Voters To Have Many Choices On Saturday

Registered voters of Davie County will go to the polls Saturday to make party nominee selections and to elect two members to the Davie County Board of Education.

A total of seven ballots will be used in Davie voting. Three each for those registered as Democrats and Republicans and then the board of education ballots.

Dr. R. F. Kemp, chairman of the Davie County Board of Elections announced that the polls would be open from 6:30 a. m. to 6:30 p. m.

Dr. Kemp said that according to the new registration around 3,800 Republicans and 3,100 Democrats would probably vote in their respective party primaries.

Republicans

Davie County Republicans will have two or three ballots to vote in Saturday's Primary depending on the precinct in which they vote.

Candidates State Views On Public School Issues To Retire

The final meeting of the Davie County unit of the North Carolina Education Association was held Tuesday afternoon in the Mocksville school auditorium. The local and area political candidates were on hand to give their views on the following topics: an increased county tax to support school construction, the increase of county spending per pupil, and the measures to follow should a bond issue fail to pass again.

Dr. F. W. Slate, Clay Tullerow, Harold Odum, and Joe Murphy, candidates for county commissioner presented their views on these issues. Dr. Slate, in a letter, said that Davie County should try to get better teachers through increased expenditures, and that Davie County should strive to maintain the present school buildings and also build new buildings through and increased county tax rate.

Mr. Harold Odum stated that he supported a bond issue to build new schools. He said that should the bond issue fail the only alternative would be to raise the tax assessment. Mr. Murphy stated that the public school system needs to grow, and promised that he would work to meet this need.

The candidates for the Davie County Board of Education and the State House of Representatives also spoke on their reason for seeking their positions.

In business held prior to the

program, the local unit of the NCEA voted to purchase their annual dues to \$4.00. Officers for the 1968-69 school year were also elected. The new officers are Dwight Jackson, president; T. G. Foster, vice president; Miss Eleanor Sifford, secretary; and Mrs. Martha H. Vogler, treasurer.

Sidney G. Wallace, principal of Shady Grove school who is retiring this year, was presented with a plaque and a certificate by James Everidge, superintendent of Davie County schools, and Vernon Thompson, principal of the Mocksville school. The plaque and certificate cited Mr. Wallace's work in the field of education for the past 40 years.

Don Morrow, director of the field service division of the NCEA, then discussed the relative stands of the relative stands of the five candidates for governor on certain areas of education.

According to Mr. Morrow, Bob Scott is strongly in favor of junior and senior high school vocational courses and of a public school kindergarten. Mel Broughton is in favor of increasing teacher's salaries up to the national average. Dr. Reginald Hawkins is strongly in favor of the UPTE program and of spending for education of the poor and deprived.

Davie Center Of Hanes Distribution System

A major change in the method of distributing knitwear products was announced today by William B. Cash, president of Hanes Corporation.

The new system, unique in the apparel industry, will enable the company's Knitwear Division to distribute directly to major volume retailers, while continuing to sell through independent whole salers for other accounts.

Under the new dual distribution system, which becomes operative July 1, independent wholesalers will act as commission sales representatives for a selected group of large-volume retailers, and the orders will be serviced by Hanes.

They will also continue to service the bulk of their customers in the familiar way, buying knitwear products from Hanes for resale to retailers.

The company's Hosiery Division, which distributes through 10 independent wholesalers, is not participating in this new distribution system.

Hanes traditionally has sold its products to distributors for resale and distribution to retail outlets. At present, almost 200 wholesalers service an estimated 100,000 retail stores with more than 800 different items produced by the Knitwear Division.

In planning for two years by a special team, the project was code-named "3-D", which stands for "Dynamic Distribution Development." Over \$3 million have been invested in this system by the time it is operating smoothly.

Heart of the 3-D system is a huge \$2½ million computerized distribution center in nearby Davidson County, the largest, most modern warehousing-shipping facility in the industry. It is 40 feet high and provides 5½ million cubic feet of space for handling products made in nine Knitwear Division plants.

To facilitate shipping, a railroad spur line has been run into the building.

For some accounts, products will be shipped by train or truck direct from the central service center. Others will be serviced from four satellite service facilities, located at Oklahoma City, South Brunswick, N. J., Reno, Nev., and Chicago. All eventually will be connected with the master computer at the central service center.

"The 3-D approach to selling-distributing by the Knitwear Division is an important step in meeting rapidly-changing marketing patterns, and provides us with a system to serve our customers better," said Mr. Cash. "We expect 3-D to contribute importantly to our planned program of growth."

Richard B. Port, president of the Knitwear Division, and marketing vice president William D. Schubert, are specific as to what is expected from the new dual distribution system: Increased sales of underwear and other knitwear products, both branded and unbranded; Higher markups for retailers, as well as greater profits for wholesalers; Faster service and shipment to retailers and wholesalers; A price and service structure that will meet the requirements of all retailers.

"What we've done," Mr. Port says, "is to take the best of the old and the best of the new, and combine the two into what actually is a new concept in marketing distribution."

"With 3-D, we will be able to give overnight service to almost any retailer in the country. We do not believe that any other knitwear manufacturer can provide such rapid and efficient service."

Hanes, which makes wearing apparel for the entire family, operates 12 plants in the U. S. and one in Canada. It has 12,000 employees.

"It is most encouraging that so many Forsyth leaders are supporting Vinegar Bend Mizell for Congress," Culbertson said. "There is


no doubt that Mizell has an excellent chance to carry Forsyth County on May 4."

"I have spent the past two and a half years traveling throughout the Fifth District," Bagley said. "I have talked to the people. I have listened to them. I think I know what they are concerned about."





Of Americas In Mexico**

Miss Eleanor Caroline Brock, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B. C. Brock, Jr., Route 5, is in Mexico City this spring where she is attending the University of the Americas which enrolls more Americans than any other institution of higher learning outside the borders of the United States.

Students from more than forty countries study at the school where classes are taught in English by a faculty of American, Latin American, and European educators.

Since the University is a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, credits are transferable to and from universities and colleges in the United States.

Miss Brock is a graduate of Davie County High School. She is majoring in anthropology.

She is taking advantage of the cultural atmosphere of the Mexican capital where pre-Columbian archeological sites and impressive skyscrapers stand side by side making a dramatic blend of the old and new. At the Plaza of the Three Cultures, close to the center of the city, Miss Brock may see the ultra-modern federal housing project of Nonoalco, ruins of ancient Aztec temples, and the sixteenth century Spanish colonial church of Santiago Tlatelolco.

University sponsored excursions help acquaint newcomers with many unique landmarks of Mexico. At nearby Teotihuacan students climb the 210-foot high Pyramid of the Sun. In Oaxaca they tour the Zapotec ruins of Monte Alban and in Patzcuaro they bargain for wares made by local artisans.

By studying in Mexico, Miss Brock is not only acquiring a better understanding of her southern neighbor but is also developing a clearer perspective of her own country.

The school, which has been called a great influence in toppling barriers between nations, "illustrates the importance of intercultural education as a pathway to international understanding," according to Dr. D. Ray Lindley, president of the University of the Americas.

This exciting and colorful work for chorus and large orchestra is based on German medieval poetry. Its performance in Winston-Salem is a hallmark in the twenty-two year history of the Winston-Salem orchestra, which has demonstrated in recent years

a fresh vigor in enlarging its repertoire. "Carnation Nights", April 2 and 29, will close the 1968-1969 season, rounding out a full year of symphonic offerings sparked by exceptional audience appeal.







applications received by the VA during the past two years, 302,311, or nearly 77 per cent, were from men who served after January 31, 1955. Last month the figure climbed to about 85 per cent, with 15,370 of the 19,112 applications from veterans who served after the end of the Korean War.

For the veteran who is thinking of selling his home by allowing the purchaser to carry his GI loan, Phillips reminded him that he should protect himself by getting a release of liability from the VA.

Releases are issued if the new buyer—veteran or non-veteran—is a good credit risk and assumes all of the veteran's loan obligations. Phillips pointed out, however, that a release from liability does not restore the veteran's eligibility for another GI loan.

Eligibility is restored only if VA is no longer liable to the lender on the guaranty and if the veteran disposes of the home for certain

acceptable reasons, generally because he is forced to sell because of transfer or illness.

Homes repossessed by the VA are sold to veterans and nonveter-

ans alike, without regard to race, color or creed.

Further information on VA homes and GI home loans may be obtained from local VA offices.





Knox Johnston, Chairman of the Davie County Savings Bond Committee and bank official, said that newspapers, radio stations, business firms and financial institutions had joined in the effort to bring greater awareness of the advantages of this savings device.

"Therefore, most of today's bond buyers are people who acquired the habit back in the early '40's as a patriotic gesture, then discovered it was a mighty easy and convenient way to save regularly. ly enough," he added, "about 13 per cent of those war bonds have never been cashed, but are still earning interest for their owners."
Mrs. Johnstone pointed out that the current Series E Bond is better than ever, paying the higher 4.16% interest and maturing in only seven years. The Freedom Shares, offered as a bonus to regular bond buyers, pay 4.74% interest and mature in four and a half years.
Increasing numbers of young parents, the County Chairman said, are saving for their children's college education through regular bond buying. By having bonds issued in the child's name, he added, the Federal income tax liability becomes that of the child, resulting usually in little or no tax due on the accrued interest.





Sneed High Says That Teachers Not Getting Complete Benefit

"Teachers of Davie County are not getting the complete benefit or service from their own retirement fund. This is due to inefficient

handling of routine matters and the inability of the present State Treasurer to get a higher rate of return on investments for the Teachers' and State Employees' Fund." Sneed High, candidate for State Treasurer advised this week. "Why even Virginia," the veteran legislator said, "receives a higher rate of return on their retirement fund investments than does North Carolina."

"The 1967 General Assembly passed a law allowing the State Treasurer, as Chairman of the Board of Trustees for this retirement

fund, to employ competent counsel to advise on investments, but to this date the State Treasurer has seen fit to ignore the intent of the General Assembly to the detriment of the teachers and others in this county covered by this retirement fund."

"But what is even more distasteful to the teachers is the fact that it takes weeks, even months to get just an acknowledgement of a request concerning the status of their account," the 52 year-old Fayetteville attorney said. "There is simply no excuse for

the inefficient handling of routine administration matters, except it requires supervision from the top-







CLOTHING TO SANATORIUM

Children at McCain Sanatorium, Moore County, are in the minds and hearts of Extension Homemakers Club members in Richmond County, Martha B. Adams, home economics Extension agent, says.

Members of the Countyside Extension Homemakers Club get together regularly to sew for these children, she reports. Some ladies do the cutting; others the pinning; other the machine or hand sewing. Those who don't sew, furnish fabric, thread, buttons and patterns and prepare lunch for the group.

Last spring the ladies made 60 pairs of shorts for the children. This year they made 25 pairs of pajamas.

DOGS HAD THEIR DAY

Dogs in Davie County had their day recently during a 4-H Youth and Dog Show.

Nancy P. Hartman, assistant home economics Extension agent, says "officially there were 48 dogs entered in the seven-class show." But there were some four-legged "non-participants" at the event, too. The dogs who came as spectators seemed to be very interested in what their "friends" in the arena were doing, she notes.

"Or perhaps," Miss Hartman speculates, "the dogs were just making sure there would be no more mass inoculations." Prior to the Dog Show, she says, Vaccination Clinics were conducted on two consecutive Saturdays in 11 county communities.

4-H Club members cooperated with the county dog warden and the county veterinarian in filling out registration slips for dog tags. Some 800 dogs were vaccinated during the clinic, the agent adds.

Neighbors caught her enthusiasm and have begun scouting attics and basements for old frames. "The ladies were pleased to discover hidden treasures in their own houses," the agent adds.



absence of both the chairman and the vice chairman, any member of the committee may preside.

"A quorum for any precinct meeting shall consist of not less than ten registered Democrats in each precinct. In the event a quorum is not present the precinct chairman shall notify the Chairman of the County Executive Committee who shall call a second meeting. If the second meeting shall fail for lack of a quorum, the officers of the County Executive Committee shall fill all vacancies.

"At the precinct meeting called for that purpose the Democratic voters in attendance shall elect delegates and alternates to represent the precinct in the county convention; and said delegates or alternates, or such of them as shall attend the county convention, shall be entitled to vote the full strength


of their precinct upon all questions, nominations, resolutions which may come before the county convention. The chairman or presiding officer and the secretary of the precinct meeting shall certify to the county convention the names of the delegates and alternates selected at the meeting.

"Each precinct shall be entitled to cast in the county convention one vote for every 50 Democratic votes or major fraction thereof cast by the precinct for the Democratic gubernatorial candidate at the last preceding gubernatorial election; provided that each precinct shall be entitled to cast at least two votes in the county convention."



Davie County Democrats and Republicans voted along with the rest of the state in selecting primary winners last Saturday. Davie Democrats gave Lt. Gov. Bob Scott a clear cut majority, with 1,098 votes to 404 for Dr. Reginald Hawkins and 479 for Mel Broughton. Unofficial returns from

Davie Democrats also favored Pat Taylor for Lt. Gov., 1,079; Mrs. James Harper got 387 votes and Matlock, 217.

For Commissioner of Insurance, Edwin Lanier received 893 votes; Benton, 233; Whitley, 265; and Belk, 243.

For Superintendent of Public Instruction, Craig Phillips received 707 votes; Dr. Raymond Stone, 478; Smiley, 133; Miller, 191 and Harrill, 89.

For Judge of Court of Appeals, Mallard received 1234 votes and Brewer, 467. In the other Court of Appeals race, Mrs. Naomi Morris received 682 votes and Walter Holton, 905.

Davie Democrats gave Senator Sam J. Ervin 1469 votes; Gathings, 209; Pratt, 111; and Brummit, 64.

Davie Favors Jim Gardner In Primary

Davie County Republicans voted with the state in making Pop James Gardner their nominee for Governor.

Gardner carried every precinct in Davie in rolling up 1,973 votes to 472 for Jack Sticklely. Davie Republicans also favored Ben Garton for Lt. Governor, giving him 1,723 votes to 397 for Camps.

For Commissioner of Insurance, Davie Republicans favored Rice by a narrow margin. Rice received

1025 votes to 983 for Peterson.

Mizell carried 11 of 12 precincts in Davie in rolling up 1,492 votes to 703 for Dr. Eldon Neilson and 107 for Duggins.

WANTED BY THE FBI



JAMES EARL RAY, also known as Eric Starvo Galt, Harvey Lowmyer, John Willard, James McBride, James Walton, W. C. Herron and James O'Conner.

James Earl Ray, a Missouri prison escapee, sought under the alias Eric Starvo Galt in connection with the slaying of civil rights leader Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., is one of the FBI's "Ten Most Wanted Fugitives." FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover ordered the special addition of Ray to the "Top Ten" list to insure widespread dissemination of Ray's photograph and description to speed his location.

Ray has been intensively sought since the murder of Dr. King on April 4, 1968, as he stood on the balcony of a Memphis, Tennessee, motel. An exhaustive FBI fingerprint search, comparing latent fingerprints uncovered in the Dr. King case against fingerprints of over 50,000 persons on whom wanted notices were posted, determined that Galt and Ray are identical.

A Federal warrant, issued at Birmingham, Alabama, on April 17, 1968, charges Ray under the alias of Galt, with conspiring to interfere with a Constitutional Right of a citizen. Ray, who escaped on April 23, 1967, from the Missouri State Penitentiary, is also sought for unlawful flight to avoid confinement for robbery. His long criminal record also includes convictions for burglary and forging U.S. Postal Money Orders.

A white American, born in Alton, Illinois, on March 10, 1928, Ray is 5'10" tall, weighs 163 to 174 pounds, has blue eyes and short brown hair. He has a nervous habit of tugging at an ear lobe and his left ear protrudes noticeably. Known as a "loner" and "drifter," Ray has worked as a baker, laborer and color matcher. He has taken dancing lessons and completed a course at a school of bartending.

Consider Ray armed and extremely dangerous. Report any information, no matter how small, to the nearest FBI office.



These youths will work in public agencies throughout the four counties in such jobs as mechanic aides, Park attendant aides, secretarial aides, nurse aides, recreational aides, etc.

This is the second summer operation of the Neighborhood Youth Corps in the four county area. This summer we expect an increase of 75 slots over the 225 that were funded last summer. With the additional slots we will be able to work more of our youth, and possibly give work experience to boys and girls who have never before held a job.

The principal objective of the Neighborhood Youth Corps Program is to reach boys and girls between 6 and 21 years of age and provide them with meaningful jobs. We feel that the job will provide money for clothing, school supplies and medical needs, and possibly save a boy or girls who may have thought it necessary to drop out of school.

COTTON ALLOTMENTS
TRANSFER VOTE TO BE HELD IN MAY

Cotton farmers in Davie County will vote the middle of May to decide whether they want to be able to sell or lease their cotton allotments outside the county. J. N. Smoot, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, has announced. The referendum on the question will be conducted during the period May 13 through May 17. Ballots may be returned by mail or delivered by hand to the ASCS County Office during that time. Mailed ballots must be postmarked not later than May 17 and must arrive at the ASCS County Office before ballots are counted on May 22.

The only question to be decided by the balloting is whether 1969 upland cotton allotments may be transferred to farms which are located in other counties by sale or by lease. Transfers of allotments by an owner to a farm that he owns or controls may be made across county lines without regard to the outcome of the referendum. In no case may transfers be made outside the State. An affirmative vote by at least two-thirds of the county's cotton farmers who vote will permit such transfers by sale or lease for 1969.

Three similar referendums were conducted in 1965, 1966, and 1967, and growers in 95 counties throughout the Cotton Belt have already voted — in 1966 or 1967 — to approve such transfers for the 1969 crop.

The 1965 vote, however, covered only the 1966-68 crops, so the vote this year will be held in counties where such transfers have not previously been approved for 1969, including those where transfers were approved in the 1965 vote.

The Chairman points out that voting by mail is easy and convenient, and the vote therefore should be large and fully representative of the wishes of the cotton farmers in the county.

Copies of the ballot will be sent to all cotton producers of record in the county, together with information describing the program's purpose and operation. Any cotton producer who has a question about the referendum or about who is eligible to vote is urged to get in touch with the ASCS County Office.

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
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

Although he had served as highway and party chairman . . . at different times, of course . . . he was not too well known outside Raleigh. And so . . . it took a lot of exposure—scores and scores of signboards, for example, to get the people acquainted with his image.

The Project was handled in a highly professional manner—had to be—and cost plenty of moola. Broughton made a worthy candidate.

SECOND . . . Once in a while the second man in the First Primary emerges the winner in the Second Primary.

But it ain't necessarily so.

It takes a certain set of circumstances. And they do not exist this time.

In 1964, Richardson Preyer of Greensboro—now a Democratic nominee for Congress—came out of the First Primary with 281,430 to 217,172 for Dr. I. Beverly Lake and 257,872 for Dan K. Moore.

Moore and Lake, both being conservatives, joined hands in the runoff and Moore took Preyer by 480,431 to 293,863.

Another good example of the second man winning in the runoff occurred in 1950 when Dr. Frank Graham—a Kerr Scott appointee to the U. S. Senate (to fill the vacancy caused by the death of J. M. Broughton in 1949)—had 303,605 votes in the First Primary to 250,222 for Willis Smith.

Robert R. Reynolds of Asheville had 58,732 and Olla Ray Boyd got 5,900.

In the runoff—which did the Democratic Party harm it feels even today—Willis Smith took Dr. Frank Graham 281,114 to 261,789. But it took a pile of money—quite a bit of it imported from Texas—and Smith went on to become a great U. S. Senator.

With both of these cases, however, you had conservative candidates ganging up on a liberal in the Second Primary.

NEGRO VOTE . . . If Bob Scott can get even 25 percent of the Negro vote in the runoff, he should have no trouble whatever winning the nomination. There will be a lot of runoffs, so look for a big vote.

Even though Dr. Lake's 1964 manager is a strong Scott man Bob Scott should get as many Negro votes in the Second as Broughton. Maybe more.

And, as the Republicans look to this fall, they can't over look the fact that Democrat Dr. Reginald Hawkins—never heard of six months ago—got

nearly as many votes as their Big Champion Jim Gardner.

Hawkins got nearly three times as many votes as did Fellow Charlottean Jack Stickle, former president of Lions International.

Like it or not, the Negro Vote—as solidly a block as ever dreamed of by AFL-CIO—is here and here to stay. And, up to this good hour, it is in the South—solidly Democratic.

MORE MORE MORE

SURPRISES . . . Each election produce some eye-brow-lifters. Here are some from the May 4 vote:

—The total number of ballots—in the Democratic Primary, at least—was much smaller than anticipated by the forecasters . . .

—The ease with which Gardner defeated Stickle . . . downing him decisively in many far western counties. In an awkward pause—one of many encountered by amateurish, informal television—Mrs. Stickle was heard to whisper to her husband: "I can hardly believe this is happening, can you . . . ?" He continued to smile while waiting for the go signal on his concession-of-defeat statement . . . Rough treatment.

—The light Negro vote in the Second District where Congressman L. H. Fountain was frankly running scared against Mrs. Eva Clayton, Negro housewife. He beat her two-to-one . . .

—The comeback of Good Sport Smith Bagley over James G. White, both of Winston-Salem, in the newly constituted Fifth District . . .

—Robert Morgan's shellacking of lacklustre Wade Bruton for Attorney General . . . keep an eye on this Morgan . . . and when, if ever, has an incumbent Attorney General lost out?

Resource Conservation Workshop

The 1968 Resource Conservation Workshop has been announced for the week of June 10-14, 1968, by George L. Winchester, Chairman of the Steering Committee. The Workshop will be held on the N. C. State University campus in Raleigh.

Through the Davie County High School, Scouts and 4-H leaders the Davie Soil & Water Conservation District will select boys or girls with special interest and aptitude in conservation areas with priority given 1968 high school graduates, rising high school seniors or juniors.

Supervised recreation including swimming, basketball, and other suitable sports, movies and other types of entertainment will be provided each night. A banquet will be held on Thursday night.

Delegates will be housed in dormitories on the N. C. State University campus. Adult counselors will be provided at night, in class, and during recreation. Meals will be available at the University Cafeteria.

Subjects to be covered in the Workshop are:

- North Carolina Soils and Their Management
— Land Use and Conservation Planning
— Establishment of Conservation Practices
— Watershed Protection and Management
— Soil and Water Conservation Research
— Forest Protection - Fire Control - Insect and Disease Control
— Forest Management
— Wildlife Conservation
— Wildlife and Fisheries Management

Senator Sam Ervin Says:

Crime in the streets - the day-to-day lawlessness which touches the average citizen - is scheduled to receive legislative attention in the form of the Safe Streets and Crime Control Act. The measure, which came to the Senate floor last week, contains three amendments that I have introduced to aid the police and the courts in the prosecution of criminals.

The bill as proposed by the Administration seeks to provide Federal funds to communities and states to improve police training and crime-fighting methods. It also contains a much debated provision which would restrict the sale of handguns. These provisions are meritorious. However, I believe that effective legislation upon this problem must recognize that recent Supreme Court decisions have a bearing upon law enforcement and have, indeed, hamstringing the police.

My amendments, stripped of their legal language, would permit the use of voluntary confessions and eyewitness testimony as evidence in criminal prosecutions, and would terminate endless "habeas corpus" petitions by convicted criminals who seek to re-adjudicate prior adverse holdings of the highest State and Federal Courts.

One who is not too familiar with recent United States Supreme Court decisions might wonder why it would be necessary to introduce legislation to permit the use of a voluntary confession or eyewitness identification in a criminal trial. It would also seem unnecessary to say that criminal litigation ought to have a stopping point. But under the decisions and rulings of the Federal Courts in recent years, it has become necessary to introduce such legislation.

Miranda v. Arizona, decided by the Supreme Court less than two years ago, placed so many restrictions upon the introduction of an accused's voluntary confession that for all practical purposes such evidence can seldom be used anymore. Moreover, United States v. Wade and Gilbert v. California, recent Supreme Court decisions, hold that it is unconstitutional for a law-enforcement officer to permit an eyewitness to a crime to look at the suspect in custody to determine whether or not he is the party that the eyewitness saw commit the crime unless a lawyer representing the suspect is present during the identification.


When all is said, and much is being said nowadays about crime, these cases have created absurd and illogical rules which are affecting in tangible ways the enforcement of the law. Meaningful legislation must recognize this. All too often these days a majority of the Court has ignored the fact that the victim of crime is just as much entitled to be protected as the accused.

My third amendment touches upon the floodtide of habeas corpus petitions which adjudicated criminals have used to prolong criminal litigation after the highest Courts have ruled upon the issues in the case. Until recent years, lower Federal Courts were very reluctant to intervene in the criminal adjudications of our State Courts. Liberalized rules have now opened the doors to endless petitions of habeas corpus by the guilty party at any time after his conviction. This can occur even though the State Court's decision has been upheld earlier by the U. S. Supreme Court. My amendment would prevent lower Federal Courts from having jurisdiction over criminal trials litigated in State Courts and would end this absurdity.

I believe my amendments would aid materially in the protection of society from rising crime rates.

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
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

Then, demonstrating his ever-present spirit of rebellion, he turned to the Patriot friends and yelled, "They're confounded Red-coats and Tories. Clear yourselves!" Quickly, the men turned and ran. The enemy fired after them, but it was too late. Jonathan Hampton had flaunted authority again. But this time he was cursed and kicked and ordered to report to the dreaded Colonel Ferguson and a Major Dunlap. Dunlap told Ferguson that Hampton had done more harm with words than ten men with weapons. "He ought to be strung up at once," he told the Colonel. But Colonel Ferguson saw the courage in Jonathan Hampton and admired it. So he picked up his pen and wrote a parole. Jonathan Hampton went on to become a clerk of the Rutherford County Court and a member of the State Senate. He died at age ninety-two, taking out of this world what he brought with him: a free spirit. The determination and fortitude of Jonathan Hampton helped make this area great. 

The Bluemont Knitting Mills, Inc. on Milling Road, a subsidiary of BVD, began this week accepting applications for employment.


The plant will be under the direct supervision of Phillip Strauss, who is moving into the area from one of the other divisions of the parent BVD Company.

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

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Jehovah Witnesses Attend Convention

"After nearly 6,000 years of man rule the world finds itself in the most serious and violent condition in history," said J. Sala as he spoke on the subject "Why Does God Permit Wickedness?"

Speaking to an audience of 1-123 in convention in North Wilkesboro, the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society District Director declared. "There are several related reasons why God has permitted wickedness to continue since the beginning in the garden of Eden."

"In passing judgment on that rebel spirit creature who made a Devil out of himself by lying against God, Jehovah stated in symbolic language his purpose for the future. Reassuring his audience Sala noted, "We can expect the immediate future to be filled with thrilling events for those who rest their faith in God and his promises. How vital, then, for each one who loves life to take note of these evidences of history that point to the near end of this wicked system!"

Jerry C. Smith, minister for the local group, served in a convention department. Mr. Smith pointed out that the local Witnesses, "Feel better equipped to carry out their public preaching and free home Bible study service."

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q - What's the purpose of the Form 1040-X you introduced?

A - This new form was designed to make it easier for taxpayers to correct errors made on 1040 or 1040-A returns. Instead of filling out an entire return to correct a mistake, taxpayers now just submit information on the item in error.

For example, a taxpayer who made a mistake in listing his 1967 medical deductions reports the correct medical information on Form 1040-X. Then using key figures from the 1040 return he had filed, the new liability is calculated.

Copies of the new 1040-X are available at local IRS offices along with instructions for its use.

Q - I got a letter from the regional service center asking me for information. Should I send it back to this center?

A - Yes, unless the letter requesting the information indicates you should send it elsewhere. Usually a return envelope is enclosed for your convenience.

To assure prompt handling, put your social security number on your reply and also return the letter you received.

Q - Do you have to be a doctor or a lawyer to set up your own retirement plan?

A - No, most persons in business for themselves can take advantage of the tax provisions allowing self-employed individuals to contribute to a personal retirement plan. This includes people who have their own business and also those who have income from part-time self employment which is in addition to their regular job.

Details on these plans are contained in IRS Document No. 6592,

"Retirement Plans for Self-Employed Individuals." Send a post card to your IRS district office to obtain a free copy.

Q - I put in my refund claim back in April. When can I expect my check?

A - The refund should arrive some time after the first of June. Some returns filed at the deadline may not be processed completely till the end of June, however. Incomplete returns and those with errors take longer to process.

Q - I'm having someone come in once a week to take care of my lawn and shrubbery. Will his wages be subject to income or social security tax withholding?

A - If you pay cash wages of \$50

or more during a calendar quarter then you should report social security taxes for him. Use Form 942 to make the quarterly reports and payments.

You do not have to withhold income tax on wages paid to gardeners and other household employees.

Q - Do you have any booklet that outlines what a taxpayer can do if he disagrees with the results of an audit of his return?

A - Yes, the appeal procedures available to taxpayers are explained in IRS Document No. 5202, "If Your Return is Examined." Send a post card to your IRS district







QUART OF SEEDS

Last spring an effort was made in Hoke County to get residents to plant green and yellow squash. This spring Mrs. E. H. Bowling, Aberdeen, Rt. 1, donated a quart of seeds she had saved from her last year's garden. The seeds were distributed to persons who were eager to plant squash this year.

"These seeds will plant a lot of hills and the fruit will be valuable next fall and winter for baking, broiling and in making pies," Mrs. Ellen E. Willis, home economics Extension agent, believes.

RESIDENTS ARTISTS

"Who could have ever thought I could create this?" Mrs. D. A. Simmons, of Columbia, asked as she showed Mrs. Frances Voliva, associate home economics Extension agent, her latest creation in oil plants. Mrs. Simmons was one of more than 20 students who pursued an art course at Pitt Technical Institute.

The original idea for art classes came from the Tyrrell County Fine Arts committee of the Albemarle Area Development Association, who spearheaded the contacts for the program, the agent reports.

"The pictures produced are too numerous to count, the quality too exciting to believe and the enthusiasm too great to hold down," Mrs. Voliva says. "And, it all came about as a result of a three-member committee, determined to afford a cultural opportunity to county residents," she adds.

WORTHY TIME SPENT

Some husbands wonder why it takes their wives so long to re-

finish a picture frame. Two such men were Dewey Godwin and W. Simons, of Lillington, who estimated that their wives could redo a picture frame in one day.

After the second day, they could see why the additional time was essential.

According to Extension home economics agents, who conducted the refinishing workshop, "Mrs. Simmons had two frames. One had wood and gold leaf, the other was all gold leaf."

Her husband is now very proud of the frames and values them at \$75 to \$100 each.

Mrs. Godwin had inherited several frames. One was in three parts. She was delighted to get it back into one piece, ready for refinishing, the agents note.

Buying Guide For Strawberry Time

Fresh strawberries—sweet temptations for everyone—and can any other fruit make such a big impression for so little effort?

BUYING GUIDES

Color — A solid, bright red color is preferable as it indicates ripe freshly picked berries.

Berries — with white spots are probably under-ripe and will have a more tart flavor. Strawberries do not ripen further after picking so avoid white-spotted berries.

If that shiny "gloss" is gone, the berries have been picked several hours. However, remember that only locally grown berries can reach stores quickly enough to retain this gloss.

Cups — If cups are missing, the berries are probably over-ripe and will have a mushy texture.

Size — Flavor depends upon variety and ripeness. Size does not affect it.

For "show-off" desserts, large sizes may be preferable. For other uses, smaller sizes may be just as desirable.

Container — If the container has a red stain, chances are good that the berries are over-ripe and have been crushed.

Other — Look for berries that are dry and free of dirt.

Yield — One quart yields 5 servings (½ cup or 4 ounces).

Vitamin Rich — Strawberries are a wonderful source of Vitamin C. One cup contains nearly 4/5 of the daily need of Vitamin C, about the same amount as a 6 ounces glass of orange juice.





agencies plan to not only solve severe flood prevention and drainage problems, but to also plan for the improvement of wildlife habitat.

The Soil Conservation Service has responsibility under USDA for administering Public Law 566, popularly known as the Small Watershed Program. The primary purpose of this program is watershed protection and flood prevention. However, other multiple purpose benefits such as storage of water for municipal, industrial, irrigation, rural water supply, recreation, and associated recreation area development, can be added when local people desire these benefits and they can be economically justified. When SCS received an application for small watershed planning assistance, it immediately informs other interested agencies requesting that they participate in development of this plan. This cooperative action provides an opportunity to not only plan for solution of the immediate problem, but to consider other benefits as well.

A committee composed of USDA Agency representatives has recently completed a conservation needs inventory in all counties in North Carolina. As a result of this study, the SCS Work Unit office in each county now has a map showing all watersheds in the county. In addition, the committee designated the watersheds they thought could qualify for planning under Public Law 566. Any individual, group, or organization interested in learning more about this program is invited to visit the Work Unit office and discuss it with the Work Unit Conservationist. A representative of your Soil and Water Conservation District would be glad to discuss the program with you.

Mocksville Shooters Wins Wild Turkey ATA Trophy!

Clarence L. Driver, of Route 3, Mocksville, N. C., captured North Carolina's annual Amateur Trapshooting Association's contest and Austin, Nichols Company's Wild Turkey Trophy.

According to Hunter A. Galloway, Jr., the state's ATA delegate who lives in Greensboro, the determination of the winner of the Wild Turkey Trophy was based on 200 singles and 100 handicaps.

The scores posted by Mr. Driver, a self-employed dry well contractor, at the ATA contest, held at Durham County Wildlife Gun Club, April 26-28, were 196-200 and 103-100 from 22 1/2 yards.

The Wild Turkey Trophy, annually contributed by the Austin, Nichols Company, producers and distributors of premium 100 proof Wild Turkey Bourbon, to each winner of every registered state shoot in the United States and provinces of Canada, is made of crystal clear blown glass and etched by hand with a wild turkey.

To complement and display the Trophy, the etched oval tray fits into a handcrafted walnut stand. A brass plaque across the base of the stand is now being engraved with Mr. Driver's name, score, date, and place of the shoot.

Mr. Driver's achievement is remarkable, considering he has been shooting only two years. Last year, Mark G. Saunders, Jr., of Winston-Salem won the Austin Nichols Trophy. For the first time this year, the company also will be contributing a grand award Wild Turkey Trophy to the winner of ATA's Southern Zone Shoot to be held July 1-20 at the Flint Trap Club, Albany, Georgia.

Dairy Farmers To Vote On Expanding Research Program

North Carolina dairy farmers will have the opportunity to vote on a greatly expanded research and promotion program on May 23. In a referendum scheduled for that day, Grade A dairy farmers will vote on the question of assessing themselves four cents per hundred pounds of milk they sell. The funds will be used to expand the promotion and research programs of the American Dairy Association of North Carolina, Inc. for the next three years.

Milk promotion and research is not new for North Carolina dairy farmers. For the past fifteen years they have been carrying on a research and promotion program for milk. They have financed and conducted their own self-help program through the American Dairy Association of North Carolina, Inc.

The state's dairy industry has become one of the leading farm income producing industries. By working together through this self-help program to promote their product, dairy farmers are responsible for a part of this growth and progress. As the industry has grown, the dairy farmer's investment in facilities for producing milk have increased tremendously. To protect this investment, they realize the need for doing more to promote their product and build markets for their milk.

Dairy farmers should consider all of the facts and vote on May 23. Two-thirds of the dairy farmers voting must vote yes, if this program to expand markets for milk is to be put into effect.

News and Comment from Our Raleigh Bureau

FIVE? ... The Republican Party scientists—you have more of them all the time in politics—are looking down their rifle sights at North Carolina.

They say there is an even- Steven chance of the State's going Republican in many of the State offices, including Governor.

Plans call for five of the Congressional Districts—out of the total of eleven—to go Republican.

They would keep Republican Charles Jonas of Lincoln, James Broyhill of Lenoir, of course, and defeat Democratic Nominees Nick Gallant of Durham, Roy Taylor of Black Mountain, and Smith Bagley of Winston-Salem.

The GOP will spend big money in these latter districts.

QUARTER-MILLION ... After all was said and done, the votes were in, etc., the sharp pencil boys with Bob Scott and Mel Broughton got down to see how each had come out financially.

The Broughton camp had debts totaling a few dollars over \$147,000.

Scott forces owed a little less than \$100,000.

All told—with a few odds and ends here and there—the tab came to approximately \$250,000. This is a unity debt which should be—and probably will be—borne by the Scott organization.

NO TROUBLE ... To the victor belongs the oil. No doubt about it. Never worry about money for the gubernatorial winner in North Carolina.

When Bob Scott's daddy won 26 years ago, Manager Capus Waynick—now viewing the scene from Guilford County retirement—became a one-man receiving line at Carolina Hotel here. Everybody wanted to get right—and the best way was with a donation to help defray the huge debt accumulated in defeating Charles Johnson.

So, it would appear the Scott Establishment should—in the final analysis—have little difficulty on the financial front.

BALANCE ... Never overlook the importance of a third party, be it person, political, or blue.

This time, consider Everette Miller, who has been associated with Dr. Charles Carroll, State Superintendent of Public Instruction. He has acquired an intimate knowledge of

the State's schools Superintendent on May 4. The first man was Craig Phillips. Then came Raymond Stone. Carroll's assistant did little campaigning.

Although Miller spent only a small percentage of the totals expended by the first-runners, he is in position now to exert a lot of influence where it counts in the runoff between Phillips and Stone.

What will he do? Can he name the next Superintendent? SANFORD ... When former Gov. Terry Sanford could not come up with enough strength to take on Sen. Sam Ervin, there were those ready to count him out of the 1968 political picture.

They could not have been more wrong ... as it has turned out.

He has been given the credit for getting Hargrove (Skipper) Bowles of Greensboro out of the Lieutenant-Governor's race. This made Pat Taylor of Wadesboro a shoo-in ... as was shown in the Primary.

Sanford's contacts were of tremendous assistance to Robert Morgan in his downing of Attorney General Wade Bruton. This seems to be general knowledge hereabouts.

Everybody around here says that Dr. Raymond Stone is another player on the Sanford team. Whether he can bring home a winner here, only time will tell. The odds do not look the best at the moment.

Then, on the national front, Terry Sanford is in the middle of the Hubert Humphrey-for-President campaign ... and apparently has lost all love for Bobby Kennedy. A Humphrey victory would mean Cabinet position ... It is also to be noted that Democratic Nominee Bob Scott and Terry Sanford are not what you would call enemies.

Not bad, looking at everything, for a man considered to be rather out-to-pasture only a few short months ago.

INFLATION ... One of the ghosts which will be haunting the Democrats on the national level this summer and fall is inflation.

The reduced value of money was well illustrated recently by a business man who finally decided to retire. In the ceremony, he held up for the crowd to see the first dollar he ever earned. It was neatly framed.

He looked back over the 55 years: "Just to think—when this dollar bill was framed in 1913 ... the frame cost me ten cents. But now ... the dollar is worth about ten cents,

and the frame ... today ... would cost me ... a dollar."

WILKES VISIT ... As Jim Gardner, GOP candidate for Governor, prepares to take on Democrat Bob Scott in the fall, he should make a visit to Wilkesboro, county seat of Wilkes County and the heart of Republicanism in North Carolina.

There he will find on the wall a plaque noting that Wilkes County led all the rest in the Kerr Scott bond-vote-for-good-roads 19 years ago this summer. They further honored Democratic Bob's fine daddy by naming the dammed-up Yadkin, W. Kerr Scott Reservoir.



Last spurt of school activity before commencement has brought many students into the library lately to do the research necessary for papers on a variety of subjects, or to locate supplementary material. Two groups have worked here in preparation for debates, and, of course, some always choose personal reading for their leisure moments.

Senator Sam Ervin Says:

Senator Jordan and I recently appeared before the Senate Subcommittee on Public Works Appropriations in behalf of North Carolina's requests for water resource projects.

We sought fiscal 1969 funds for the continuing development of our rivers, harbors, and waterways for the construction of the New Hope Reservoir Dam, the Falls of the Neuse Reservoir, and some twenty other important projects, surveys, and studies.

The Senate-approved bill which I introduced to protect the privacy of Federal employees got a boost last week when Congressman David Henderson announced that his House Manpower Subcommittee will give priority consideration to this legislation.

In the Senate debate on the omnibus anticrime bill which contains provisions which I introduced to permit the use of voluntary confessions and eyewitness testimony in criminal prosecutions, and certain other procedural changes, I strongly urged the Senate to retain my amendments last week.

To anyone familiar with this legislation and its background, it is unnecessary to say that these amendments are needed in view of decisions which the U. S. Supreme Court has rendered in the Miranda, Escobedo, and other cases.

Such decisions have tilted the scales of justice in a fashion that the criminal now enjoys an advantage that is of serious consequence in the control of crime.

Our cities are in grave danger of becoming jungles of anarchy where shopkeepers and the citizenry live in senseless jeopardy.

Only a generation ago, there was the deterring philosophy that "crime does not pay" because the criminal would almost always be brought to justice. In the span of a few years, however, Americans have begun to doubt the validity of that statement when they see our streets urged in

the Congress sit back and watch tragedy befall our land, because it is unwilling to restore sensible rules in the trial of criminals.

to canyons of violence and crime rates are soaring each month.





GI Education Bill In Effect

The current of GI Bill education and training program has been in operation less than two years. Yet, nearly three quarters of a million eligible veterans and servicemen have entered school or training under this program, W. R. Phillips, Manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office, reported today.

14,000 of them have entered training in North Carolina schools, Phillips said.

Since June 1, 1966, when the Veterans' Readjustment Benefits Act of 1966 educational provisions first went into effect, more than 701,000 eligible veterans and 45,000 servicemen have entered training. Enrollment in school or training at the end of March 1968 stood at almost 423,000 veterans and 27,000 servicemen.

Popularly known as the "Post-Korea" or "Third Generation GI Bill," the 1966 Act grants veterans with at least 181 days of military service (part of which was after January 31, 1955) up to 36 months of education and training benefits.

Viet Nam era veterans—i.e. those with at least 181 days of service, part of which was after August 4, 1964—and active duty military personnel with at least two years of service are included.

Nearly two-thirds—or approximately 223,000—of the Third Generation GI Bill beneficiaries on school or training rolls at the end of March were taking college level courses. This compares with about 51 per cent who entered college training under the Korean Conflict GI Bill and less than 30 per cent who pursued college level courses under the World War II GI Bill.

Veterans and servicemen entered in below-college-level training at the end of March totaled 155,000, with veterans accounting for nearly 15 per cent of this number.

Phillips said since October 1, 1957, when on-the-job, flight and cooperative farm training were added to the Third Generation GI Bill curriculum of approved training, nearly 6,200 veterans entered on-the-job training. An additional 8,000 veterans had enrolled in flight training courses as of March 31, 1968.

Another provision of the Veterans' Pension and Readjustment Assistance Act of 1967 relating to education and training permits veterans to complete high school, while receiving educational assistance allowances from VA, without having any of their entitlement to college level training reduced.

In only six months, between October and the end of March 1968,

more than 9,100 veterans had entered training to complete high school or college qualifying courses.

Phillips said veterans interested in attending school this summer or fall should contact their local VA Regional Office.

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

Charles Mayo of the famous Mayo Clinic said, "Worry affects the circulation, the heart, the glands, the whole nervous system and profoundly affects the health. I have never known a man who died from over-work, but many who died from doubt."

Worry can wriggle into everything we have done and plan to do if we let it. It will pursue us all of our lives unless we master it. Remember, there is nothing more useless than following your own heart.

APPLY PHOSPHORUS BEFORE OR AT PLANTING

Try to have all of your phosphorus on by the time your crop is planted. Phosphorus applied as a topdressing is generally less efficiently used than when it is placed in a band beneath the soil surface or broadcast and mixed with the soil says LEO F. WILLIAMS, County Extension Chairman. The main reason for this is that phosphorus moves very little in the soil, thus when it is placed on the soil surface it essentially remains there and the plant roots have difficulty in absorbing it.

One advantage arising from the immobile nature of phosphorus in the soil is its resistance to leaching. It will not leach away as can some of the more mobile nutrients like nitrogen and potassium. Phosphorus can be "fixed" in the soil

by iron and aluminum compounds, however, making it less available for plant use. This is particularly important in the "heavier" red clay soils of the Piedmont and Mountain regions.

Probably the phosphorus used fertilizer band beside and below the young plant or seed. Being beneath the soil surface and fairly close to the young plant roots, it is readily available to the plants. Since it is relatively concentrated in the band and does not contact a great volume of soil, "phosphorus fixation" is held to a minimum.

The amount of fertilizer that can be safely applied in a band is limited, so large applications of phosphorus designed to build up low soil phosphorus levels are usually broadcast and mixed with the soil. Once the soil has been built up to a medium level, annual "at planting" applications of mixed fertilizers containing phosphorus are generally sufficient to supply the needs of the crop.

In the case of pasture or sod crops, maintenance applications of phosphorus must be topdressing if any is to be applied. For this reason it is very important to have your soil tested so soil phosphorus can be built up to a medium to high level before planting; then only small maintenance applications should be needed.

Phosphorus is needed particularly by young plants to get off to a fast start. If possible, have your soil tested well ahead of planting time so you can build up now soil phosphorus levels with broadcast applications. This along with an "at planting" fertilizer application will assure you of the most efficient use of the phosphorus.

Cooleemee Plantation To Open Family Camping Resort Area

The Cooleemee Plantation will begin a new chapter in its long history of welcoming friends on travels and vacations when Forest Lake Family Camp Resort opens on June 1. In appreciation of the interest shown in the new recreation facility, Mr. and Mrs. Peter W. Hairston invite Davie County residents to be their guests and to bring their friends to see the camp and to visit the Plantation House from 2 to 4:30 Saturday and Sunday afternoons, June 1 and 2. The Cooleemee Plantation House was built in 1850-55 for J. E. B. Stuart's sister.

The opening will honor the many agencies, firms, and individuals who have helped plan and build Forest Lake.

Forest Lake Family Camp is located on U. S. Highway 64, half-way from Mocksville to Lexington, between Interstate Highways 40 and 65. The entrance is a half mile east of Davie County Road 1312, which leads to the Plantation House.

The new family resort offers every type of camping, from accommodations for large travel trailers to wilderness areas. All modern facilities are provided in a setting that recalls the historic past of the Plantation. A slave cabin, once Aunt Dinah's house, has been moved to the site where a cabin previously stood and has become the office and store for the camp. A big barn, circled by old farming equipment, has been renovated to provide a recreation center. An old rose, probably planted by the earliest settlers, blooms at the back of one of the campsites. Badminton and other sports and game courts are on a large grass field skirting the forest of hardwoods and pines. The Yadin River is close by to bring pleasure to campers, as it has to the generations who have fished its banks.

On the first of June, 50 campsites including a "daisy" with full

hook-ups for travel trailers will be opened to campers and all 100 sites will be available shortly. Five acres of water are ready for swimmers and boaters though the lake is not expected to reach its eventual size for another year. Forest Lake is named in honor of Phillip Forrest Jr., (better known as June Forrest) who has been a member of the Cooleemee Plantation team for 13 years. He was born on the Plantation, the third generation of his family to live on the place. The Forrest family once lived in the area now used for the camp. The 4,200 acres of the Plantation

are available to the campers for gentle walks or energetic hikes in exploration of the pleasures of country living. Campers are invited to drive to the parking area of the Plantation House and to walk through the grounds. After the Open House on June 1 and 2, the public rooms of the Cooleemee Plantation House will be open to campers on accompanied tours scheduled for Wednesday and Saturday afternoons. A fee will be charged and non-campers will be included only when there are vacancies in four groups. The Cooleemee Plantation lies on both sides of the Yadkin River, so

that part is in Davidson County though the larger section is in Davie. The river is the boundary for one side of the camp area and bends so that it runs at the foot of the terraces surrounding the Plantation House. The first settler on what is now Cooleemee Plantation was Daniel Garrot, who built a mill and bought a farm on the Davidson side in 1751. Phillip Williams, in 1759, is the first person known to have lived on the present "home shift" of the Davie County section of the Plantation. The Plantation has been in the

Federal Land Bank Opens Offices Here

The Federal Land Bank system, a national network of 12 district land banks and 695 local land bank associations—in its second half century of operations—moves ahead this month with renewed dedication of purpose to meet the essential long-term financial needs of the nation's farmers.

To better serve the credit needs of farmers and part-time farmers in Davie County, the Federal Land Bank Association of Winston-Salem, beginning the first Thursday in March, opened a part-time branch office in Mocksville. This office is located in the building recently occupied by the Ideal Production Credit Association situated at 129 N. Salisbury Street. Each Thursday at 10:00 A. M. a Bank representative from Winston-Salem will be available to talk with anyone interested in the services available through the Land Bank System.

George L. Crater, Manager of the Federal Land Bank Association of Winston-Salem announced that "Serving America's Farmers: Providers of Plenty," is the slogan officially adopted by the land banks and associations to guide the credit system during months and years ahead.

"Our system has coped with the variety of great demands made upon it during the past 50 years, all the while maintaining a dependable loan service to farmers," Mr. Crater stated.

He continued: "Despite times of complex adversity, the Land Bank system has grown into a farm financial institution of unparalleled strength and experience. In the years ahead we will continue to apply our imagination, wisdom, and flexibility in guiding and using our system to serve farmers' essential needs, whatever those needs may be and whatever economic situations may develop."

A total net worth in excess of \$1 billion of private, non-government assets plus solidly secured current loans totaling some \$5.5 billion, amounting to 22 percent of the total farm real estate mortgages outstanding in the United States, present a barometer of the system's capability to meet the challenge posed by today's national monetary situation, Mr. Crater said.

The multitude of demands on the money market for financing the war in Viet Nam, the country's domestic social programs and burgeoning industries, as well as the overall need to control the monetary situation so as to combat inflation, impose important broad new responsibilities on all of the nation's lenders, he continued.

Realizing its responsibilities, the Land Bank System is continuing a policy aimed at maintaining maximum stability in providing loans to farmers. This involves careful analysis of loan applications and prudent use of the money market with respect to bond sales for obtaining private funds for loans to farmers, Mr. Crater explained. "We also are striving to manage the System's capital assets so as to assure a continuity of service."

"Agriculture, cutting across all industrial, business and consumer activity, forms such a large part of the economy that decisions ma-

de for the good of the economy as a whole will prove of ultimate benefit to every farmer," Mr. Crater emphasized. "Land Bank policies formed in the context of total national economic considerations are motivated by a sense of prime responsibility to the farm economy."

As an example, Mr. Crater said, inflation is widely recognized as a strong force in a cost-price squeeze on farmers' operating margins. Any action which avoids or dampens inflation certainly benefits American agriculture. He said the Land Bank System is actively co-operating in this effort and yet, as it has in the past, is determined to move ahead to get a proper job done for farmers.

The Land Banks and associations comprise a system which is operated entirely on private funds, and is owned by its 394,000 member-borrowers whose elected directors formulate its policies.

A county-by-county listing of North Carolina's participation in the two programs during March showed Davie County with 322 persons. Union County had 313 and Dare County, 222.







SUPPLEMENTS INCOME

"Draperies making is enjoyable because you can obtain better quality, plus the correct length and fullness," believes Mrs. Ernest Fields, Oxford, Rt. 4, Granville County.

Besides making draperies for a dozen or more houses, Mrs. Fields supplements her income by sewing for children and adults, reports Mrs. Mary I. Parham, home economics Extension agent. Mrs. Fields developed these skills by attending special interest meetings of the Lewis Extension Homemakers Club, the agent adds.

PICK-UP WEDDING GIFTS

Brides-to-be in Caldwell County are invited to stop by the Extension home economics agent's office for a "pick-up wedding gift." The gift: a cookbook with recipes and homemaking hints, compiled by members of an Extension Homemakers Club.

When the brides receive the cookbook, they also find out about the other services Extension offers young people, Mrs. Hazel B. Lip, associate home economics Extension agent, says.

AID SHELTERED WORKSHOP

Whenever and where-ever there is a need, members of the Starlight Extension Homemakers Club, Onslow County are ready to help.

According to Mrs. Chase C. Padgett, home economics Extension agent, "a sheltered workshop recently opened in Jacksonville."

Purpose of the workshop, she explains, is to train mentally retarded and physically handicapped boys and girls in an occupation. Because of limited funds the

center is in need of equipment and furnishings, the agent adds. The Starlight Club voted to buy material and make draperies for the center's lounge. Also through their efforts a sofa and chair was added to the lounge area.

Members will continue finding ways to create a pleasant atmosphere for the mentally retarded and physically handicapped children who are enrolled in the workshop, the agent predicts.

PAYS TO HAVE KNOW-HOW

Sometimes, it pays to have the know-how, Mrs. Elsie B. Edwards, home economics Extension agent, Pasquotank County, believes.

Ten homemakers recently saved \$75 by learning to cane chairs, the agent observes.

One homemaker, Mrs. George Kirkwood, almost completed the bottom in her antique chair during the first day of a caning workshop. She carried the chair home, and her husband became interested in the project. By following the directions given in an Extension bulletin on Caning, Kirkwood applied the binding cane and tied the loose strands.

Now, Mrs. Kirkwood is working on the back of a rocking chair. The project would be expensive if she had to hire someone else to do the work. "Therefore, know-how pays off," Mrs. Edwards points out.

Stadium Authority Plans Speedway

The throaty roar of powerful racing engines and the smell of exhaust fumes has captured the attention of the North Carolina Stadium Authority, and the Authority has turned a portion of its attention to stock car racing.

The possibility of building a third super speedway in North Carolina is being taken into consideration by the Authority group, following a preliminary report from Darley/Gobar Associates of San Diego, California.

The Authority, which was created in the last session of the state legislature and its members appointed in December by Governor Dan Moore, employed the Darley-Gobar firm for the purpose of conducting studies in North Carolina. The firm's express purpose was to study population areas and the income in various sections of the state, and determine what types of professional sports each area would support.

The preliminary report shows that stock car racing heads the list in spectator appeal among sports fans in this state.

"We were astonished by the popularity of stock car in every area of the state that we are taking into consideration for construction of the stadium Authority.

"A super speedway has most certainly become a major part of our overall plan. We are planning a 2 1/2-mile racing plant, similar to the one at Daytona Beach, Fla.," added Matthews.

"We've had men at several of the big races on the NASCAR circuit this year, and six of us plan to attend the World 600 at Charlotte Motor Speedway on May 26. We've discussed the matter with Bill France, president of NASCAR, and he has shown a definite interest."

Matthews continued, "It should be pointed out, however, that the speedway will be an addition to complex area, and nothing has happened to change our plans toward building a football stadium to house a professional team."

As far as the speedway, Matthews said it would be the finest and most modern in the country. "Our facilities within the overall complex area will be the finest. We will be second to no one," he said.



Medicare Handbook Being Distributed In Davie County

Within the coming weeks, other people in Davie County will be receiving a new copy of "Your Medicare Handbook," a new up-to-date guidebook on their Medicare benefits, how the program works, and how payments are made.

Robert C. Thomas, social security district manager, said the new Handbook highlights the changes enacted in the 1967 social security amendments, improving protection and simplifying Medicare procedures. It has also been made easier for older people to read and understand.

In developing the new edition of "Your Medicare Handbook," Thomas said, the Social Security Administration sought the suggestions of elderly readers as well as experts in the field of communications and representatives of professional organizations.

Delivery of the new red, white, and blue edition to the 19.6 million Americans 65 began about May 1 and will be cycled over the next six weeks, Thomas said. In an introductory letter on the inside front cover of the new Handbook, Robert M. Ball, Commissioner of Social Security, reminds older people:

Peter Hairsten married his cousin Columbia Stuart, a sister of J. E. B. Stuart, and moved to the plantation in 1819, living first in a waxy wooden house that was an early stage in front of the present one.

Georgia's Lady's Bazaar of January 1958 carried a picture of the plantation and floor plans. The first plan for the house, dated 1820, called for beams 42 feet long and 12 inches square.

Some of the furniture now in the house is believed originally to be Revolutionary War Peter Hairsten and came from his Stokes County plantation, Saura Town. Much of the furniture was ordered for this house in 1755.

Columbia Stuart Hairsten died in 1837 and, in 1850, Peter Hairsten married Fanny Caldwell of Salisbury. During the Civil War, he served first with General J. E. B. Stuart and later with General Jubal Early.

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News and Comment from Our Raleigh Bureau

TOGETHERNESS . . . Like ham-and-eggs, molasses and sulphur, peaches-and-cream . . . so will it be soon in the operations of the Democratic Party and the Scott-for-Governor campaign.

By July 1, it should be impossible to tell where one stops and the other begins. Four years ago, dog-tired, the Moore people closed up shop for the summer and found it hard to get going again in the fall.

This time, there will be some changes made. The Scott camp, including the Democratic organization . . . all in the Hotel Sir Walter . . . will be as active in July as it was in April.

PLATFORM . . . Various key Democrats from throughout the State held a quiet little meeting one day last week to begin work on the Democratic Platform to be revealed at the Convention to be held in Raleigh on June 6.

But, after some sawing back-and-forth, it was decided that one man should have the main say-so in the construction of that building.

The man: Robert W. Scott of Haw River.

He's the man who's got to run on it, they said in effect, and he's the man who ought to write it. Look for a hum-dinger.

UNITY . . . While some of the old-line Stickleby Republicans are still groggy from the one-two-three knockout punch handed them by Jim Gardner on May 4, the Democrats seem to be coming along well with that rare commodity called unity.

With Bobby Kennedy's way-out tactics shaking to its very foundations the Party on the national level, N. C. Democrats feel they must work as never before to beat the Republicans at State level this fall.

Old-timers say what is needed most at this time is a long, give-and-take conference with these participants: Gov. Dan Moore, former Govs. Luther Hodges and Terry Sanford, and Democratic Nominees Scott and Pat Taylor.

Good . . . but there should be one other . . . at least: U. S. Sen. Sam Ervin, the leading vote-getter in the May 4 event and probably the most popular public figure today among all voters on the white side of the fence.

LOST FACE . . . Had Mel Broughton called for a second Primary, the Negroes could have been placed—or at least felt they could—in a position to do some horse-trading.

And, at the least, could have pointed to their 129,000 votes for Dr. Reginald Hawkins . . . a new pocket of strength for North Carolina blacks. In view of developments and statements of several weeks back, it is extremely doubtful if Hawkins could have delivered much of his vote to Broughton.

But he thought he could . . . and would have had fun, and a lot of excitement . . . and made . . . news, of course . . . in talking about it. This was all suddenly taken from him when Broughton, with good sense, said he wanted no second Primary.

This quick jerk-of-the-rug disappointed the Charlotte dentist no end. He thus bitterly denounced Mel Broughton as a "quitter".

Like Republican Jim Gardner and Democrat Hubert Humphrey, Dr. Hawkins, appropriately enough, has a lot of mouth, uses it effectively, and frequently hits a nerve. But, alas, not this time.

INVESTIGATION . . . Considering the relatively small role that the SBI plays in State Government here, it certainly has had its share of troubles.

This no doubt had a lot to do with the defeat of Attorney General Wade Bruton in the recent Primary. Also, it is not beyond imagination that Walter Anderson, kicked out by Bruton (the SBI is a wing of the Attorney General's office), gave a helping hand to Robert Morgan, the winner.

Morgan stated last week that there seems to be a lot of SBI politics; and that he was going to look into it at the earliest opportunity.

Well, for one reason or another, the SBI does seem to have a sorry public relations program. You hear rumors of envy, jealousy, and back-biting in this agency. The situation seems never at rest. Only last month . . . there was new talk that one of the oldest men in point of service in the SBI, a career man in every sense of the word, was getting out.

MORE . . . MORE . . . MORE
The nomination of Robert Morgan could cause him to change his mind, say the reports.

MCBRYDE . . . After Anderson, Methodist lay leader, was fired, Attorney General Bruton and advisors immediately began the search for a successor.

Meantime, editorials blazed away at Bruton. The SBI came in for its usual share of the knocks. The powers-that-be reached out to the State and brought in to head the SBI a Rockingham native, Myron H. McBryde. He had barely warmed his seat when he was in disagreement with the newspapers over some statement he made or didn't make.

Within a few weeks came rumors—and they persist—that he plans to stay in the job "only a year or two" to gain prestige for law practice. There is seldom a dull moment in the SBI.

THE BIG SQUEEZE
Few farmers need to be told that they have been caught up in an ever tightening cost-price squeeze. While the cost of items needed for production of farm commodities has continued to increase steadily, the prices farmers receive for their products have increased but little. When production costs go up and prices received for products do not keep pace, there can be but one inevitable result - lower profits. This is the problem, but what can be done about it?

If one looks at the costs of the major farm production inputs: farm real estate, farm wages, farm machinery and fertilizer, over the past 10 years, it can be readily seen that of these inputs all have steadily increased in cost except one - fertilizer. "But", you say, "Fertilizer is higher than it was 5 or 10 years ago." The cost per ton is perhaps, but it must be kept in mind that analysis or plant nutrient content has also increased, so you are getting more plant food per ton than before. And this is really what must be considered when buying fertilizer.

Since there is little a farmer can do to change the prices he receives, he must look toward reducing production costs if he is to increase his profits. The real estate, labor and machinery costs are about the same whether you produce 75 or 125 bushels of corn per acre. This means the cost of producing a bushel of corn is less if you are getting the higher yield. To get higher yields will probably require better management and more fertilizer. Crop responses to fertilizer suggest a return of \$2-\$3 for every dollar spent on fertilizer, a present price-cost relationship.

This does not mean fertilizer should be used indiscriminately even though it is less expensive today, relative to other production inputs, than it has been. It is more important than ever before to spend your fertilizer dollar wisely. Buy what you need.

The best way to determine what you need is to have your soil tested. The soil test results can be used as a guide in determining the amounts and proper ratio of plant nutrients to apply. It will also tell you the amount of lime needed, an input too often overlooked and considered unimportant due to its relatively low cost.

Use your soil testing service, provided for you by the North Carolina Department of Agriculture. A good fertility program plus good management practices are necessary to obtain high yields and lower your per unit production costs. This is the best way to combat the big squeeze.

Senator Sam Ervin Says:

The Poor Peoples March on Washington is a matter of concern to every American. Poverty and the conditions which it breeds are serious problems for our country and our people. No one denies that. Moreover, there is no question that the individuals conducting this campaign have the legal right to petition the government for a redress of grievances so long as they do so in an orderly manner. There is concern, however, about the wisdom of bringing large numbers of people for any prolonged camp-in in Washington. Earlier last month, Washington suffered a tragic riot, and any condition which might lead to further disorders is of great concern. Congress is probing the plans by the Federal

Government to maintain law and order during the March on Washington.

There is much concern, too, about how the demands presented to the Federal Government for increased social and welfare programs will fit into an already deficit-ridden spending program. The leaders of the March on Washington have demanded among other things "a guaranteed annual income". Congress is presently wrestling with a proposed \$156 billion budget submitted by the President for the fiscal year beginning July 1, and has been told by the President that he will resist any budget cuts that exceed \$4 billion. Moreover, Congress is faced with Federal spending authorizations carried over from prior years totaling \$222 billion. To put the matter simply, the impoverished citizen has come to the most deficit-ridden Treasury on earth to propose new demands for Federal spending.

It is well to mention that already Federal relief costs exceed \$9 billion annually. Education, training, and free health programs to the poor total another \$6 billion annually. Other Federal programs for the benefit of the poor amount to about \$10 billion annually. So before any new demands for the poor are considered, Congress will be considering a \$25 billion outlay for the poor. I do not think this budget is particularly stingy.

Of particular legislative concern is the demand that Congress should pass a bill guaranteeing that every American shall have an annual income of \$4000 or some other large amount. I cannot think of any legislation that would be more tragic for our nation and our people than for the Federal Government to pay everybody a wage for existing. This one act would rob Americans of the incentive to produce the goods and services essential to the functioning of our economy. It is conceivable that the effect of this bill would be to create a situation that would deprive everybody of essential goods and services, because many individuals would no longer care whether they worked and produced or sat around in idleness all day.

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John Norton And Davie High

Davie County Consolidated High School has come a long way since the consolidation in 1956.

In the first seven formative years, it was Dave Stilwell that welded together the various county factions and developed a single high school institution out of four. It was the patience and understanding of Mr. Stilwell that made the transition of the Davie County school system a relative smooth accomplishment.

Four years ago John N. Norton took over the reins of the Davie County High School. Mr. Norton was singularly dedicated to the task of making the Davie County High School one of the top schools in the state. His purpose, as he often said, was to make Davie County High an institution from which one would be proud to have a diploma and one from which a diploma would carry much meaning in comparison to others of the state.

This was no easy task. Much was lacking at the high school in 1964. The first task was one of discipline . . . in making it loud and clear that the school was there for the benefit of the students and not the students there for the benefit of the school. Of the establishing of a firm policy with the faculty that each and every teacher was expected to be a teacher in the truest sense of the word and not just class monitors.

The four years of John N. Norton at Davie High speak for themselves. The local school is now fully accredited by the Southern Association of High Schools and by the State of North Carolina. The curriculum has been broadened so as to compare favorably with any in the state.

The federal mandate for integration has been accomplished with no serious incident. And the level of academic excellence has been accelerated to the point where graduates of Davie High are now more than holding their own as they seek additional higher education.

Of course John Norton did not accomplish this alone. He had the cooperation and help of many others. But as principal of the Davie High School it was his responsibility and it is to his credit that the past four years has increased the status of his school.

One of the largest and best high school systems in the state said it louder and clearer than any words of praise. . . . Needham-Broughton of Raleigh took a long and hard look at Mr. Norton and Davie High . . . and they liked what they saw. By employing Mr. Norton to take over their school of more than 2,000 students, the Raleigh school officials paid not only Mr. Norton, but the Davie County High School, the highest compliment possible.

It is of course with regret that the people of Davie County give up a principal like Mr. Norton. However, time marches on and such changes are inevitable.

Winston-Salem Leaders Hear Jo Cooley Architectural Barriers

Miss Jo Cooley described what Mocksville was doing to aid the handicapped at a meeting in Winston-Salem of the Mayor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped.

Miss Cooley told the group that in Mocksville ramps have been placed at street corners and at the entrances of all churches, library, hospital and post office. Water fountains in public buildings are low enough for people in wheel chairs to use.

State Representative Howard Twigg of Wake County also told the group that after July 1st, no building open to the public in North Carolina will be built with architectural barriers which prevent handicapped persons from using it.

Twigg introduced an architectural barriers bill in the last session of the N. C. General Assembly. The bill passed the House but was killed by the Senate Calendars Committee.

Instead the N. C. Building Code Council adopted a plan which calls for a ramp at the entrance of buildings an elevator at the level of the ramp entrance, door openings 32-inches wide, and toilets, public telephones, light controls and warning signals which can be used by the handicapped.

Winston-Salem leaders are being urged to plan the redevelopment of the downtown Winston-Salem area so that it will be accessible to the handicapped.

Soil Stewardship Week is a significant recognition of man's obligation to the natural and spiritual worlds of which he is a part.

Responsibility for stewardship of land and water does not end when a farm becomes a housing complex or a commercial center or a surface mine. It does not end when half of the community shows concern for resource waste and abuse.

Soil Stewardship Week each year is a time of national resolve toward good care of the earth that is our heritage. It is a time of thankfulness to those who make God their partner in managing their share of the three-fourths of America that is in private hands.

In 1968 it is especially a time for initiative - for finding ways and taking action to use the soil and our other great natural resources in the service of freedom and human dignity as well as plenty.

None of these aims is served by pollution, erosion and waste . . . by disorganized or haphazard urban growth . . . by bleak, crowded vistas . . . by making children get acquainted with natural resources only through a car window or television screen. These problems are too much with us.

We need initiative, and innovation, and reeducation to the principles of stewardship that soil and water conservation districts have advanced for three decades. We need to employ judgment and choice, intellect and imagination, and support and coordination in resource improvement and use.

Clean water and air, productive and beautiful land, and space for relaxing need not be endangered. We have the knowledge and the ability to do whatever is required to protect and improve these resources. We have the capacity to assure not only food and shelter, but also hope and dignity and opportunity for all men.

Now is the time for every American to recognize and accept personal involvement in the efforts toward that goal. It is an undertaking worthy of the best each of us has to offer. It is a part of our duty to our fellow men and our Creator.






Women Get Chances In U. S. Air Force

New concepts of equal opportunity for women, keyed with presidential and Department of Defense policy, have opened many new positions for young women who are high school and college graduates, Sergeant Raymond C. Asaro, local Air Force recruiter announced.

A new and refreshing air surrounds the "New WAF" (Women in the Air Force) as they begin their 20th year as an integral part of the U. S. Air Force. In fact, challenging assignments, educational programs and job classifications are being offered WAF today that were unthought of in past years.

Sgt. Asaro said, "a revitalized WAF program has increased its ranks from 5,000 last June to 8,800 now. Figures are expected to reach 8,800 by June 1969 and climb to 13,700 by the mid 1970's," he added.

Soil Acidity Eats Up Profits

Planting time is almost here. Are your soils too acid to permit production of high yielding crops? Soil acidity is one of the principle factors limiting crop production in North Carolina says Leo Williams, County Extension Chairman.

Once a crop is planted there is little that can be done to correct soil acidity. This is because lime requires some time to react with the soil to neutralize soil acidity. For best results lime should be applied several months before planting time and should be well mixed with the soil. However, if your soil needs it, lime applied the day before you plant is better than no lime at all.

Too much lime can be just as bad as too little. So how do you tell if your soil needs lime, and if so, how much? The only way to accurately determine lime needs is to have your soil tested. If you haven't had your soil tested do so right away. Soon it will be too late to do anything about correcting soil acidity for this season's crops.

Soil sampling supplies are available at your county agricultural office. Don't be one of the many North Carolina farmer's whose yields and profits are cut by soil acidity.


Damage to the car was estimated at \$150.


Meeting Monday To Consider Symphony

Plans for bringing the North Carolina Symphony orchestra to Davie County next spring will be outlined by Jerald J. Pierce, Director of Community Services for the symphony, at a public meeting to be held at the Davie County Public Library at 7:30 p. m., Monday evening, June 3. Mr. Pierce of Chapel Hill indicated to a preliminary meeting of interested citizens on May 14 that dates were then open for Little Symphony concerts in March, 1969.

The North Carolina Symphony was the first state symphony in the country when organized in 1932. Next season will mark the twenty-fourth annual tour, which takes the full symphony of 65 musicians and the two Little Symphonies of 28 musicians each to a total of about 70 North Carolina communities. The current season included 155 concerts throughout the state.

The North Carolina Symphony Society has 67 community chapters, which sponsor the concerts. A preliminary organization of the Davie County chapter was recently effected, and the meeting Monday night is to plan for securing memberships and arranging for Davie County concerts has been called by this organization.

A feature of the symphony program is the free matinee for children. Children receive classroom instruction to prepare them for the concerts. "Symphony Stories," a pamphlet for children contains the concert program; words to songs, music for simple instruments; and information about composers.

Mr. Dobson, a native of Iredell County, spent three years in Peru helping to intensify a program of food production.


Mr. Dobson told the Rotarians that living in such a country as Peru for a period of time would make a family appreciate America more.

Taxpayers Ask I.R.S.

Question-and-Answer Column No. 68-21

This column of questions and answers on federal tax matters is provided by the local office of the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers. The column answers questions most frequently asked by taxpayers.

Q - I have an extension until the middle of June to file my return as the result of illness. Is it true I'll have to pay interest on my taxes when I do file?

A - Yes, interest at the rate of six percent a year must be added to taxes that are not paid in full by the filing deadline. This interest must be paid even though a taxpayer has received an extension of time to file his return.

Q - I made a mistake on my return which led me to overstate my income by several hundred dollars. Can I file for a refund on this even though I have not received the refund I requested on my original return?

A - Yes, you can correct this filing error now even though the refund on your original return has not arrived. Obtain a copy of Form 1040-X from your local IRS office and follow the instructions on this form for correcting your mistake. You will receive a separate refund for the differences between your original refund claim and the corrected claim.

Q - Are school prizes and honors taxable? I just won a science award.

A - Whether the prize is taxable or not depends on the circumstances under which it was won. If you had to perform a specific act to win the prize, such as write an essay or develop an experiment, the prize would be taxable. A prize given in recognition of past accomplishments is not taxable if the recipient is selected without action on his part and is not expected to render future services.

Q - My son is going to work this summer. How can he get a social security card?

A - Application for a social security number should be made on Form SS-5. This form is available at local Social Security and IRS offices.

Q - Do you have any publication that shows what taxes a small businessman has to pay?

A - A tax calendar for businessmen is part of IRS Publication 334, "Tax Guide for Small Business."

To obtain a separate copy of this tax calendar send a post card to your District Director asking for Document No. 5046, "Tax Calendar and Check List for 1968."

Q - My son is taking a job this summer and plans to put most of the money he earns in the bank to pay his college expenses in the fall. If he earns over \$600, will we lose our dependency exemption for him?

A - If your son is under 19 or is a full-time student, the amount of money he earns will not disqualify him from being claimed as your dependent as long as the other dependency tests are met.
