Contrary to the general belief that oll weevils must be eradicated c reduced in numbers by expensive poisoning in order to produce a co cessful farmers that increased yields and profits may be had under boll weeil conditions in spite of the weevil d without the use of poisons where the infestation is not too heavy. Mos of the steps required are included in what may be called "better farming As they have to do mainly, with the rrowth and culture of the plant, they are generally known as "cultural methods of boll weevil control." However, the foreging statement should not be understood to mean that polson is not required to produce inaximum yield, and profit. Cultural methods should go hand in hand with the use of poison and by the use of both in the proper way a profitable crop is assured. Use of cultural methods alone is practicable, only when conditions are such that poison can not be used and when the infest

tion is slight. Where no poison will be used it is aspecially important to use for cotton only the most fertile, well-drained solls where the yielding ability is good and, if possible, located away from woods which might shelter weevils in the winter. To reduce the weevil attack cotton should not follow cotton. A change of grops reduces insect attack and increases, yields. Beating the boll weevil depends bot on an extra early date of plant-ing but on the crop making a very rapid growth after it is planted. Early preparation of the ground, so there will be a firm, smooth and well settled seed abed at planting time, is very important. Flanting should be delayed until all danger from frosts and cold is past and the soll is warm enough to insure quick sprouting, rapid growth and a good stand. Shallow cultivation should be giv-

'en every week or ten days, and con tinued as late as necessary to keep the crop free from weeds and grass. Cultivation promotes the growth and fruiting of the plant but does not kill boll weevils directly. It is a known and proven fact that with heavy or light infestation of the weevils, with the application or with out the application of polson, better farming pays under any and all con-ditions. The coons or the house where the baby chicks sleep should be kept clean, dry, and senitary, should he free from lice and mites, and should afford protection from cats and nocturnal vermin; such as rats,

which prey upon chicks. The mother of the baby chicks should be confined in a coop or house, and the baby chicks should be allowed free range. If the mother is confined, the baby chicks will range around the mother, but will remain within a limited area of her. In case of rain or hawks, the mother can call the haby chicks to her and protect them in the coop, When the mother is allowed free range, the weaker bally chicks will be lost or become so weak that they will die on the range. FIGHTING BOLL WEEVI

Numerous Tests Prove That Calcium Arsonate Dusting Method Is Best.

That the calcium arsenate dusting method for controlling the boll weevil enables cotton producers in every pordon of the cotton belt to obtain a larger yield to the acre and a larger application of other poisons such as state-experiment stations under aver age conditions.

Tests at these stations were made under the supervision of trained workers "with "facilities" at their disposal for checking as accurately as possible the results. Tracts that were dusted or poisoned by other means were checked against untreated tracis and the final results compared. Comparisons of the costs of treatment, ylelds and profits or losses in the various states, as reported by the stations, were as follows:

North Carolina-The average cost per acre for applications of the homemixed molasses-calcium-arsenate mixture (one gallon of molasses, " one gallon of water and one pound of calcium arsenate) was \$1.59; commercial liquid poison; \$7.23, and calcium arsenate in dust form, \$9.27. The plats treated with the home mixture showed in increase in yield over the untreated of 24 pounds of seed cotton, those treated with commercial mixture an increase of 80 pounds, and those treated with dust 241 pounds, Profit or loss was: 'home mixture,' gain of \$1.50 per acre; commercial- mix-

Our boys scored one in the first rame, with a walk, sacrificed and two bagger by "Sure-hit" Richardson, They scored 5 more in the six by hits and errors.


