H.C. Gregory, known as Clausell to most, was born in northeastern Davie County near the community of Farmington on 18 September, 1907. His early years were spent in and around Farmington and he was educated in the schools of the period.

The Farmington area figured prominently in his life. It was there that he met the girl that would become his wife, and in that area he would spend the rest of his life.

Clausell Gregory learned the carpentry trade from his father-in-law, John C. James and became a master carpenter. Through this trade and through farming, he began raising a family in the hardest times his country had ever seen.

H.C. Gregory held a life-long interest in the affairs of his community. He was a member of the Bethlehem Methodist Church, a Ruritan, and was instrumental in the organization of the Farmington Volunteer Fire Department; one of the first such units in the county. Always a student of politics and government, Gregory served several years on the Davie County Board of Elections. His main avocation, other than his family, was horses. He was quite proud of his team of Arabians and the several antique buggies and wagons he had restored.

He died Monday, 9 January, 1984.

Much is written about those rich or famous while the ordinary good citizen is often taken for granted. Clausell Gregory was rich way beyond the material sense and he was famous in that he, like so many others before him, typified the man that is the so-called backbone of this country: good citizen, good husband, good father, good friend. He set a fine example for all who knew him.

I went on to play many hundreds of basketball games, enjoyed many victorious moments but none any greater than that goal I scored against RJR on that pass from Sheek Miller.

Sheek Miller was a person with many friends. He enjoyed life and had a unique sense of humor. Being a restaurateur brought him in contact with all types of people, but he never had an enemy, just friends.

His father, C. V. "Pop" Miller got his family in the restaurant business in 1937 opening a barbecue place on US 158 at the intersection of the Farmington Road. This was destroyed by fire July 4, 1941.

In the meantime, Buck Miller, the eldest son, opened a place known as Southend (now the site of Fallie's Drycleaning) 8 years before Pearl Harbor. With the outbreak of World War II, Buck closed down the restaurant and went to work in the ship yards.

Sheek Miller went into the army.

When Buck and Sheek returned following the war, they found that their father had reopened Southend. Sheek remained with his father at Southend and Buck moved on to rebuild and open Buck's Barbecue on US 158.

Sheek and "C" Ward bought out "Pop" at Southend. Later Sheek sold his interest to "C" and in 1952 opened the Miller Diner-Restaurant on US 64 West. "C" operated Southend for several years and then built his own building across the street, his present location.

For 28 years Sheek Miller, and other members of his family, operated what became one of Mocksville's most popular eating places. It was also a place for local businessmen to gather and discuss problems of the day over cups of coffee.

On December 24, 1980, the Miller Diner-Restaurant was sold to Leonard "Butch" Gregory who continued to operate it under the famous Miller name.

Commenting on the sale at that time Sheek Miller said:

"After 28 years, I felt it was time to give it up. This restaurant has been good to me, and I appreciate the support of local people in making it a success. There are a lot of memories here."

And, a lot of people will always cherish a lot of pleasant memories of Sheek Miller.
