Husser's talents as an official were highly praised by both coaches and observers alike. One area sportswriter said he "was a fair official, one who enforced the rules and insisted on good sportsmanship. By his efforts in high school and the Southern Conference, he helped a great many young men and women to enjoy sports."

A fellow official, who worked with Husser for many years, describes him as being very professional. He said "we traveled the South together, and he always was a credit to his family, to the game, and to Catawba College. Jerry Husser was a gentleman and an inspiration to his fellow officials."

In 1963, Husser decided to return to the college classroom and complete the work for his degree. In 1965 he graduated with a double major in physical education and history.

Husser died in 1968 at age 61. His wife died this past summer. The Husser family had three children.

At Husser's death in 1968, he had completed a two-year stint as football and track coach at Brunswick High School, Brunswick, Va.



## Contact Lenses

Most people who wear contact lenses do so for the sake of appearance, although in certain cases contact lenses also offer greater optical advantages than does the wearing of conventional eyeglasses. Generally, the person using contact lenses subjects himself or herself to considerable cost and inconvenience for the privilege—and may wind up dissatisfied and frustrated. The Better Business Bureau advises potential contact lens owners to investigate carefully before opting for this form of vision correction.

The first step in the selection process should be a thorough examination by an optometrist (a professionally trained to prescribe eyeglasses or contact lenses after examining the eyes and to detect the presence of vision problems, eye diseases and other abnormalities) or an ophthalmologist (a physician who not only detects vision problems and prescribes corrective lenses but also treats eye diseases and performs ocular surgery). Some types of vision problems, such as astigmatism, do not lend themselves readily to correction by contact lenses and the potential wearers would always ask an eye care professional whether they are suitable for his or her vision.

Contact lenses have been around for about 40 years, but only within the last 19 years has there been significant progress in modifying their design. The oldest type—and still the preference of many eye doctors—is the hard lens which offers good vision, ease

The Rev. Massey was born in Waxhaw, N.C. July 2, 1913. He attended the Waxhaw Elementary School, then went to High Point where he attended the William Penn High School, playing on the football team, a member of the glee club and the scholastic honor society. Receiving a scholarship to college, he attended the Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte and received his AB degree. He attended the Johnson C. Smith Seminary receiving the Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1941. In 1947 he received his Master's degree in Christian Education from McCormick Seminary in Chicago.

In 1938 he began his work as a student supply at the Presbyterian churches in Boonville and Mt. Airy. In October of 1938 he became pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church of Mocksville, the Mount Vernon Presbyterian Church of Woodleaf, and the Knox Chapel Mission of Cooleemee. After his ordination in 1942, he served full time pastorates at these churches.

During his ministry, the membership of each of these churches almost doubled. Physical plants were enlarged to include education facilities, kitchens, centralized heating units, etc.

During the sixteen years as a resident of Mocksville, Mr. Massey was active in all areas of religious and civic work. He served the local prison camp as chaplain; he was a member of and served as president of the local ministerial association. He was the financial clerk of the Yadkin Presberty Synod and was on the commission to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church USA, serving on several committees. He held important posts in the Corinthian Chapter of the Masonic Lodge here.

He served as a scoutmaster for Boy Scout Troop 501 that had an enrollment of 30 boys at one time. During World War II he served on the man power commission that supported a "work or fight movement. During each of the years he was a loyal worker for the Red Cross drives and the March of Dimes campaigns.

In 1952, Mr. Massey was selected to

represent the interest of Davie County in the settlement of the George T. Brown estate. This involved money designated for the hospital care of needy Negroes in Davie and Forsyth counties. The original plan failing to materialize made it seem that all hopes for Davie County to receive local benefits from the will were doomed until the decision was recalled and a petition was made for an alternate settlement. On August 14, 1954, the Rev. Massey signed the papers which brought Davie County \$10,000 to be used in the construction and service of the Davie County Hospital.

Dr. Ralph Felton of Drew Seminary pointed up the life of the Rev. R.A. Massey in his book entitled "Go Down Moses", a study of 21 successful rural ministries.

In March of 1955, the Rev. R.A. Massey left this area for Fayetteville where he organized the College Heights Presbyterian Church. He later served as pastor of the Dalebrook Presbyterian Church in Winston-Salem for two years and for the past eight years had been pastor of the St. Paul's Presbyterian Church in High Point.

Leaving this area in 1955, Mr. Massey said:

"Even though my new field is a challenge, I regretfully leave my present charges and the friends I have made. I wish to thank all who have contributed in anyway towards making the past 16 years profitable, prosperous and pleasant."

He was married to Cora Lee Morton Massey of Salisbury who survives. Other survivors include two sons, Wilbur Massey, stationed in Germany and Robert Massey of Fayetteville; two daughters, Miss Barbara Massey of New York, N.Y. and Miss Avis Massey of the home; and two grandchildren.

Mr. Jones was fatally injured Saturday night in an automobile accident in Rowan County on St. Lukes Church Road.


