Bob Foster

Robert Lee (Bob) Foster, 73, of 763 Yadkinville Road, died Tuesday morning at the Davie County Hospital following a long illness.

The funeral will be conducted Thursday at 11 a.m. at Eaton's Funeral Chapel. Burial will be in Turrentine Baptist Church cemetery. The family will be at the funeral home Wednesday from 7 to 9 p.m.

He was born in the Farmington section on June 15, 1910, son of James Robert and Carrie Bassett Foster. He was owner of Foster Shell Service of the Yadkinville Road, a member of the Farmington United Methodist Church, the Veterans of Foreign Wars. He was a veteran of World War II section action in the South Pacific.

His first wife, Sue Deadmon Foster died July 3, 1970. Survivors include his second wife, Beulah Boger Foster; a son, Dr. Bob M. Foster of Mocksville; a sister, Mae Phelps of Rt. 4, Mocksville; a brother, John Frank Foster of Homestead, Fla.; and three grandchildren.

He was a man in love with his work. He felt an enthusiasm for it, which in the words of William Dean Howells—"enthusiasm—for which nothing but the work we can do well inspires in us."

For 35 years Robert Lee Foster, known to his many friends as Bob, operated a Shell oil dealership combined with a grocery store next to his home on the Yadkinville Highway. During these years he not only gave top personal care and service to all vehicles entrusted to him—but, as one person observed upon hearing of his death Tuesday morning:

"Bob Foster was a man that would go out of his way to be a friend—to give the shirt off his back. He put more groceries on tables of people in need than you could write a book about—and he did it without a second thought about whether or not he would ever receive any pay—and probably in most cases didn't."

A veteran of World War II (1943-1946) he participated in the liberation of New Guinea, the Philippines, and other areas of the South Pacific. He was the recipient of three Bronze Stars, the Victory Medal, and the Good Conduct Medal.

He returned home in 1946 to his wife, the former Sue Elizabeth Deadmon, and a teenage son in his final years of high school.

He built his place of business beside his home and put in long, hard hours six days each week. Working after school and on Saturdays, his son made it a joint effort.

Bob and Sue Elizabeth Deadmon, who were married on Christmas Eve in 1931, had only one child. This son wanted to become a doctor. The devoted parents were determined he would have the chance. He did—receiving his medical degree from the Bowman Gray School of Medicine with the highest grade average ever recorded at that school at that time.

There was a closeness in this family that many such parental relationships do not experience. Following the death of the mother on July 3, 1970, the close affinity continued between father and son.

On October 16, 1971 Bob Foster, with his son's blessing married Beulah Boger who became not only a wife, but a constant companion in his business operations.

In 1960 Bob Foster built a greenhouse and started raising plants and flowers as a hobby. By 1965 this had become a business sideline—and Bob Foster became known as the man with a "green thumb." His yard was always a showplace, well manicured with an abundance of pretty flowers.

Count Bismarck once observed:

"A really good man is known by three signs—generosity in design, humanity in execution, moderation in success."

And Wordsworth once said:

"The best portions of a good man's life is his little nameless, and often unremembered acts of kindness and love."

This was Bob Foster.

Soils - A Natural Resource

A natural resource often overlooked and abused are our soils. Many attempts have been made to define soils. Definitions vary according to the individual you talk with. For example, agronomists may define soil as a growth media. Geologist may refer to soil as the weathered portion of the earth's crust. Engineers might look at soils as the unconsolidated material above bedrock. A planner might describe soil as a natural resource with various uses and potentials. Soil is the product of the combined efforts of plants and animals, climate, topography, time and parent material. These factors determine the unique characteristics of the natural soil bodies.

Organic matter accumulation, nutrient cycling and structural stability are made possible by the presence of plants and animals. For example, nitrogen is added to the soil system by micro-organisms alone or in association with plants. Vegetative cover helps reduce erosion thereby slowing down the rate of surface removal.

Climate is perhaps the most influential factor. Temperature and precipitation have profound influences on the chemical and physical processes. Climatic influences are often expressed through or in combination with other factors. In humid areas plentiful rain is favorable for the growth of trees while grasslands are the dominant vegetation in semiarid areas.

The influence of topography is the formation of soils in seen most often by interacting with other factors. The rolling topography in some areas encourages natural erosion and may eliminate the possibility of a deep soil. In areas, where it is flat and water is not readily removed, climatic influences may become relatively ineffective in regulating soil development.

The time that materials are subject to weathering plays a significant role in soil formation.

have moderate to very high shrink-swell potential. Cracked foundations, failed septic systems, and large clods on surface if improperly plowed are common problems unless steps are taken to overcome these problems.

The Davie County Soil Survey began in July, 1982, to map various soils in the county. It will take approximately four years to complete the field work. Following completion of the field work, the soil maps with a manuscript describing the soils will be published. Soil information can be obtained in the meantime by contacting the Soil Conservation Service. The Davie County Soil Survey is a cooperative program supported by the County Commissioners, Soil Conservation Services, and the Division of Soil and Water in the Department of Natural Resources & Community Development.

Fears Prove Correct; Son Is Killed In Beirut

The wait is over for a Davie County family fearing the worst for their son on duty in Beirut, Lebanon Sunday, October 23.

Marine officials confirmed Wednesday that Cpl. Charles Dennis Cook, 21, of 247 Claybon Drive in Davie Gardens near Farmington, was among more than 200 Marines killed when a truck carrying thousands of pounds of explosives crashed into Marine headquarters.

It was Wednesday, October 26 that his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles F. Cook, learned of their son's fate. His body was found hours earlier beneath the rubble of the former Marine headquarters site in Lebanon.

That morning the most dreaded sight of Charles F. Cook's, a retired Marine Sgt. Major, became a reality. At 8:15 a.m. October 26, three Marines in crisp, forest green uniforms and highly polished shoes visited the family at their home on Claybon Drive. They learned it is believed their son was on duty at the time of the explosion occurred and died instantly in the blast. Dennis was a radio operator. The communications radios were on the ground floor.

Dennis had been in Lebanon since April. He was to return to the United States November 15. He would have been 22 years old on November 22.

"I knew that was it," Cook said Wednesday when he saw the car bearing the Marine emblem pull into his driveway. "But you always hope," he said, his voice cracking.

Grief stricken, Cook made little comment about his feelings on U.S. Marines on duty in Beirut. "I'm not bitter towards the Marine Corp," he said. "But as far as I'm concerned my son is worth more than any of those people in Lebanon. But that's not the issue, he added. "The issue is oil and who controls the oil

fields."

Cpl Cook's sister, Libby, said she is bitter, but not about why her brother died. "The only bitterness I feel is that the people who did it were cowards," she said.

At present, funeral arrangements are incomplete. Cpl. Cook's body is expected to arrive in Dover, Delaware from Germany this week. The body will then be flown into Greensboro airport with internment to follow in West Lawn Memorial Gardens in Clemmons. Vogler's Chapel in Clemmons is in charge of funeral arrangements.

Cpl. Cook is described as a happy, outgoing person... a man who knew no strangers and cherished bringing laughter to others. He was athletic and lettered in cross-country at Davie High School. He had a sense of duty and was proud to be a Marine.

He joined the Marines as a reserve in 1978 and following high school graduation in 1979 he went on active duty. Prior to going on active duty he attended Com Center School at 29 Palms, California.

In 1982 he received a commendation for outstanding performance as a communicator with the 34th Marine Amphibious Unit on his first overseas duty while serving with the 2nd Marine Division.

His three-year stint in the Marines would have ended next September.

Dennis was born in Beaufort, S.C. to Sgt. Maj. Ret. U.S. Marine Corps Charles F. Cook and Mary Alice Burchfield Cook. He had attended school in Hawaii, Camp Lejeune, and one year at Davidson County Community College.

He is survived by his mother and father of the home; one sister, Miss Elizabeth Ann (Libby) Cook of the home; and his maternal step-grandmother, Mrs. John L. Burchfield of Westel, Tenn.
