Site of original church is now covered by a growth of trees and shrubs. Mrs. Mary Frost Woodruff says that a parochial school stood immediately west of the church and Mrs. Sophie Williams was a teacher in this school. A corner stone of said school is still in place and is south of the grave of the Onque woman.

Peter Hundley's home was located further down the hill on the west and nearer Long Branch, now built over, by the Lexington road. His blacksmith shop was just across the road from his house.

A brick yard west of Peter Hundley's is remembered and west of that on the side of the rising hill on west, stood a cotton mill.

Gallows Hill, M.F.W. says was called by that name because one man was hanged there.

The graveyard near by, had a rock wall built around several graves, - a Clement graveyard, she thinks. Some of the stones had data carved on them, but she remembers no names.

With reference to the graveyard on gallows hill. Mrs. Linda Clement Hines: She remembers no rock wall, nor any marked stones. Her mother, Mrs. Baxter Clegg Clement told her that she did not know who was buried in that graveyard.

Presbyterian Churches Get New Look

The Mocksville Second & The Mt. Vernon United Presbyterian Churches will have a new look in the future, says F. D. Johnson, Jr., the pastor. "IMPROVE OR MOVE" is the challenge presented to the Churches by the pastor, as its goal for the present.

The Mocksville Second Church which was built in 1910 is being remolded. The present wooded structure when completed will be bricked. Stained glass windows will replace the present windows, the inside will be completely remolded with two additions, a ladies parlor and a larger pastor's study.

The educational unit of the church was remolded last year. A manse replacing the old manse built some years ago was built in 1964.

At the Mt. Vernon Church, Woodleaf, the same type work is being done. Stained glass windows replaced the old windows at Mt. Vernon in 1964. The educational unit there is being remolded with the addition of the dining area added to the church replacing the "Hut" that has been used for this purpose through the

The Rev. R.A. Massey - A Local Leader

The funeral was held last Thursday afternoon for a man that was a leader in Davie County and the Mocksville community for more than 16 years.

The Rev. Robert Aaron Massey died Sunday at the Charlotte Memorial Hospital of an apparent heart attack. He had been in declining health for four months. At the time of his death he was a resident of 307 Underhill Street, High Point, N.C.

The funeral was held at the St. Paul's Presbyterian Church in High Point and was conducted by Dr. J.D. Peterson, pastor of the Grace Presbyterian Church of Winston-Salem. Burial was in Floral Garden Park Cemetery also in High Point.

The Rev. Massey was born in Waxhaw, N.C. July 2, 1913. He attended the Waxhaw Elementary School, then went to High Point where he attended the William Penn High School, playing on the football team, a member of the glee club and the scholastic honor society. Receiving a scholarship to college, he attended the Johnson C. Smith University in Charlotte and received his AB degree. He attended the Johnson C. Smith Seminary receiving the Bachelor of Divinity degree in 1941. In 1947 he received his Master's degree in Christian Education from McCormick Seminary in Chicago.

In 1938 he began his work as a student supply at the Presbyterian churches in Boonville and Mt. Airy. In October of 1938 he became pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church of Mocksville, the Mount Vernon Presbyterian Church of Woodleaf, and the Knox Chapel Mission of Cooleemee. After his ordination in 1942, he served full time pastorates at these churches.

During his ministry the membership of each of these churches almost doubled. Physical plants were enlarged to include education facilities, kitchens, centralized heating units, etc.

During the sixteen years as a resident of Mocksville, Mr. Massey was active in all areas of religious and civic work. He served the local prison camp as chaplain; he was a member of and served as president of the local ministerial association. He was the financial clerk of the Yadkin Presberty Synod and was on the commission to the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church USA, serving on several committees. He held important posts in the Corinthian Chapter of the Masonic Lodge here.

He served as a scoutmaster for Boy Scout Troop 501 that had an enrollment of 30 boys at one time. During World War II he served on the man power commission that supported a "work or fight movement. During each of the years he was a loyal worker for the Red Cross drives and the March of Dimes campaigns.

In 1952, Mr. Massey was selected to

represent the interest of Davie County in the settlement of the George T. Brown estate. This involved money designated for the hospital care of needy Negroes in Davie and Forsyth counties. The original plan failing to materialize made it seem that all hopes for Davie County to receive local benefits from the will were doomed until the decision was recalled and a petition was made for an alternate settlement. On August 14, 1954, the Rev. Massey signed the papers which brought Davie County \$10,000 to be used in the construction and service of the Davie County Hospital.

Dr. Ralph Felton of Drew Seminary pointed up the life of the Rev. R.A. Massey in his book entitled "Go Down Moses", a study of 21 successful rural ministries.

In March of 1955, the Rev. R.A. Massey left this area for Fayetteville where he organized the College Heights Presbyterian Church. He later served as pastor of the Dalebrook Presbyterian Church in Winston-Salem for two years and for the past eight years had been pastor of the St. Paul's Presbyterian Church in High Point.

Leaving this area in 1955, Mr. Massey said:

"Even though my new field is a challenge, I regretfully leave my present charges and the friends I have made. I wish to thank all who have contributed in anyway towards making the past 16 years profitable, prosperous and pleasant."

He was married to Cora Lee Morton Massey of Salisbury who survives. Other survivors include two sons, Wilbur Massey, stationed in Germany and Robert Massey of Fayetteville; two daughters, Miss Barbara Massey of New York, N.Y. and Miss Avis Massey of the home; and two grandchildren.

Second Presbyterian Organized Shortly After Civil War

The Second Presbyterian Church was organized shortly after the Civil War.

The first reference to the church in Mocksville was in the second annual report of the General Assembly's Committee on Freedmen of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, presented on May 1, 1867, in Pittsburgh, Pa.

The first listing of the church under a Presbyterian was listed in the minutes of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church in the United States of America, held in 1868. In 1883 the church was connected with the Synod of the Atlantic and the Presbytery of the Yadkin. In the process of getting money to build a church, members asked for a loan of \$75 from the Synod of Atlanta.

Second Presbyterian Church was organized in 1867. Prior to this, Negro slaves, who at one time comprised 40 percent of the congregation, occupied the galleries on each side of the sanctuary of First Presbyterian Church in Mocksville.

In 1893, land was secured for the new church. Land running parallel with the Midland Railroad on the west and the Colored Graveyard lot, the school house lot and the Peter Hundley

lot on the east and on the south by the Mocksville and Lexington Road. The date was Feb. 5, 1893.

The first trustees were Peter Hundley, Samuel Clement, Aaron Eddiger, Peter Kerr and T.R. Hellard. (Hellard and Hundley made their mark, as they could not write their names.)

The minister was Rev. Crawford. His wife's name was Sophie. Their children were Jimmie, Will and Herbert. (Herbert was married to Alvina Cain.) Their daughters were Lillie and Carrie. After Rev. Crawford died, his widow married Rev. Williams. Mrs. Williams taught in the Parochial School next door to the church.

This church was destroyed by fire on a cold Sunday morning. They saved the organ and most of the seats. The building was a total loss with no insurance.

The new church was built at the present site in 1910. The new brick mance replacing the old white frame manse was built in 1964. The educational unit was added to the church in 1967.

In 1968, the white frame church was remodeled and the structure was bricked. Improvements were made to the interior also. Stained glass windows replaced the old ones. A ladies parlor and a large study were added. More restoration was done in the base-

ment of the church. In 1983, new tables were purchased for the dining area. Windows were repaired and new doors replaced the old ones. In 1985, the basement was given a new coat of paint. The work done from 1967-March 1985, was done while Rev. F.D. Johnson was pastor.

A church and its surrounding buildings are like any other. Structures are constantly in need of repair. Something will wear out and need to be repaired or replaced altogether. By 1985, it was time to do just this sort of thing. Officers and members who were deeply concerned about the welfare of the church, began to do what needed to be done to refurbish the church. Some members gave money. Some members gave money and time. All gave out of love for and concern for the well-being of the church.

To begin with, the windows in the sanctuary were in dire need of repair. So, new windows were installed. At a later time, Venetian blinds were added to each window.

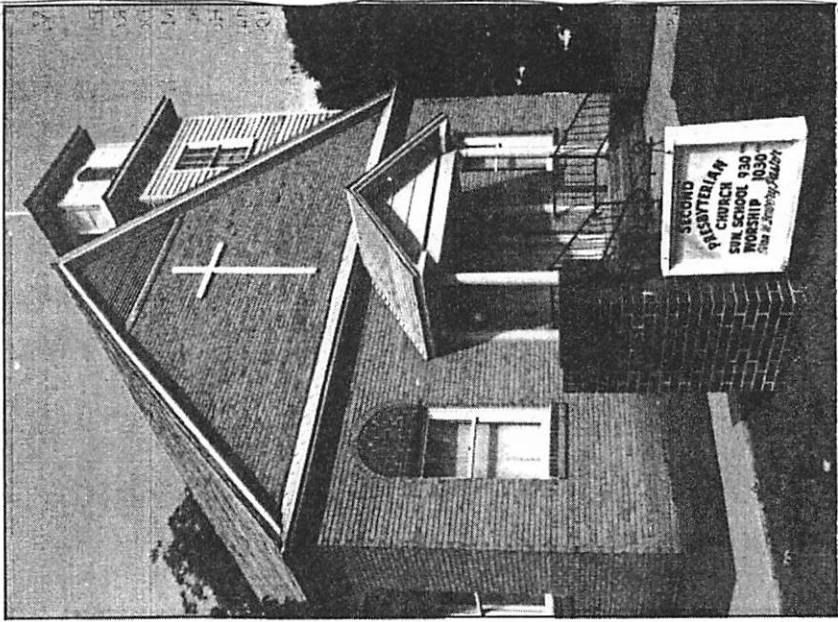
The front doors were replaced with new heavy wooden doors that would close properly. Also, a new door was installed in the minister's study. The furniture in the pulpit was re-upholstered. A concrete walk was poured from the front of the church to the basement steps. Improvements were made in the bathrooms. A new water fountain replaced the old one. A much needed cloak rack was added to the choir room. The bell tower was re-done. A metal door replaced the wooden door of the basement.

Before cold weather, a new furnace was installed in 1988. In 1989, an air conditioner was installed.

For both comfort and convenience, wall-to-wall carpeting was added to the sanctuary. New wall cabinets replaced the old ones in the kitchen. This was done in 1993. These are some of the improvements made for the church during the time that Rev. Ivan Lowery has been minister at Second United Presbyterian Church in Mocksville. (On the first Sunday in May, 1987, Rev. Ivan Lowery was installed as pastor of Second Presbyterian Church.)
