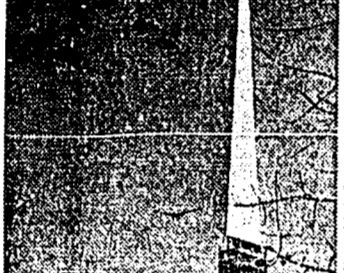

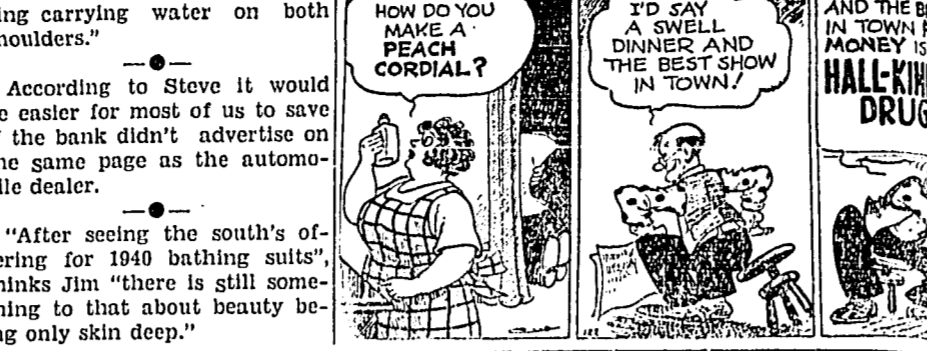

After inspecting a number of sites, the Mumford farm, owned by E. L. Galtner and located on the Stateville highway almost opposite the filling station of Foster & Deadmon, was selected Wednesday as the site for the C. C. C. camp for Davie county.

Final selection of the camp site was made by Capt. L. C. Rossier and Lt. H. J. Forb, representing the U. S. Army; Alva E. Groce of Greensville, S. C. and E. C. Jernigan of Salisbury, Virginia and area officers of the Soil Conservation Service.

Baracks to be moved include two barracks which are quarters for the boys and a barrack each of the following: quarters for officers, dining hall, recreation hall, army office, mess hall and area office of the Soil Conservation Service.

WORK DONE The work of the C. C. C. boys, whose labor costs the farmer nothing, comprises the following: gully control, diversion ditches, outlet channels, meadow waterways, planting kudzu, planting trees, building fences for pasture improvement, staking terracing lines. Special attention will be given to badly eroded areas on the farm by mulching, seeding and sodding.
