm."

After dominating McDowell 54-24, the War Eagles lost 31-28 to Enka, 52-18 to Jack Britt and 38-36 to Newton Conover. Davie closed with a 59-18 win over East Lincoln.

The loss to Enka was a heartbreaker, the score tied at 28 going into the final weight class. Newton Conover's 38-12

lead was closed to two, but Newton didn't care because Davie was mathematically defeated when the spread was 26.

To illustrate how things have gone, Davie beat both Jack Britt (45-30) and Newton Conover (41-32) the first time the teams met.

"We've been taking some butt whoopings," Lowery said. "And I don't like it. And I am grumpy. You can't wrestle freshmen and sophomores against juniors and seniors. We wrestled pretty good against McDowell, but we got our hearts broke (by Enka). We've got to get tough. I'm not doubting that we're hurtin' some, but our feelings are hurtin' more than our bodies."

Davie did get stellar performances from Alex Gobble (5-0) and Craig

Moore (4-0). But they were the only War Eagles to go undefeated for the day.

Isaiah Whitley, Lake Billings, Luis Hernandez, Wilson, Jack Robertson and Parker Correll went 3-2. Ryan Smith went 2-1 and Preston Beauchamp 2-2. The other six guys went a combined 1-13.

Davie's 17 wrestlers combined for a 34-35 mark, with four of the losses being forfeits. Oddly enough, Davie had far more pins than opponents (24 to nine).

In the down-to-the-wire loss to Enka, Davie got three of the four pins in the match - but lost eight of 14 weight classes.

Beauchamp, Coleman and Gobble had the pins. Moore, Billings and Wilson won decisions.

It was 28-28 when Correll, a sophomore at 220, faced a stud who dropped down from heavyweight. The Enka dude was ranked fourth in the state in 3-A at heavyweight.

Correll met the challenge, only to lose 3-2 in double overtime. It was 1-1 after three periods. Neither guy scored in the first overtime. In the first 30 seconds of the second OT, Correll got an escape for a 2-1 lead. In the final 15 seconds, Enka got a reversal near the out-of-bounds line to hand Correll - and Davie - a painful loss.

Notes: Among the winning records individually: Gobble 20-1, Smith 16-2, Robertson 16-7, Correll 15-7, Moore 13-6, Billings 13-10 and Wilson 5-2. ... Davie's next tournament is Dec. 28-29 in the King of the Mat at North Davidson.

Worth Noting ...

In the Davie boys' 74-73 loss at Olympic, Caleb Martin had just the fifth triple-double in school history with 23 points, 12 assists and 11 rebounds. In a 75-68 win at Lexington, Davie was led by Caleb (22 points, 14 rebounds, 5 assists) and Austin Hatfield (18 points, 6 rebounds, 4 assists).

Quin Holland, Michael Mebel and Nick Sinopoli won two individual events each as Davie boys swimming scored 141 points to beat S. Rowan (116) and Statesville (41).

Davie wrestlers Alex Gobble and Craig Moore went 5-0 and 4-0, respectively, in a meet at Newton Conover.

Although the Davie varsity girls lost 76-65 at Lexington, Amy Steller scored 25 points - her 18th career 20-point game - by hitting four 3s and 9 of 9 free throws. Haleigh Hatfield added 19 points on 12-of-16 foul shooting.




