### **Hearts Can Function** 15 Minutes After Death My Mother.

How soon after death would a Mrs. D. F. Winters heart have to be removed from the body to permit its successful transplantation to another individual? A tentative answer to this question was given in a report at the recent scientific sessions of the American Heart Association, according to Dr. B. L. Richards, Medical Repreenta tive of the Davie Heart Council.

In guinea pigs at least, reported Doctors S. Frank Redo and Frank Glenn of the New York Hospital Cornell Medical Center, 15 minutes after death seems to be the maximum delay compatible with centinued function. The guinea rig hearts were placed in a solution that would keep a live heart beating, and muscle contraction force and electrical activity were compared for hearts removed 15. 30, and 60 minutes little tots to you we would go, for

Hearts removed up to 15 minutes after death functioned essentially as well as live hearts; hose removed 30 minutes after death recovered only about 50% of what would be normal activity: and those removed 40 to 60 minutes after death showed some electrical impulses, but no measurable muscle contraction.

Although differences between guines pigs and humans undoubt edly exist, the investigators concluded: "The results suggest that there is a definite, probably short period of time after death that a heart can be removed and still tors you had to depend upon. function."

Other important scientific problems must be solved before the long sought goal of substituting health for diseased hearts in humans can be achieved. Dr. Richards pointed out. Among these are the need to overcome the bodily mechanisms that normally result in the destruction of most transplanted tissues, and the development of methods for acquiring and storing hearts.

### Cotton Referendum To Decide Important Questions

How farmers vote in the cotton penalties will apply and also the level of price support for 1962 crop cotton. The referendum therefore is of vital concern to every cotton grower, says J. N. Smoot, Chairman of the Davie County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

The marketing quota program will be in operation for next year's crop the chairman explains, if at least two thirs of the votes cast in the referendum are in favor of the program. In that case, price support will be available to growers who comply with their farm allotments for the 1962 crop of cotton at a level between 65 and 90 per cent of parity, and quota penalties will apply on any "excess" cotton. If more than one third of the votes are against quotas, there would be no quota penalties and the price support level to eligible growers would drop to 50 per cent of parity.

Chairman Smoot explains that, even though qoutas are disapproved, acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibity for price

All farmers who were engaged in the production of cotton in 1962 will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

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## The Murals Of North Carolina



depicting significant Fourteen murals events in North Carolina's history . . . now adorn the wall in the assembly room of the Joseph Palmer Knapp Building, Institute of Government, University of North Carolina. These murals were painted by Francis Vandeveer Kughler.

The Institute of Government has made available to this newspaper copies of these murals along with the story of what they represent. Believing these to be of interest to our readers, we are presenting them in order . . . THE MURALS OF NORTH CAROLINA.

Mural Fourteen PLEIADES, MYSTERY OF THE FUTURE

This is a mural with occult connectations—one deriving from ancient times and with Biblical

The number seven has always been identified with the godhead. In Revelation IV:5 we read: . and there were seven lamps of fire burning before the throne which are the seven spirits of God." The seven stars that constitute the uster of the Pleiades were the first zodiac and ere considered the source of heavenly influence. They are part of the constellation Taurus, the Always associated with Taurus is Orien, the great heavenly hunter, who is conceived to be waging a fierce battle with Taurus. Orion is depicted in various ways in ancient

star charts. In his right hand he is conceived as holding aloft a huge club and in the other, a lion's head shields, or sometimes just the skin of a lion with the head left on it. However, the artist said that this ancient sky picture seemed incongruous, for a shield would obviously be no protection against a charging bull. Figuring out that the scene depicted a bullfight as it is carried on in Spain to the present day, it was ascertained that instead of using a cloak to excite the bull, as does the toreador, Orion was using the skin of a lion. The head of the lion was not removed, posprobable that it was not know at that time that any moving object would have had the same effect of arousing the bull's anger. The heavenly battle between Orion and the bull is the background in the scene. The form of the bull's vast bulk was painted as looking ominously above Orion from the heavens and on his back the small star cluster of the seven sisters of the Pleiades. In the center of the canvas are the seven Pleiades in the form of human beings a little larger than life.

The heavenly influence attributed in ancient mes to this constellation derived from the mystical qualities latent in the number seven. However, at most times only six stars are visible to the nakec eyc, because one of the stars is so near to another as to seem part of it. This was made much of in ancient legends, for the seventh star was presumed to have hidden herself for varis noted in Genesis where the world is created red light.

It is also preserved in the beaten gold candelabrum of the Bible with its six branches and seven lamps the central stem constituting the seventh.

The seven Pleiades, as representatives of the gochead, had to be awe inspiring and embody both the fecund and the austere aspects of divine purpose. They had to carry the sensation of great power as well as of human suffering and experience.

Since the heavenly influence attributed to the Pleiades is essentially of the geomtric nature of the godhead, the artist used the symbolism of kabbalistic lore which clearly defines these categor.es. They are listed in the "Sephys Yetrirah," the Book of Formation, and in the "Zohar," the Book of Splendor. Tis symbolism has also, in a popular sense, been embodied in the "Tarot"

cards, the percusor of our ppresent playing cards.
In ancient Hebrew there were no separate symbols for numbers. The letters themselves carried this honnotation — the first five letters aleph being one, the second letter beth two, and the third letter g.mel three, and so cn. Aside from its literal meaning, the sum of all the letters of a word gives its numerical value and, consequently, its geometric meaning. The fulfillment of a name, and in particular a Holy name, was the sum total of its geometric permutations, which in the correct ensembled produced the unified godhead.

In the mural the four lower sisters are endowed with the attributes of the four worlds of the elemental scheme, the Kabbla. The Pleiad in the center represents Atziloth, the World of Emenations, from which all things derive. The Hebrew name of this world, the number of sibly in the belief that the bull would consider it its name, and part of the secret key numbers of a real lion and respond accordingly. 



## THE NORTHWEST DEVELOPMENT ASSOCIATION

Northwest North Carolina Development Association will hold it's eighth annual meeting in Elkin. The eighth anniversary of this organization highlights the progress that has been made in the eleven county area served by this association since it's inception.

The Northwest North Carolina Development Association was organized in 1954 following a meeting of county representatives held in North Wilkesboro. A review of conditions then and now will show the growth that has taken place in this area.

ing establishments in this northwest area. In 1960, this number had increased to 765. These 607 manufacturing establishments were providing employment for 55,000 in 1954. In 1960 more than 73,000 were employed in industry in this area. Industrial income for the workers in 1954 was 158 million. In 1960 it had risen to 215 million.

And in agriculture: Agricultural income in 1954 was 54.5 million and had increased to 110 milion in 1960. The greatest increase was in livestock—from 11.4 million in 1954 to 52 milion dollars in 1960.

In addition to the tangible benefits butlined above, there has also been much done in the realm of attracting tourists into this area and the developing of the travel and recreation program. There is also the community development program in which communities have been encouraged to improve their living conditions and provide improved service for the

One of North Carolina's leading industrialists has said, "The greatest asset of Northwest North Carolina is-people."

From its inception eight years ago, the Northwest North Carolina Development Association has proved by word and deed that the best way to improve is to do it yourself, using home-grown folks and talents.

The eleven-county area of Northwest North Carolina has been faced for a long time with two big problems: low per capita income and movement of young people away from the area because of little industrial opportunity. Work of the Association is done through these five divisions, with citizens from the eleven counties serving on the Board of Directors.

The past record of growth has been sound and steady, led by the belief that the best course to development is through the efforts of the people. In other words, the people of Northwest North Carolina did not want to leave their problems in Washington or in the hands of federal agencies. Governor. In Sweden the timberline has climbed as high as 65 feet up mcuntain slopes since 1930.



> Glaciers have retreated in many areas Park on the United States-Canadian bord er, several of the largest glaciers have disappeared in the 20th century. For a while it looked as if all might melt. Since 1950, however, they have held their own.

> The sea level rose measurably during a recent 18-year period when the effect of melting polar ice was studied. British climatologist C. E. P. Brooks has estimated that a worldwide temperature rise of only two degrees would eventually melt the polar icecaps, thus adding millions of cubic miles of water to the oceans. Sea water would partly submerge New York. London, and other coastal cities.

> Some climatologists believe the earth is still emerging from the last ice age, which reached its climax about 10,000 years ago. Ice ages seem to come in series separated by long, tropical epochs of about 250,000,000 years' duration.

> During the past million years, at least four ice advances have occurred. If the cycle is not yet at an end, the next ice age might be expected in 10,000 to 15,000 years. Glaciers could once again creep across North America and Europe, swallowing up much of man's present habitat.



Old age assistance is a money payment in the form of a check for needy persons, 65 years of cities in the Piedmont and Eastage or older, who meet eligiblity ern regions of North Carolina. It requirements under law. Such was my privilege on one of these financial assistance is made possible by Federal, State and Carolina Farm Bureau at its county funds. All of the person's resources are taken into considration in determining the extent of each application, and as population is more than that of cases receiving assistance are egularly reviewed.

A typical case history from the public welfare in North Carolina is the story of a 74 year old woman whose husband died after a long illness. The woman went to live with her son and his wife. However, the son was killed in an automobile accident. The daugh ter in law was unable to care for her husband's mother, so the old lady returned to her home town. Her husband had been employed for many years but his wages were very low and although they had been able to live and pay their taxes, they were not able to save enough for their old age.

Upon his death she had become ligible to receive minimum Social Security payments, but again this was such a small amount that she was unable to meet her she lived with friends, going from one home to another as the small circle of people who knew and loved her and had enough room In their homes, could accomodate it successful. Each customer will be allowed to vote regarding the proposed extended area servcustomers and the customers and the Cooleemee customers, the planned extended in the aforementioned exchanges to reach approximately 2,000 telephones on a local call basis. The customer could call any ty, living only a few miles away.

The program is divided into two parts; (1) Education-from 8 a.m. December 10 and continuing through December 24 until 6 p.m. (2) Enforcement-Starting at 6 p.m. on December 24 and continuing through January 1 until 12 midnight.

The North Carolina Highway Patrol cites the fact that drunkenness and intoxcation continue to be major problems in the traffic safety field. Drunkenness of drivers and pedestrians is disproportionately higher during winter holiday seasons. Incomplete but reliable facts indicate that enforcement results against drunken driving are not adequate. If all North Carolina traffic law enforcement agencies had scientific test and post mortem examinations to determine the degree of intoxication of drivers and accident-involved pedestrians (dead or alive), the magnitude

According to "Traffic Safety" (November 1961)—"it may be said with fair confidence that 60 per cent of the drivers in the United States killed in car crashed had been drinking and that 50 per cent of dead drivers had blood alcohol levels in the impairment ranges—over 0.05 per cent. This means that the alcohol factor may well be the largest single factor in the traffic fatality picture—" Eleven states have post mortem examiners who are authorized to make examinations in all vioent deaths." Unfortunately North Caroina has neither scientific tests or post mortem examinations for all drivers and accident victims.



This is the story of Martha only Martha isn't her real nameand how old age assistance meant the difference between being warm or suffering from the cold; of having enough to eat or being hungry; of having sufficient clothes to wear instead of wondering where she would get a needed pair of shoes or a coat.

Martha is a case history in the files of the county departments of public welfare. When the caseworker visited her, she found Martha living alone in a two room apartment that had a partial bath badly in need of repairs. The furniture was worn and shabby. There were no rugs You want to marry me, don't on the floor and no curtains at the windows. The bedclothing was dingy and tattered. The rooms were wired for electricity, but Martha used a lamp for she could not afford to pay the light bill. The two rooms were heated with a small gas heater and she arrive at a decision, so his girl used a dilapidated wood stove for cooking.

> Martha was 70 years old. She was Charlie, but mo one had tribute to her mother's support because her husband was in poor Annie's wages.

Martha suffered from hunger frequently, although she had tried to manage a little garden in a corner of the front yard. 

An electronic element that can measure the temperature of a man's body half a mile away . , a scale that can weigh the period at the end of this sentence . . . an electronic machine that can gauage the thickness and width of hot steel as it rolls from a mill at high speed-these are but a few of the amazing measuring machines used by modern technology,

Quite as remarkable are the precise measurements scientists use-from the Augstrom unit tone hundred millionth of a centimeter or 1/254,900,-Patsy Carter and Pete Carter 000th of an inch! to the Parec [19,160,000,000,000

What good are these machines and these measurements? What do they mean to you?

The First Measurements

The history of measurement is as old as the

The most convenient primitive measuring devices, naturally, were parts of the human body. The cubit-201/2 inches-is man's oldest measurement. It roughly represents the distance between the elbow and the end of the middle finger. It was first used 7,000 years ago.

The "yard" was once based on the distance from the tip of the nose to the end of the thumb of an outstretched arm, and the "fathom" was the distance between the tips of the fingers when a man's arms were outstretched.

Today, we show our indebtedness to these anatomical units of measuring when we talk about a rule of thumb, a fistful of sedes, or a horse that stands 15 hands high.

But these measurements are at best very rough. To split an atom or build a missile, modern science and technology all over the world must have measurements and measuring devices both precise and standardized.

Modern Measurements Scientists have established the light-year to measure gigastic distances. A light-year-the distance light will travel in one year-is the equivalent of 6,000,000,000 miles for one-third of

To measure almost infinitestimal distances.

scientists use the Angstrom unit, 1/254,900,000th of an inch. To measure weight, they have devised the megatonne--one million metric tens or 2,240,600,000 pounds —and the microgram —one millionth part of a metric gram or .00000003527 ounce.

As for temperature, the physicist Fahrenheit created the "degree" — 1/180th of the interval between the ice point and the steam point of pure water. Illumination is measured by the "international candle" — one candle being the amount of light put out by a piece of platinum of a certain size and temperature. The smallest present unit of time is the nan-second, equal to 1 100,000 000 of a second. Endless or immeasurable time is termed "eternity."

Putting Measurements To Work

All these numbers, large and small, would be more doodlings unles there were precise and sensitive machines capable of putting measurements to work for us. ments to work for us.

Modern electronics have provided the break-through enabling man to measure and control

An electronic device is used to menome rolling steel mentioned at the beginning of this article. By means of X-rays and infra-red thickness and width An electronic device is used to measure the radiation, it measures the thickness and width, respectively, or a hot metal ribbon as it speeds through the rollers-without touching the steel at any time. The size is computed automatically and the information is relayed to the operator so that he can make necessary adjustments.

This electronic marvel can measure materials ranging from two inches thick down to .0007 of on inch with an accurary of 250 Angstroms labout a millionth of an inch1.

Then there's the velocimiter — on electronic device that measures the speed of sound in water. This speed varies depending upon the depth of the water, its temperature—even its

Modern velocimeters can take all these variations into account and will mesaure velocity of sound in sea water with an accuracy of one part in 5,000. These dep sea measuring devices which can work at ocean depts down to four miles, are invaluable research tools for the science of oceanagraphy.

Photographers—pro or amateur—out to get good pictures rely on "exposure" meter to tell them the proper camera setitngs. This palmsized electronic gadget informs the photographer of the light available for taking a picture eliminating any need for guesswork by measuring "foot-candles" of illumination in terms of film exposure time.

These are just some of the many, many ways scientists and engineers have developed to put precise measurement techniques to work for you and me. And the promise is that devices now being developed for tomorrow's technology will be even more amazing.







HOW MUCH GRAIN SHALL I FEED? By W. RAY MURLEY, Professor of Dairying N. C. State College

We have heard a lot in recent months about high level grain leeding to dairy cows. Opinions vary among dailymen and those who profess to be authorities. What are the facts? Can we delve into the magazine and television reports, and the "scap box" speakers who have something to sell and come up with any sound guides? It may be difficult but let's try.

### Feed Costs Change

First, let's look at the costs of sis on increasing the quantity of roughages in the ration and holding down on grains was based years ago by USDA workers on crops. Ancient Romans raised an evergreen branch at the December festival of Saturnalia, honoring the god of sowing.

### Dr. Clement Moore Was Ashamed of His Famous Poem Dr. Clement Clarke Moore was

shamed of his famous poem, "Night Before Christmas" and would not acknowledge that he wrote it for more than 20 years. Today, the poem which begins-

Christmas writings. Dr. Moore was an aloof professor of Greek and Oriental literature in the Episcopal Seminary in New York. He wrote the poem on Christmas Eve 1822 and read it

to his seven children. He had not planned for the poem to go further than his own family, but a relative who was visiting the Moores put a copy in her diary. The next year the relative's father

sent it to a newspaper.

Other newspapers printed the jingles and they quickly became known all over the country. The dignified Dr. Moore was embarrassed and considered it beneath a man of his scholastic standing to be the author of children's jingles.

Twenty-two years later, however, he finally publicly admitted authorship of the jingles and is his name for the first time.



Sir Henry Cole.


The cards we send today, however, a far cry from those mailed by Cole. The cards you send and receive this year will be designed by famous names in contemporary

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

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


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### Birth of the Savior **Was Greatest Event** In World's History



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
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
